SIR THOMAS TAIT HAS RESIGNED HIS POSITION

Railway Magnate Throws up Job of Director of National Service to Which He Was Lately Appointed---Mr. R. B. Bennett, M. P., Named as His Successor---Announcement of Changes created quite a Sensation at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—The directors of national service, with R. B. Bennett, M. P., now giving the lead following the resignation last week of Sir Thomas Tait as director general, have asked for a political coalition in starting and stimulating the re-organized work of recruiting and other war work in so far as the utilization and conservation of Canada's man power are concerned.

Sir Robert Borden has acquiesced in the new and decidedly belated move and has written to Sir Wilfrid Laurier asking the latter's co-operation in the formation of the proposed parliamentary national service committee.

The resolution passed by the directors of national service at the conclusion of the conference here on Thursday was only made public tonight. It was formally communicated to Premier Borden on Friday and is in the following terms:

Recommendations Made.

"The directors of national service, in conference at Ottawa, having regard to the duties imposed on them and to the work which lies before them, are strongly of the opinion that the following recommendations if given effect to by the government, would materially assist in that work.

"That a parliamentary national service committee to be composed of representatives of all the political parties in parliament be formed at the earliest possible date.

"That such committee, as soon as possible after its formation, issue by proclamation and through the public press and in any other expedient way (a) A strong and explicit call to the manhood of Canada of military age and fitness to enlist for overseas military and naval service; (b) a similar call to the men and women of Canada individually and through their organizations to serve the nation in such capacities as their services may be of most value; (c) a similar call to all employers to effect such industrial reorganization as is necessary to meet exigencies arising out of the war."

The statement given out tonight adds that the Prime Minister has written to Sir Wilfrid Laurier expressing

the government's desire to have such a committee formed and asking Sir Wilfrid to co-operate. It is further stated that "it is therefore expected that such a committee will be selected in the immediate future for the purpose of making the proposed call."

Resignation of Sir Thomas.

That Sir Thomas Tait had resigned his position as director general of national service, and is to be succeeded by R. B. Bennett, M. P. for Calgary, was the somewhat sensational announcement officially communicated to the press tonight from the Prime Minister's office. The statement, announcing the resignation of Sir Thomas, who left for Montreal on Friday after writing Sir Robert Borden that he was throwing up the job, is accompanied by an official "explanation" which, to say the least, does not fully explain, and leaves much to be read between the lines.

Apparently Sir Thomas resigned because the government had expressed some days ago dissatisfaction with his selection of G. M. Murray, secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, to be the secretary of the Directors of National Service. The trouble between the government and Mr. Murray arose over a circular which he issued a few days ago to the members of the Manufacturers' Association criticizing the government for not adequately protecting the interests of Canadian manufacturers in regard to equipment supplied to Canadian overseas forces by Great Britain and paid for by Canada.

The government claimed that Mr. Murray misrepresented the facts of the case and, pending retraction and apology, would not ratify Sir Thomas Tait's selection of Mr. Murray as secretary.

Finally, Mr. Murray explained the "misunderstanding" satisfactorily to the government and then the ban on his appointment by Sir Thomas was removed; but strangely enough, just as everything was apparently straightened out, Sir Thomas himself resigned "in view of what has occurred in the case of G. M. Murray."

GERMAN NEWSPAPERS ARE BITTER AGAINST THE U. S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—A cable from London to the Herald says: Anti-British propaganda is now raging in the German press as never before, and also for purposes of the propaganda the Prussians are issuing at Amsterdam a Deutsche Wochenzeitung, in the latest issue of which there is an article full of fierce invective against the United States.

Were it not for the fact that America is behind the Somme armies of the Allies, the yallege, they would never be able to beat the Prussians. Here is what the Wochenzeitung says:

"On the Somme our best and bravest are bleeding. They also bleed on the Meuse and on the Aisne. An unparalleled expenditure is turning the trenches and their connections into rubbish. Who supplies them? Who, at the bottom, is waging the war? If you ask the mourning mother 'What has robbed you of your son, your pride and hope?' her reply is 'The lust for profit of the American millionaires.'

"Behind the Somme front stands an enemy we cannot reach. She is the vampire who sucks the blood from Europe's arteries because she is able to suck in at the same time the gold of Europe."

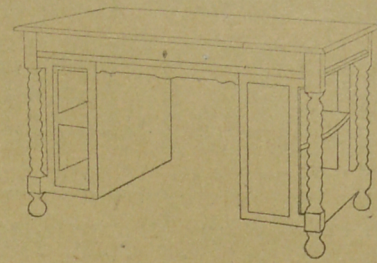

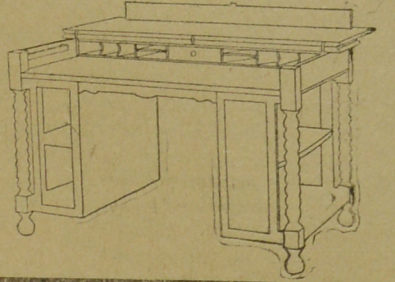

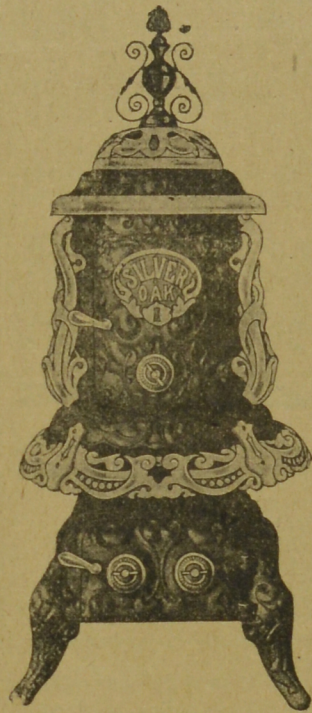
