Major McBride Was Executed

Famous Irish Agitator Who Fought in Boer War Put To Death

Dublin, May 5 (via London, May 6).—It was officially announced today that Major John McBride, the eighth leader of the Sinn Fein rebellion to suffer death by court martial, has been shot.

Major John McBride fought throughout the Boer war with the Irish brigade under General Piet. When the Boers finally surrendered, he made his escape and took refuge in Paris, where he later married Miss Maud Gonne, known in Home Rule circles in Ireland as the Irish Joan of Arc. In 1905 Major and Mrs. McBride delivered a series of lectures in America on Irish politics. On their return to Paris Mrs. McBride sued for divorce and was granted a legal separation. McBride maintained an interest in Irish political affairs and was always identified with the extreme or separatist faction of the Nationalist party.

Thomas Hunter and William Cosgrave, who were sentenced to death with Major McBride, had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment.

Was Newly Married.

Dublin (via London), May 6.—Joseph Plunkett, one of the leaders in the rebellion, was married an hour before he was put to death. He was married to a Miss Gifford, sister of Mrs. Thos. McDonagh, widow of one of the first rebels who was put to death after court martial.

May be Released.

Dublin, May 6 (via London).—Jas. M. Sullivan, former American minister to the Dominican Republic, who has been imprisoned in Dublin Castle for several days on the charge of having been implicated in the Irish rebellion, probably will be released today, it is said by officials.

United States Consul Adams, in Dublin, has been active in behalf of Sullivan. He has made several trips to the Castle and held a number of conversations with high officials. The present favorable attitude of these officials apparently is due to efforts of Mr. Adams.

A. NORMAN MUNGALL PASSED AWAY LAST NIGHT

Andrew Norman Mungall passed away last night at his home, Charlotta street, aged twenty-eight years after a brief illness. The news of Mr. Mungall's death will come as a surprise to his numerous friends as he had been ill but a few days.

The deceased is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Mungall of Milltown, N.B.; a widow, formerly Miss Darrah of Chipman, and two little children, Mary L. Mungall and A. Norman Mungall; also one sister, Mrs. McLean of Portland, Me.

The remains will be taken by Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway to Chipman Tuesday morning for interment.

The deceased was a student at the U.N.B. some years ago and since leaving college has followed the occupation of civil engineer, being engaged in the construction of the National Transcontinental and other lines. A few months ago he qualified at the Royal School of Infantry, Halifax, for the rank of lieutenant and was awaiting an appointment to the overseas forces. The funeral will be with military honors.

A particularly sad feature of Mr. Mungall's death was the fact that his parents arrived from Milltown last night a few minutes too late to see him. Mr. Mungall was a member of the 104th Battalion, Woodstock, who had been the family physician at Milltown, also arrived last night.

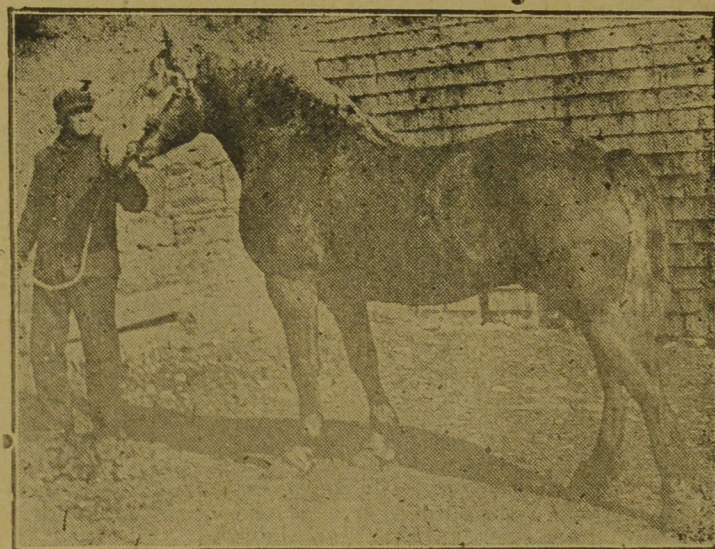

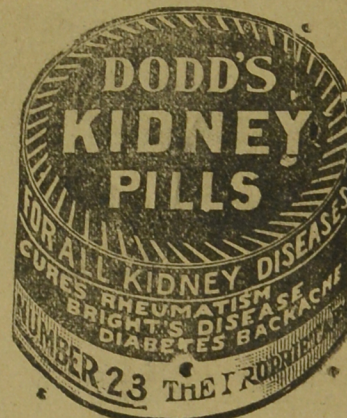
