

Wilmot United Church Observes Birthday

Rev. Dr. Peter Bryce, D.D., of Toronto, the Special Speaker for Occasion of 143rd Anniversary Services on Sunday — Feature Was Illuminated Church Model—Appropriate Music—History of Church.

Eighty-two years ago the structure,asked what he missed most since leaving now known as the Wilmot Church. He replied, "I miss most the sound of trumpets in the morning. In introducing his subject, Mr. Bartlett spoke of the sweetness of the flute and piccolo, but said it took the clarion notes of the trumpet to move us to great accomplishment. The first trumpet call spoken of was the call to repentance. It is the trumpet notes of Handel's music that heralds the approach of the Deity. In reference to this call to repentance, Mr. Bartlett spoke of the large congregations which characterized the services of the Methodist Church in the early years of its existence. In justice to our present congregations, it must be known that there were only two churches in Fredericton at that time holding Sunday evening worship and the population of the city was little smaller than it is today.

Following the idea of the different trumpet calls Mr. Bartlett said it is time the church blew the trumpet blast of justice. That shameful poverty and want exist in our society in the presence of the great wealth of a few is an indictment of the church. It is the duty of the Christian Church to stand for the furthering of justice and liberty for if the church does not speak—who will?

The trumpet call of love was emphasized by Mr. Bartlett as the greatest of all trumpet calls. If going to church is allowed to become a matter of indifference or fashion we lose our love of worship. Worship is the highest form of expression of the human soul and to deny the soul this exercise, to shut out the trumpets, is to court a Hell indeed. The sermon concluded on the victorious note which may be sounded by the trumpet. Though a life has been given up to thoughtlessness and sin, the trumpet call of the morning can awaken one to a new start and a new life.

The address was given by the pastor, the Reverend J. W. Bartlett, whose text "And they came with trumpets into the house of the Lord" was read from a bible, one hundred and fifty years old, which had been the property of Duncan Blair, a pioneer of Methodism in Fredericton.

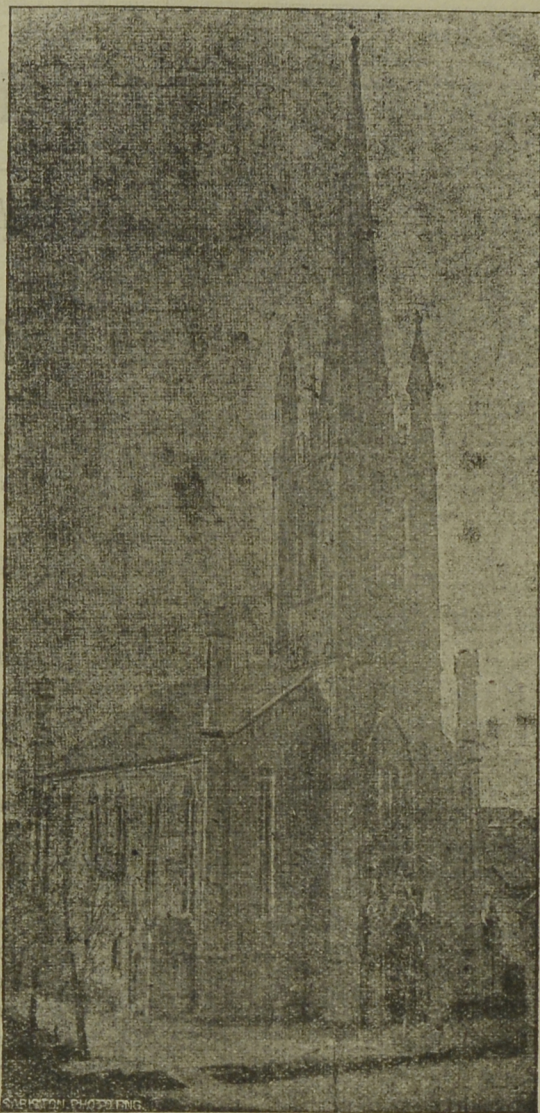
The title of the sermon was "Trumpets in the Morning". This subject was suggested by a Jewish legend, Mr. Bartlett said. The legend tells that when Satan was cast from the Heavenly Kingdom and had taken up his abode in the Nether World, he was

composed of G. R. Foster, R. Crewdson, F. T. Pridham and H. Andrews sang "Have You Not a Word."

Dr. Bryce's address was on the subject of the spread of the brotherhood spirit throughout the world. The increase in fraternal sentiment crystallized in "The Workman's Compensation Act" for Ontario in 1914. This legislation has done away with a great dead of suffering by compensating the dependents of any worker who is injured or killed in industry. In 1920 the "Mother's Allowance Act" and in 1929 the "Old Age Pension's Act" were passed in Ontario as a direct result of the spread of the spirit of brotherhood. Dr. Bryce expressed the hope that unemployment insurance may soon become a reality, a further result of fraternal feeling.

A vote of thanks was moved by E. C. P. Atkinson, seconded by Raymond Crewdson and unanimously passed on to Dr. Bryce.

MORE N. B. SPUDS SHIPPED TO PALESTINE

HARTLAND, Carleton County, Dec. 1—The first trial shipments of New Brunswick potatoes to two Eastern markets—Palestine and India—left Saint John Friday morning last on the steamship, City of Auckland, along with a second order for Egyptian consumers.

High quality table stock, the potatoes totalled 8,000 bags of which 6,000 were for Egypt to fill orders resulting from an initial trial shipment of 1,000 bags. The others comprised a lot of 1,000 bags for Port Said, to enter Palestine and 1,000 for Karachi and Bombay, distributing points in India.

The potatoes are being sent by the New Brunswick Marketing Board through the firm of Vincent and Wetmore, Limited, Saint John.
