PITTSBURG STOVE LEAGUE CELEBRATES WAGNER'S BIRTHDAY

Old Time Baseball Players Mark Passage of Forty-Second Mile-Stone by "Honus."

Pittsburg, Feb. 24—Past and present-day ball players assembled tonight at the Colonial Hotel to help the Pittsburg Stove League honor Hans Wagner on his forty-second birthday.

Senator Joseph Thompson, ex-captain and coach of the University of Pittsburg football team, eulogized the guest of honor as a player and as a citizen, "who put Pittsburg on the map."

President Barney Dreyfuss, who celebrated his fifty-first birthday yesterday, was present and among the ball players of other days were Tommy Leach, Claude Ritchey, Deacon Phillippe and Harry Smith, members of victorious team in 1901, 1902 and 1903. Al Mamaux sang several songs and many expressions of esteem for the great Dutchman were given.

It is the intention of the Pittsburg Stove League to celebrate Wagner's birthday every year as long as he lives, and many hopes were voiced tonight that he would be able to play until he is fifty. He has been nineteen years in the major league, and in that time has a grand batting average of .332. He has stolen an average of thirty-seven bases per season.

Last year, when he was asked if there was any trouble about his contract, as he did not sign until near the opening of the season, he replied: "Couldn't be any trouble about my salary, for Barney is paying me more than I am worth."

Other costly things in sport are here named, each being the most costly of the kind:


Arm—Walter Johnson's, \$50,000.


