He was Manager Childs of the Portsmouth, O., team. In a game with Marion, June 23, 1910, Childs went into the box and pitched one ball. It resulted in a triple play and Childs got credit, of course, for pitching an entire inning with one heave, the only time it has ever been accomplished.

AGREEMENT IN
AMERICAN TROTTING
WORLD IS REACHED

Interpretation of Eligibility Rule is Issued--N. T. A. in Harmony With A. T. Association.

New York, May 4—There being nothing further to record along the line of peace negotiations practically concluded on Tuesday, and which brought the N.T.A. in harmony with the American Trotting Association and the American Trotting Registrar Association, the board adjourned until December, but before doing so gave out the following interpretation of the eligibility rule:

"Eligibility to compete in races is fixed by time of race. It is the latest time made by the winning horse in a public race, or in an event in which he stood first on the summary. Records are not considered in determining eligibility, except in special events which are governed by published conditions.

Also, in the same manner, a member or several members linked together in a circuit can fix the date after which, or prior to which, win races shall or shall not be considered in determining eligibility at their meetings."

SUNFLOWERS PAYING CROP

(Kansas City, Mo., Correspondence.) In Southeast Missouri farmers raise sunflowers to feed chickens. Many farmers in New Madrid county Missouri, are growing sunflowers for seed on as large a scale as they grow corn.

The seeds are high in oil and protein and make an excellent feed. They are used chiefly as a feed for parrots and as a part of the commercial poultry feeds. The seeds are purchased each fall by general seed buyers from St. Louis.

The soils in which sunflowers are grown are the once swampy lands and range from sandy loams to clays. The average production is about eight to fifteen thousand lbs. of seed to the acre. The usual selling price is from two and a half to four cents a pound. The average return is about \$40 on each acre. Some of the farmers are growing the sunflowers in place of corn.

The crop is planted about the same as corn. In the labor required in handling and cultivation, the two crops are alike. When the crop matures, a wagon is taken into the field and the heads are cut off and thrown thrashed out with a thrashing machine. The seeds are then chine.




