FRUIT CAKES ARE BEST IF GIVEN TIME TO RIPEN AND BECOME MORE MELLOW

Housewives who like to make their plans ahead of time are now making fruit cakes and storing them away for the holiday season. This is advisable, because in six weeks' time a fruit cake has a chance to ripen and become more mellow. The recipe that I am going to give you is for a dark fruit cake and makes approximately twelve pounds of cake when it is baked. It is prepared in three stages. The fruits are first cut according to their strength and flavor and soaked in fruit juice over night. The nuts are either cut fine or ground. Then the batter is mixed and the soaked fruits and nuts are added to it.

The fruit and nuts used in the cake are two pounds of raisins, one pound of currants, one package of dates (three-eighths of a pound), one half pound of candied cherries, two small bottles of maraschino cherries, two ounces each of candied orange and lemon peeling, one-fourth pound of candied pineapple, one-eighth pound of candied citron, and one pound of ground pecan kernels.

Cut the citron the finest of any of the fruits because it is the most highly flavored and it also has a firm mixture. The lemon and orange peeling should also be cut fine because they have a strong flavor and hard texture. The pineapple is quite soft, so the cuts may be larger. The maraschino and candied cherries should be cut either in rings or in quarters. The remaining fruits are not cut. When the fruits are cut as described, the highly flavored ones are more evenly distributed throughout the cake batter. Put all of the fruits together in a bowl and add a half cup of

orange juice or any other fruit with the exception of grape juice because it discolors the fruits. Cover the bowl and place in a cool place over night.

Mixing The Batter

For the batter, cream together one pound of butter, one-half pound of light brown sugar, and one cup of white sugar. Then sift together four cups of flour, one teaspoon of salt, one-half teaspoon each of ground allspice, cloves, and nutmeg, three teaspoons of cinnamon, one teaspoon of soda. Beat twelve eggs until thoroughly broken. Add the eggs to the butter mixture, then add one-half cup of light or dark molasses. Add the dry ingredients and beat the batter until it is perfectly smooth. Then add the ground or finely chopped nuts and the soaked fruits. It is important to mix the fruits through the batter so that there are no little bunches of the same kinds of fruit stuck together. Then, too, you want the batter and fruits so well mixed that the batter holds the fruits together.

Baking The Cake

If the whole cake is baked in one low oven, or between 250 and 275 degrees Fahrenheit. If smaller pans are used then 300 degrees temperature may be used, as smaller cakes are not in the oven long enough to dry out. Grease the cake pan and also line it with thin brown paper and then butter the paper on the inside. After the cake is put into the oven place a large piece of heavy brown paper over the top of the pan. Bake the cake about thirty-five to forty five minutes with this cover (which is not a tight lid), then uncover the pan and continue to bake the cake until it responds to a light touch.

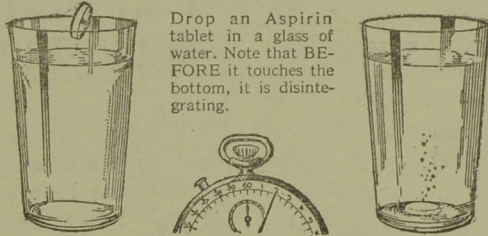

Fredericton Jct. Notes

F'ton Junction, Nov. 18—The B.Y. P.U. at its regular weekly meeting discussed "True Worship," on which a paper was given by Miss Marjory Tracy, Rev. H. G. Westrup also speaking on the subject, and also the question: "Should Canada secede from the Empire, or draw closer to the Mother Country and the other Dominions, or remain as she is?"

On the latter, Miss Lois Shearer, a last June's graduate from the Sunbury Grammar school gave a paper. She argued strongly for closer union between Canada and the rest of the Empire, because of the free institutions, high ideals and adequate protection received from the Mother Country; because of the need to trade with other parts of the Empire, the whole of which, if united, could be self-supporting; and because of the urgent need for all parts of The Empire to pool their powers of defence. Britain was still the world's financial centre and from many standpoints a most desirable country to link up with.

H. H. Stuart, agreeing with Miss Shearer's argument, urged the crystallization of the Imperial Conference idea into an Imperial Parliament, as advocated by the late Sir Geo. R. Parkin and many others.

Mrs. John Shearer further stressed the importance of the Dominions drawing the bulk of their immigrants from the British Islands, as these were needed to maintain the British quality of our laws and ideals. To secede and be able to remain independent was unthinkable from the standpoint of defence; and to join the U.S.A. would be to lose national identity in a policy inferior to that of Britain.

The next meeting of the B.Y.P.U. will be on November 30, as November 23-25 will be taken up with the Older Boys' Conference for York and Sunbury, which meets here.

James Wolfe, Metropolitan basso heard on NBC, is the husband of Lillian Lauferty, the Beatrice Fairfax of newspaper fame. That circumstance resulted in his receiving an order from a magazine a few years ago for an article on the theme, "How it Feels to be Married to a Famous Writer". Wolfe delivered the manuscript and it was published but to date it is his only contribution to literature.

Storing Fruit Cakes

Thoroughly cool the cakes and then wrap them in thin cheese cloth. Store them in an earthen dish or paper-lined cake container. The container should be as nearly air tight as possible. A couple of times a week uncover the cakes and drop a few drops of fresh fruit juice or fruit brandy over them to keep them moist and fresh. Do not add so much of the liquid, however, that the cakes are apparently wet on top—they should be just a little damp.

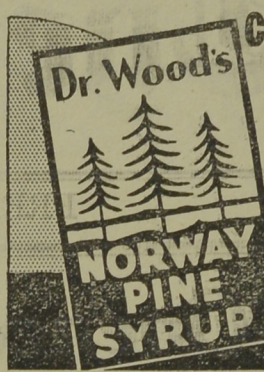
