Canadian Legion President Advocates Peace

C. R. Hawkins Well Known Barrister Against War

Makes a Strong Plea for Nations and Individuals To End Boodshed Amongst Men Whom God Made—W. K. Tibert Speaks.

The first meeting of the fall and winter sessions of the Home and School Association last night was fortunate in having excellent address on Peace by C. R. Hawkins, well-known barrister-in-law, and President of the Canadian Legion of this city. Mr. Hawkins whose address is published in full in another part of The Mail today held the attention of the members while he dealt with the matter of educating nations and individuals towards peace and suggested that churches and schools should work to educate their people away from war. He referred to the fact that today from the lowest grade up the text books even to our readers treated on war, and those characters in the books who were pointed out as heroes were nearly all soldiers and the pictures nearly all those of war. The same thing applied to lessons on national thought.

W. K. Tibert, Provincial Director of Vocational Education, spoke on the value of night classes for the child and the adult. Before doing so Mr. Tibert referred to the very excellent address on Peace delivered by Mr. Hawkins. Mr. Tibert regretted the fact that our text books do now and always did extol war. This was dangerous and not the right thing to put in the hands of boys between eight and fifteen years old. Mr. Tibert struck the right note with those present when he referred to the movie picture magazines and other such stuff that was read today by boys and girls of high school age instead of wholesome reading. We need he said Education along that line.

Mr. Tibert spoke in part as follows: The aim of Education should be, he said to prepare the youth to properly adjust itself to the environment of its day. That is our Educational system should teach us how to live and secondly and of equal importance it should teach us how to make a living. These two problems face every individual if he would avoid disaster and adjust himself to conditions. Customs and trends of thought, have changed in the last thirty years, and persons, who do not keep in touch are out of step and old fashioned.

The recognition of this fact has given rise to a society called the Adult Education Society. This society has functioned for some years in the United States and a Canadian Society has been formed. The Arm of the Society is to interest adults in self enforcement and to furnish the means for realizing this ambition. This has

PEACE!

The address on Peace, which was delivered at the York County Court House last evening by C. R. Hawkins, leading Fredericton barrister, should be read carefully. The remarks of Mr. Hawkins and also those of Mr. W. K. Tibert, Director of Vocational Training in New Brunswick are each worthy of our serious consideration. The day has gone by when men should jump at one another's throats and kill one another just because the other fellow does not belong to the same nationality to which we belong. The Germans, Italians, or Frenchmen, are just as good fellows individually as we are and they are no better. Why go out and kill them just because some governmental heads and munition grafters say it should be done. It is time that the churches and schools taught peace instead of war.

As both speakers at last evening's meeting pointed out, our school text books from the first to the last are filled with war pictures, all the heroes are those who were soldiers. Many of the selections in the school books deal with war and the killing of human beings. The walls of our educational institutions are hung with pictures of men killing one another. If a monument is to be erected it must be in memory of some battle or other instead of in honor of our statesmen who promoted peace pursuits.

The first thing that a fond mother buys her little boy is a toy gun, or sword, or a soldier's red coat. She gets the dear little son picture books containing scenes of brave men who have been sacrificed many many times for a nation's greed. The boy grows up and school books and school school drills continue the course. Some day he marches away to fight another mother's son. Then word comes that he has been killed in action. The lad was brave, he did his duty like so many of our brave lads whose bodies rest in Flanders Fields and whose souls are at peace with God. But what of the sorrowing parents, brothers and sisters left to mourn. Was the whole conflict worth it? Has the time not come for men and women especially in our churches to work for a higher civilization? Sir George Foster in one of his masterly addresses at the Opera House here a short time before he died asked if two men had a fight over a lot of land whether one should go out and pound the head off the other's shoulders. That is what happens in war, only nations fight over land. Let all thinking people get together and work toward preventing further wars. The League of Nations Branch which is shortly to be established in Fredericton should be an aid towards working this out. These League branches will spread all over the world if sane people have their way. We will hear more about this later.

HENRY FORD WANTS SANTA TO GO TO BED

Washington, Pa., Sept. 29 — "The United States will be in good shape, when Santa Claus goes to bed", Henry Ford said today when asked to comment on Government recovery measures.

"You can judge for yourself what I mean by Santa Claus", he added, refusing to elaborate his statement. Asked his opinion of President Roosevelt, he snapped, "No time for such discussion".

Ford came here to dedicate a granite memorial to Dr. William Holmes McGuffey, pioneer educator and author of the famed McGuffey's readers. Ford recently purchased McGuffey's birthplace near here and moved it to his Early American village at Dearborn, Michigan.

In his dedication talk, Ford said:—"I am glad to join you today in giving honor to Dr. McGuffey. He was a great American. The McGuffey readers taught industry and morality to America".

London, Sept. 29—London's "lick and a promise" by-law limiting domestic and other water supplies is to be rescinded on Monday, it was announced today.

COMPLAINED TOO MUCH FUSS OVER LINDY BABY

Bingham, Maine, September 29 — Bruno Richard Hauptmann declared there was "too much fuss" over the Lindbergh baby kidnap case during a hunting trip he made in Maine in October, 1932, the wife of his guide said last night.

Mrs. Earl Lister, whose 30-year-old husband took Hauptmann, and two others in the woods six months after the ransom money was paid in the kidnap case, told of the German's remark. Conversation turned to the Lindbergh case during a meal at her home.

"Because it's a millionaire's son they're making too darn much fuss about it", she quoted Hauptmann as saying.

The young guide said Hauptmann appeared "different" from the other men. He preferred to hunt alone. At times Lister came upon him in the woods he appeared to be deep in thought. He was not talkative.

26 JAPANESE MINERS TRAPPED BELOW SURFACE

Tokio, Japan, Sept. 29—Twenty-six miners were entombed in the collapse of a gypsum mine in Kikushima Prefecture, north of Tokio, yesterday. Rescue efforts appeared to be futile and it was believed all the miners would perish.

FORMER RESIDENT OF MARYSVILLE TAKES OWN LIFE

**Mrs. Watson McLean,
Ill Mentally Shoots
Herself
Body Brought Here**

**Had Made Several At-
tempts To Commit
Suicide**

Minto, Sunbury County, N. B., Sept. 29—Mrs. Watson McLean, a former resident of Marysville, took her own life in the cellar of her home at Newcastle Creek last evening, evidently the victim of a temporary mental derangement. Mrs. McLean was in early middle age.

Corporal Love of the R. C. M. P. detachment here who investigated the case said today that the shooting occurred at about seven o'clock last night and during the absence of Mr. McLean, who on the request of his wife had come here to get "the funny papers".

McLean, who is now employed with the N. B. Electric Hydro Commission here, returned to his home—a distance of three miles—to find his wife missing from the Chesterfield, where he had left her. On investigation he found her in the cellar with a bullet in her heart, and the rifle which he had used hunting in the afternoon, lying besides her body. She had evidently sent her husband on the errand to Minto with the express purpose in mind of taking her life in his absence. Dr. Gardner of Minto examined the body and decided an inquest unnecessary. The body of Mrs. McLean is being taken to Fredericton for burial.

Police state that the former Marysville woman had only been returned to her home at Newcastle Creek from the provincial hospital two weeks ago. It is reported that the woman on several previous occasions had attempted to take her own life, once by taking carbolic acid.

According to the story furnished by Corporal Love, Mr. and Mrs. McLean had been sitting quietly on the Chesterfield at their home after supper. Mrs. McLean expressed the notion that she'd like to see the "funny papers", and her husband complying with her request had motored the three miles from their home to Minto to secure them for her. It was when he returned that he made the ghastly discovery of his wife's dead body in the cellar. She had shown no signs of being ill just previous to her drastic act.

The McLean couple had no children. Mrs. Ernest Fraser of Fredericton is a sister of the dead woman. Mrs. McLean was formerly a Miss Kelly of Kingsclear and had lived in Marysville, N. B., for a number of years.

ROOSEVELT URGES CONTINUED ATTACK

Washington, Sept. 28—Confidence that a unified attack "for a little while longer" would master "old man depression" was expressed today by President Roosevelt in addressing the 1934 conference on the mobilization of human needs.

To the assembled leaders of the group at the White House, the president emphasized that it was up to local communities to carry the primary burden on relief. He called it the privilege rather than the duty of the individual citizen of the United States to bear a share in relief.

MAN - HATER IN HOOSEGOW, MEN RESUME WALKS

**Mara, Amazon Beauty,
Beats Up One Potent-
tial Suitor Too Many.**

Vrasta, Bulgaria, Sept. 29 — Mara Reckof doesn't like the sight of men and makes no bones about it, that's why she is in jail today.

Thirty years old, almost handsome, a regular Amazon, Mara started hating boys and men early in life and now has it down almost to a scientific basis.

Many a boastful swain has sought to tame the shrew, but showed up back with his cronies with a "shiner" or broken arm.

One of the potential suitors was flung bodily out of Mara's father's farm house by the girl. She gave him a trouncing before heaving him out the front door.

She even went into the neighboring forests alone, where men go armed, if they must make a trip through the woods.

It may have been the heat, or the humidity, which sent Mara out in her latest one woman campaign to exterminate the sterner sex, but it proved the last straw. The mayor ordered her locked up after she had almost killed a good-looking student.

She gave no reason why she set upon the youth and lacerated him with her fingernails and bit his face and neck.

Because of Mara the swains took to the side streets when she approached, but they can return to their amblings along the main stem now, for Mara's in jail.

N. B. PREMIER GOES TO OTTAWA RE PROV. RELIEF

A conference on unemployment relief in which the province of New Brunswick will be represented by Premier L. P. D. Tilley and Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, is to take place at Ottawa on Monday. The latter will interview Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Labor and matters in connection with the completion of a number of projects of relief work will be considered.

Premier Tilley is in the city today and it is expected that he will leave this evening or tomorrow for the federal capital. The idea of the interview, so it is understood, is for the premier to gather additional information with respect to relief distribution and to straighten out details in connection with proposed relief work for the fall and winter.

Employment conditions are now regarded as reasonably satisfactory in this province compared with other provinces New Brunswick's monthly grant for relief from the federal government is \$25,000 and this stipend replaces the former one-third contribution to relief outlays.

Insanity. May. Be. De- fense As Council An- nounces Prisoner Will Be Examined—Search For Stoop Shouldered Man.

New York, Sept. 29—Sharpened to a knife-like edge, a metal spoon was found today in the cell of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, shortly after his counsel said a psychiatrist would examine the alleged Lindbergh extortionist, presumably to determine the possibility of an insanity defense.

To prevent an attempt at suicide, or escape, Sheriff John Hanley of the Bronx doubled the guard outside Hauptmann's cell after finding the spoon.

Accompanying this spectacular development, a close friend of the German alien ex-convict, Hans Kloppenborg, was picked up and questioned by District Attorney Samuel Foley.

Kloppenborg's picture was in the Hauptmann album and he has been sought for several days.

Asked what he thought Hauptmann's intentions with the spoon, Foley said: "You may use your own imagination."

The spoon was stolen from the breakfast tray. It was broken into sections. The bowl had been whetted down to a keen edge, evidently by rubbing it against the steel bars of the cell.

Its absence from the tray was noted in the kitchen sometime later, the prisoner was taken to another cell. Search was made at once.

The sections were found in the drains of the toilet and wash basin. At about the same time, Attorney James Fawcett, Hauptmann's counsel, disclosed he had instructed a psychiatrist to examine the prisoner.

"I intend to call in a doctor and a psychiatrist," Fawcett said, "to look over my client as part of our defense. The examination will be made tomorrow in the jail. I am going to be guided by their advice."

"Does that mean," Fawcett was asked, "that insanity may be the defense?"

"You can draw your own conclusions," was the reply.

New York, Sept. 29—The largest developments were. Federal authorities and police continued search for alleged accomplices of Bruno R. Hauptmann in Lindbergh kidnapping. They seek a "stoop shouldered" man and possibly a woman.

New Jersey officials, preparing murder trial for Hauptmann, study pieces of wood from his garage and other evidence in efforts to link prisoner's carpenter tools with tools used on kidnapper's ladder. They expect
