## PARIS EDITOR ON PEACE TERMS

Germany Will be Asked to Pay a War Indemnity of Twenty Billion Dollars.

New York, Dec. 18.—Stephen Lauzanne, editor of the Paris Matin, who is here on a mission for the French government, in an interview today announced what he asserts are the terms of the Allied powers. He is in close touch with Jules Jusserand, the French ambassador to the United States.

These are the terms as outlined by the French editor:

Transylvania to Roumania.  
Trentino to Italy.  
Alsace-Lorraine to France.  
Constantinople to Russia, with Turkey out of Europe.

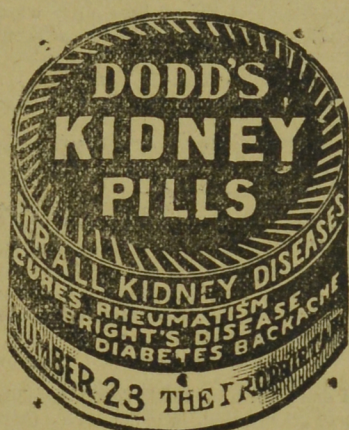
Restoration and indemnification to Belgium and Serbia.

Limitation of armaments of all countries, with Germany's armament to be decreased first.

An indemnity of \$20,000,000,000, part of which will be collected in heavy duties on all German goods imported into Allied countries.

Proof of Germany's pledge to bow to and abide by international law.

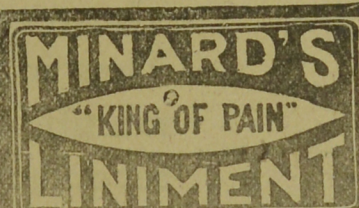

## OFFENSIVE OF THE ENEMY ARRESTED BY THE FIRE

London, Dec. 18.—The Teutonic offensive in Roumania has been arrested by the Russian force, the Russian War Office announces.

The statement authorized by the war office and collected by the wireless press, was made public today, as follows:

"On the Roumanian front, in the region of the Filipechti railway station, and in the region of Dihbatog, the offensive of the enemy was arrested by our fire."

## A BY-LAW RELATING TO THE REMOVAL OF SNOW FROM SIDEWALKS.

(Passed February 12th, 1913.)  
Be it enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. In this By-law the word "sidewalk" shall mean that portion of a street lying between the gutter and the outer margin of the street, reserved for the use of pedestrians.

2. The owner, occupier, agent or person in charge of any property on any street, within the City shall:

(1) Within ten hours after the City snow-plow shall have plowed out the sidewalk opposite his property, remove and level or cause to be removed and levelled the snow ridge left by the snow-plow opposite his property.

(2) At all times keep any snow or ice on any sidewalk opposite his property level and even on the surface and allow no accumulation of ice or snow thereon to a greater depth than six inches.

(3) Promptly remove or cause to be removed any ice or snow falling from any building on the sidewalk opposite his property.

3. All snow or ice removed from any sidewalk shall be entirely hauled away, or, when permitted by the Street Commissioner, may be scattered and levelled along opposite said property to the satisfaction of the said Commissioner.

4. No snow or ice hauled or removed from any private yard or premises shall be deposited on any street.

5. No snow or ice hauled from any part of the city shall be deposited on any public wharf or along any roadway leading to or from the river Saint John.

6. No snow or ice shall be deposited on any public wharf or along any roadway leading to or from the river Saint John.

7. Any person convicted of a breach of any provision of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding Fifty Dollars for each offence.

Public attention is directed to the above By-law.
