





FRAZIER-WILLIAMS-TAYLOR.



No. 27. A BY-LAW RELATING TO THE RE-MOVAL OF SNOW FROM SIDEWALKS.

(Passed February 12th, 1913.) Be it enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. In this By-law the word "sidewalk" shall mean that portion of a street lying between the gutter and the outer margin of the street, reserved for the use of pedestrians. owner, occupier, agent or per
