

People are Urged To Put a Boycott On All Sweatshops

Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce Speaks out Plainly at Toronto Meeting—Should Stop Business Concerns From Piling up Huge Profits by Cutting Wages.

TORONTO, June 12—Hon. H. H. Stevens, Dominion Minister of Trade and Commerce, last night urged the citizens of Canada to do their part in preventing large business concerns piling up huge profits while cutting employes' wages and placing farmers in a condition of penury. He addressed the congregation of Trinity United Church.

There was a great need of an enlightened and interested public opinion.

"If from tomorrow morning the interested, earnest church women in this city would cease buying the products of sweatshops," the Minister said, "there would be the greatest scurrying to cover of those who allowed sweatshop conditions to exist."

He declared that Christian principles should be applied to social and economic life, for the great need the world suffered today was lack of justice and generosity.

"Because thousands of good Christian people do thoughtlessly flock to great merchants' shops, and buy products of sweatshops, does it follow that Christianity is a failure and its adherents false?" The Minister asked.

"Not at all. But it does disclose great carelessness," he continued. "What is necessary is the arousal of public consciousness. It is necessary to look these evils in the eye. To the extent that any self-respecting citizen can combat these conditions, he ought to, and there's a very effective way."

THE CONDITION OF DEMOCRACY IS PRECARIOUS

Hon. Dr. Manion Sounds
Warning Note Against
Another Economic
Crisis.

Toronto, June 11—If errors of social and economic life are not corrected from within by the nations there is a grave danger that another economic crisis or another world war may bring about complete destruction of the white civilization from without, Dr. R. J. Manion, Dominion minister of railways, declared in an address to the 18th annual convention of the Kiwanis International here tonight.

Kiwanis, with its 2,000 clubs and 100,000 members, had a magnificent opportunity to help solve two great major problems—to foster peace and co-operation among the nations of the world and to establish within the boundaries of their own countries a more just and fairer distribution of commodities than had been the case in the past, he said.

Earlier in the day 3,000 delegates stood and cheered when Premier Angus A. Macdonald of Nova Scotia urged a return "to the old idealism which our forefathers so staunchly defended." They also heard President Joshua L. Johns, of Appleton, Wis., who appealed for renewed efforts to improve the human race and the conditions under which it lives.

Dr. Manion told the Kiwanians democracy is in a more precarious condition today than ever before. Many European countries had given up de-

QUINTUPLETS ARE PUTTING ON SOME WEIGHT

Corbell, Ontario, June 12—The Dionne quintuplets today reached the age of two weeks in good health and considerably heavier. As they gained weight optimism rose that they would survive, something that was once viewed as highly unlikely.

Momentary anxiety was occasioned yesterday when the plumpiest of the five baby girls, Yvonne appeared weaker, the child rallied during the night, however, and was reported stronger. Yvonne weighed 40 1-2 ounces yesterday.

The other infants maintained their strength uninterrupted.

Mr. and Mrs. Ovilla Dionne, parents of the children, saw them yesterday. They donned masks such as Dr. A. R. Dafoe, their physician, and the nurses wear when they enter the room where the babies live in incubators.

They were not permitted to touch them, however. That is something only the doctor and the nurses are allowed to do. The parents merely gazed at them through the glass tops of the five incubators in which they spend most of their time sleeping.

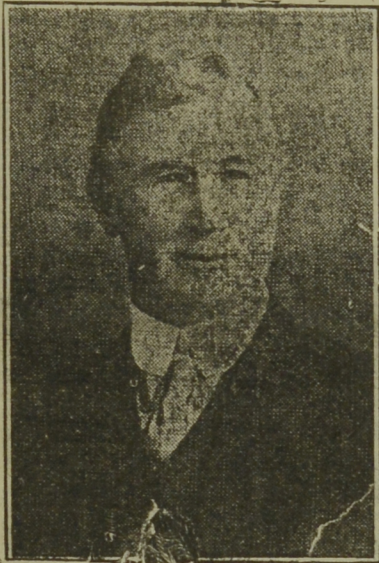

A VETERAN OF FOURTH ESTATE PASSES AWAY

The Late J. Sutton Boyd
Was on the Staff of the
Moncton Times for 62
Years.

Moncton, N. B., June 11—J. Sutton Boyd, for many years, editor of The Moncton Daily Times, died in the City Hospital this morning following a brief illness.

His death removes a veteran of the Fourth Estate, with a record of 62 years of service. One of the deans of the journalistic field in the East, he was one of the best known men in the Maritime Provinces, possessed

a genial nature and many kindly qualities of mind and heart and enjoyed the respect and affection of all those whom he came in contact with.

Mr. Boyd entered the employ of The Times in 1872, a boy of 14. As a delivery boy and "printer's devil" he soon began to pick up brief news items and six years after entering the employ of The Times was taken on the news staff. His first editorial work was done in connection with the federal election of 1878. Since that time he has taken part in some 30 campaigns as a writer with a fluent pen. Well versed in the political, commercial and communal life, his editorials were read with interest by the general public.

Was An Alderman

In 1889 and 1891 Mr. Boyd was an alderman from Ward 2, and from that time on he took a keen interest in civic affairs. During his term of office as alderman he was chairman of the by-laws committee and also the fire committee. It was during his period as a representative to provide the city with wooden sidewalks was inaugurated.

Mr. Boyd was a member of the United Church of Canada and the City Club. He frequently enjoyed gatherings with old residents, and their conversation was usually directed back to the days when Moncton was the "Bend".

Mr. Boyd was born near Cook's Brook in 1858, but early in life removed to Moncton. He was twice married, his first wife being Miss Katherine Minto, of Newfoundland, who died in 1915. By that marriage four children survive, Mrs. Walter D. Gow, Medicine Hat, Alberta; Mrs. P. H. Andrews Santos, Brazil; Robert, of Halifax, and Leonard of Regina. His second wife formerly Mrs. Hester Robb, died in 1931. One sister, Mrs.

QUADRUPLETS REPORTED TO BE DOING WELL

A Sac City, Iowa, Family
Was Boosted to
Nine.

PARENTS ARE
FEELING PROUD

Incubator Methods are
to Be Used for
Babies.

Sac City, Iowa, June 12—A 30 year old mother who does not believe in large families is now caring for a quartette of new babies ranging in weight from 2 1-2 to 4 1-2 pounds.

She is Mrs. L. R. Wycoff of Sac City, who gave birth to quadruplets, boosting the family roster to nine.

Mrs. Wycoff was "very proud," but said she feels "very sorry" for her children because "they won't have the privileges they should".

Lawrence Wycoff, the father, works for the State Highway Commission for \$16 a week.

"I don't know what to think about it all," he said, "but you bet your life I'm proud about it".

The babies all have the same initials — L. D. W. Their names and weights are as follows:

Lester Dean, 4 1-2 pounds; and the three girls, Lavern, Danene, four pounds; Lavonne Danene, 3 1-2 pounds; and Lorraine Delaine, 2 1-4 pounds.

The quadruplets born on Saturday, were attended by a trained nurse, and Dr. G. H. Swearingen, who delivered. They are being fed on a diet of corn syrup and milk, administered to the two sturdiest with medicine droppers and to the other pair through tubes.

Dr. Swearingen reported the appetites of the infants normal. Mrs. Wycoff was reported in a satisfactory condition.

Incubator methods will not be used in this case, said Dr. Swearingen. The doctor's wife declared he "did not believe in incubator methods".

ROMAN EMPRESS STATUE FOUND

Naples, Italy, June 12—A statue of Faustina Juniore, wife of the philosopher emperor, Marcus Aurelius, was found by excavators at Litemo, near here. It was perfectly preserved, archeologists said, by even pressure of earth around it through the centuries.

London, England, June 12—Beer can be bought—and drunk—in a British graveyard.

The only inn in the country, which has this unique location will be 600 years old this year. It is the Mug House at Claines near Worcester.

When a villager calls for his evening pint, he must pass through the graveyard. There is no other entrance to the "pub".

N. S. PENSIONS

Ottawa, June 11 — At the end of March, 1934, a total of 6,508 persons in Nova Scotia were receiving old age pensions, according to a return tabled in the House of Commons today. The amount paid out by the Dominion government which contributes 75 percent of the cost, was \$69,270.71.

Amy Cook, of this city, also survives.

Candidates Are Lining up Today In Two Provinces

Candidates Being Nominated for the Ontario and Saskatchewan Legislature—Spirited Contests are Promised — Polling Takes Place on June 19th, a week from today.

TORONTO, June 12—It is estimated that at least 240 candidates will be officially nominated today for the Provincial Legislature. Ninety members are to be returned and there are from two to six candidates named in every constituency. The Conservative government led by Premier Henry is contesting every seat, while the Liberals have a total of 85 candidates in the field. There will be 36 C.C.F. candidates and a smaller relative number of Farmer, Labor and Independents. Mitchell F. Hepburn, who lately resigned as Federal member for West Elgin, will contest the same seat for the Legislature. A vigorous campaign is being carried on but it is freely predicted that the Henry government will be sustained with at least 65 seats. Polling takes place on June 19th.

In Saskatchewan

REGINA, June 12—At least 150 candidates will be nominated today for the 54 seats in the Saskatchewan Legislature. The membership of the House is 55, but the election in Athabasca has been deferred until July 24. Premier J. T. M. Anderson who has carried on since 1929, with the support of Independents is leading the government forces and Hon. J. G. Gardiner, a former Premier, is the leader of the Liberals. There are a number of C.C.F. and Farmer Labor candidates in the field.

LIQUOR CASE BEING HEARD AT BATHURST

Capt. of the Schooner
Paul T. Seized by the
R.C.M.P., Faces Two
Charges.

Bathurst, June 11—The hearing of the case of the schooner Paul T., recently seized by the R.C.M.P. off Shippegan, on a charge of violation of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Act, was resumed before Magistrate Lemarquand here this morning. This case, together with similar cases against four of the crew, was adjourned until Wednesday morning, as a charge was laid this morning against Captain Flohant under the Customs Act, for having liquor over the duty paid value of \$200 unlawfully imported into Canada on which the duty had not been paid.

This case was proceeded with before the magistrate, and occupied the entire day. The direct examination of Captain Kenny, of the government patrol boat which made the seizure, was not completed when the court adjourned until tomorrow morning. It was disclosed from the captain's evidence that the seized cargo consisted of 378 cases of assorted liquors. The witness also gave bearings and cross-bearings as to the location of the schooner in reference to Shippegan light at the time of the seizure, being but a mile and a quarter from land. No charges have yet been laid against the crew under the Customs Act.

It was also stated that a quantity of cigarettes were among the confiscated goods.

DR. C. A. KING PASSES AWAY IN HOSPITAL

Was Medical Inspector
of Schools for Albert,
Kings and Charlotte
Counties.

Sussex, N.B., June 11—Residents of Sussex were deeply grieved when they learned of the death of Dr. Charles A. King, in the Frances Sproul Hospital here this morning. He underwent an operation three weeks ago and despite the seriousness of his case he rallied and was recuperating as well as could be expected until a sudden turn for the worse came early today.

Dr. King was born at Steeves Settlement, near Havelock, 59 years ago, son of the late William Sears King, and Treaney (Keith) King. Following graduation from the local school, he studied telegraphy with his uncle, C. B. Keith, at Canaan Station, on the C. N. R. and afterward he went to the United States, where he became a graduate nurse of the Boston City Hospital and later took his doctor's degree from the Physicians and Surgeons College, Baltimore.

He settled in the Village of Salisbury, where he practised his profession from 1904 to 1910 when he moved to Petitcodiac, where he continued to practise until 1923, when he was appointed medical inspector of schools for the counties of Albert, Kings and Queens and Charlotte, a section which he filled until the time of his death.
