pose he does all day?"

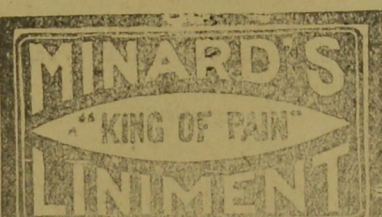
"I've heard he reads Bernard Shaw

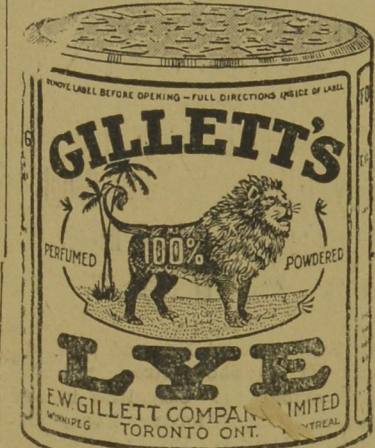

Woman's Column

HOUSEHOLD HELPS.

Get magnesia at the druggist's,
rub well in the grease spot, let it
stand for two or three days; brush
off. Repeat if necessary. This is
great for cleansing light felt hats.

Before washing the sink take
up all the grease and crumbs with
old newspapers, and burn up, sav-
ing lots of labor.

To keep sewing machines in
good order, oil well occasionally
with kerosene oil, run unthreaded
a minute or two; wipe all works
clean before applying machine oil.
After which it will run much light-
er.

Try rubbing a little vaseline on-
to scratches or discoloration on
polished furniture. It will make
them look fairly good until furni-
ture polish can be used.

A little vaseline rubbed into a
carving set when put away will
prevent rust or discoloration and
is easily wiped off when wanted
for use.

Talcum powder rubbed onto a
grease spot on either woollen or
cotton fabrics will help looks un-
til it can be well cleansed.

A little table salt applied to a
cut will stop the bleeding and
make it heal quickly.

Watercress Salad.

Watercress is an excellent spring
tonic, more especially for anaemic
persons. It makes a delicious sal-
ad and sandwich. For a vegetable
it is as good as spinach when cook-
ed in this way. Steam for five
minutes, then press to a pulp with
a wooden spoon and pour all water
off. Add some butter while cook-
ing.

It may be served with a poach-
ed egg or a garnish of hard boiled
egg.

STUFFED TOMATOES

Choose well shaped tomatoes
of a uniform size, peel and scoop
from the stem end a part of the
centre. Place them on ice until
ready to serve, then fill them with
celery cut fine and mixed with
mayonnaise, piling this up very
high in the centre over the top of
the tomato. Now take some small
lettuce leaves and cover with may-
onnaise, placing a stuffed tomato
on each leaf. Serve flat on a dish.
Chopped walnuts in this dressing
make it richer and more nourish-

ing. Some people like the tomatoes
stuffed with chopped hard boiled
eggs.

REVERSIBLE PETTICOAT

For the economical woman is a
new reversible petticoat for wear
with evening frocks. The petticoat
is made of flesh pink debutante
satin and a twelve-inch flounce,
faced within the deep hem with
very light, resilient stiffening ma-
terial, so that there is a crisp flare
at the edge. Bows of inch-wide
ribbon are stitched on the flounce
and the ribbon matches the color
of the petticoat. On the reverse
side of the flounce are rows of rib-
bon in a dainty contrasting color,
stitched exactly over the rows on
the other side. These petticoats
come also in white and in pale corn
color, the corn colored model hav-
ing self-toned ribbon on one side
and lavender on the other side.
