Moonlight Excursion
The first evening excursion of the season will be held by the Prentice Boys of Gibson on June 25th. They have chartered the steamer Victoria and have engaged the Fredericton Brass Band for the occasion.

Band Concert
The band of the 71st regiment will give the first concert of the season at the west end band stand on Tuesday evening June 11th, weather permitting. The band will play for the first time the two marches which have been kindly donated by Harry Lipsett.

In the West
The friends and acquaintances of our former townsman C. D. A. Simonds will be glad to learn that he is getting along well in his new home at Leduc, Alberta. He enjoys a lucrative law practice and in addition fills the important office of secretary treasurer of the town. He hopes to be able to retire in a few years and devote his whole time to literature.

Three Island Camps
Adam Moore has his camps at Magaguadavic Lake in good shape for the accommodation of visitors and anticipates a rushing business during the coming season. He has arranged to have his gasoline launch meet the St. John train every Saturday evening during the present summer to convey passengers to the camps.

Earl Grey's Visit

His Excellency will afterwards visit the University and a reception will be held in the parliament buildings from 9 until 11 p.m. The party will return to St. John by train.

Salmon Plentiful
There has been a good run of salmon at Kingsclear during the past few days and net fishermen have been making fair catches. A number of these excellent fish were disposed of in the market this morning at 16 cents per pound. A number of shad have been taken in the river during the past few days.

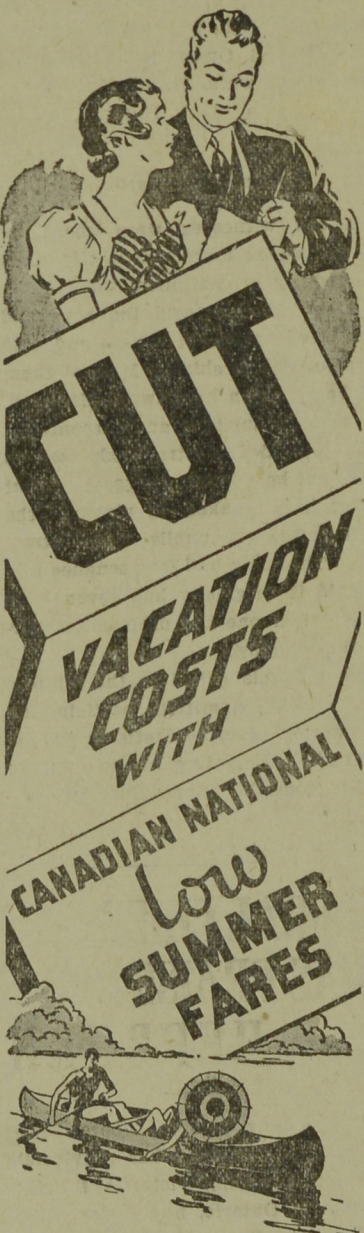
John R. Dunn, barrister of Gagetown is among the guests at the Barker.
