## DISTORTING THE FACTS.

Discussing an incident which occurred in the Legislature on the closing day of the session, in which Mr. Dugal, the Opposition leader, and Mr. B. F. Smith figured, Commodore Stewart, M. P. P., in his paper, the Chatham World, has this to say:

"The Government papers are making desperate efforts to twist the French speech of Mr. Dugal, in reply to Mr. B. F. Smith, into an English certificate of character for the latter. Mr. Smith had denounced him for having insinuated charges against him by means of questions asked of the Government. Mr. Dugal replied that he had insinuated charges against any member of the House, and when he had charges to make he would make them in a manly fashion. These Government organs are torturing these remarks into a declaration that he had no charges to make, and knew of nothing dishonorable in the conduct of the member for Carleton.

"The precedent that was established during a previous session, when Mr. Stewart of Northumberland secured for Mr. Dugal the right to address the House in French on the Fleming charges, was followed in this case by allowing Mr. Dugal to reply in French to Mr. Smith's speech. He is a fluent and eloquent speaker in French."

The Sackville Tribune says: "It is his (Lieut. Gov. Wood's) plain and obvious duty to dissolve the Provincial House of Assembly in order that the people of this province may have an opportunity of passing upon the acts of the present Government, which misrepresents rather than represents the people of New Brunswick. Now is the time for Governor Wood to clothe himself with honor. Will he do it, or will he be governed by a bunch of incompetent partisans whose only object in life seems to be to excel all their predecessors in incompetency, graft and rottenness?" It is to be hoped that His Honor, who makes his home in Sackville, has read the above paragraph and will act upon it. The Governor's reputation is at stake. Will he continue to look to Ottawa for inspiration?

Halifax Chronicle: "We print today the sensational letter which Hon. John Morrissey, former Minister of Public Works in the New Brunswick Government, has addressed to Premier Clark, resigning his portfolio, which he has held for eight years. We commend it to the careful attention of Nova Scotians. It is eloquent testimony to the kind of government Toryism has been giving to our sister province."

The people of Nova Scotia will have a similar state of affairs to contend with a few years hence should they at the next election, oust Premier Murray, who has given the province wise and progressive government, and place the control of public affairs in the hands of Peerless Leader Tanner and the bunch of political nondescripts whom he has gathered around him.

It seems that the bill to strengthen the Scott Act has encountered some opposition in the Senate. Senator Domville is reported to have given expression to the following sentiments when the bill was before the Upper House: "Senator Domville said he did not propose to be run by women and preachers. Canada was a great nation, too good to be controlled by a lot of psalm-singers. He believed in salvation, but doubted that he had enough money to be saved, as there seemed to be a constant clamor for contributions. Psalm-singers were no good in the trenches, and he believed the Senate should not pass the bill on sentimental grounds."

The greatest honor that has come to a Fredericton boy so far during this war is the title of C. M. G. conferred upon Lieut. Col. S. H. McKee by His Majesty the King. Lieut. Col. McKee, who has acquired fame as a specialist, was one of the first Canadians to place his services at the disposal of the Empire. He commanded a hospital corps for a time in France, and was transferred to the Mediterranean, where he rendered the service which has been recognized by his sovereign. The parents of Lieut. Col. McKee are naturally very much elated over the great honor which has been conferred upon their gallant son.

It was the gallant Col. Fowler, M. P., of "Dear Lefursey" fame, who introduced Manager Colby of the Concrete Constructors, Limited, to Hon. John Morrissey. The company, ac-

cording to Col. Fowler, was then "at the top of the tree." The concern had an authorized capital of \$100,000, but started business with \$1,000 paid up. Col. Fowler held a \$5,000 block of the stock, which did not cost him a rupee.
