LIBBY BROTHERS' GROCERY STORE BROKEN INTO LAST NIGHT

Evidence Effected by Way of Window—Two Bicycles Stolen Also—Epidemic of Burglaries and Thefts.

The epidemic of housebreaking, shopbreaking and bicycle thefts that has afflicted Fredericton for some few days, continues. Last night the grocery store of Libby Brothers, 199 King street, was broken into and a quantity of goods stolen and two new bicycles, the property of Ralph Shepherd and John Shepherd, were stolen from their home in St. John street, two old bicycles stolen from a residence in Smythe street being left in their places.

Chief of Police McCollom, when asked this morning by a reporter of The Mail concerning the recent breaks and thefts, said he had no information to give out. It is known, however, that the police are at work on the cases and that suspicions are directed toward certain young men who have police records. They were not located yesterday, however.

Mode of Operation.

Bicycle thefts are becoming very common. A method frequently adopted is that followed last night, the bicycle first stolen being left where a second was stolen. Sometimes this is done several times. Bicycles have been stolen from the yards of residences where it was thought they were out of sight and perfectly safe. Bicycle owners no doubt, will exercise greater care in future.

The front wheel taken from Dr. C. P. Holden's bicycle recently as it stood against his residence, was found last night and returned to him.

TATTOO PARADE PROPOSED FOR EMPIRE DAY IN FREDERICTON

Major Pincombe in St. John Yesterday Making Arrangements—A Large Number of Bands and Troops To be Used.

In consequence of requests made by several citizens, Major C. G. Pincombe was in St. John yesterday to make application for the torchlight tattoo given in St. John on the 12th to be repeated in Fredericton on Empire Day.

Colonel H. H. McLean, commanding the New Brunswick District, was quite willing. Lt. Col. A. H. P. Powell, A.A.G., who arranged the program last week, at once began enquiries respecting the bands and other matters, while Major Pincombe has to make some preliminary arrangements here and forward particulars to St. John today before a final answer can be given.

The unique spectacle astonished the people of St. John and it is believed that a similar display in Fredericton will bring a large crowd of interested citizens to the capital city of the province.

If suitable arrangements can be made, Major General Benson, commanding the Sixth Military District, Col. H. H. McLean and Lt. Col. G. W. Fowler, with their staffs and the officers of the garrison, will be present.

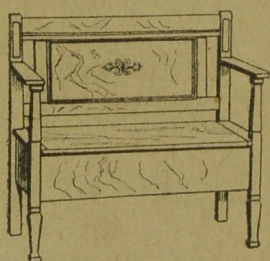

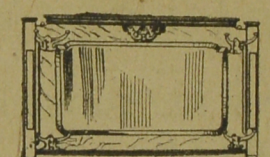

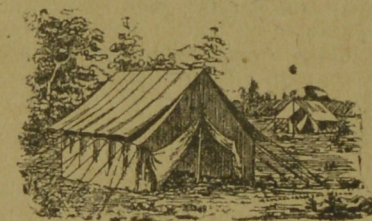
