TWO FREDERICTON  
OFFICERS KILLED  
ON WESTERN FRONT

Lieut. Chas. Hobkirk and Lieut. Locksley McKnight Gave Lives in Empire's Cause--George A. Fisher, Maryville, Killed.

Fredericton and the surrounding districts are aiding in the payment of the toll of lives which is the price of the late victorious British advance on the Somme. Yesterday relatives of Lieut. Charles Hobkirk and Lieut. Locksley McKnight received official telegrams stating that they had been killed in action. This morning word came that Grenadier George A. Fisher of Maryville had been killed.

Lieut. C. H. Hobkirk.

Lieut. Chas. H. Hobkirk was the son of Q. M. Sergt. H. R. Hobkirk, of this city. Before obtaining a commission in the 64th Battalion he was a clerk in the local branch of the Bank of Montreal. After reaching England with the 64th Battalion, he was drafted to the 25th Nova Scotia Battalion. Miss Annie Hobkirk, of the local staff of the Bank of Nova Scotia, is a sister.

There is much sympathy for the bereaved family. Prior to receiving an overseas appointment, Lieut. Hobkirk was a subaltern in the 71st York Regt. He was only 20 years old.

Lieut. Locksley McKnight.

Lieut. Locksley McKnight was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. John McKnight, Church street, Fredericton. He was graduated in Arts by the U. N. B. in 1909. He was principal of the Victoria County Grammar School after graduation, and in 1911 took the degree of Master of Arts.

236TH BATTALION  
CAMPAIGN WILL  
OPEN HERE TONIGHT

All Advertised Features Will be Adhered to--Phoenix Square Place of Meeting--Beacon Fires in The Fifteen Counties.

The campaign for recruits to join the 236th Highlanders will begin at 8 o'clock tonight. The original plan of having meetings in each of the fifteen shiretowns of New Brunswick, with beacon fires on prominent hills in the neighborhood of each, has been adhered to, and also the passing of the fiery cross from place to place.

Locally the campaign will begin at Phoenix Square, where an open-air recruiting meeting will be held. The Fredericton Brass Band will assemble near the Parliament Buildings at 8.15 and will march up Queen street to Phoenix Square. Miss Ethel McLean will then recite "Light, light the fire on Craig-Gowan Height." A selection on the pipes by Mr. William R. Dunbar will follow, the piper being some distance from the meeting.

The speaking will then follow.

Lieut. N. C. McFarlane, who served with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, and who will command the York county platoon, will be the first speaker. Prof. A. W. Thoriton, of Montreal, dean of the Faculty of Dentistry of McGill University, will follow. There will then be a selection by a male chorus.

Major C. G. Geggie, medical officer of the 236th Battalion, will then be heard, and Lieut. Col. Guthrie, the officer commanding, will be the final speaker.

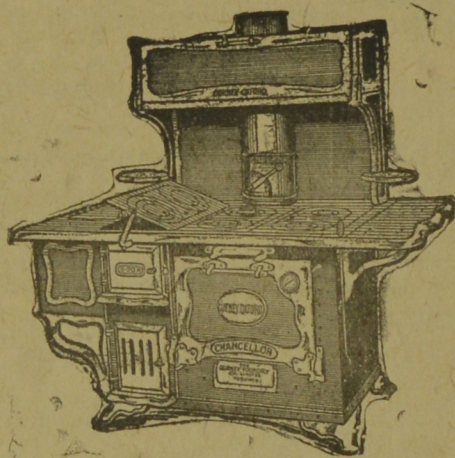
