## CHARGED WITH CAUSING LITTLE GIRL'S DEATH

Preliminary Examination of Robert Rice of Boiestown Commenced at Newcastle.

Mr. Robert Rice, of Boiestown, who ran over and killed little Edith Nelson of Boiestown while driving an unlicensed auto, is under arrest at Newcastle, charged with causing the girl's death.

His preliminary examination was begun on Saturday before Justice Lawlor. Mr. Charles D. Richards, of this city, appeared for the prosecution, and the accused was without counsel.

The witnesses examined were Nehemiah Smith, Melvin Murphy, Dr. Weir, Herbert Parks, Miss Gladys Vera, Harold Duffy and Miss Kathleen Duffy.

The case has been stood over until Tuesday to give the accused a chance to engage counsel.

### KILLED AT WESTFIELD.

Roland Campbell, C. P. R. Signalman, Killed Instantly While Riding a Track Cycle.

Roland Campbell, signalman for the C. P. R., and a well known resident of Fairville, was killed almost instantly at Westfield on Saturday at noon.

Mr. Campbell was speeding westward on his track cycle, when directly opposite the picnic grounds he and the machine were hurled through the air, the machine coming down on top of him, breaking his neck.

The cause of the cycle elaving the track is unknown, as a train had passed safely a few minutes before the accident occurred. Dr. Keith was immediately summoned, but it was impossible to save the unfortunate man's life.

### A BRITISH AIR RAID.

Naval Aeroplanes Raid German Ammunition Stations in Belgium.

London, Aug. 19.—British naval aeroplanes raided German ammunition stations at Liervelde, in Belgium, 13 miles southwest of Bruges, yesterday, causing large fires, the War Office announced. Forty-eight bombs were dropped from a height of about 3,000 feet. Large fires were afterward observed. All the machines returned safely.

### THE RUSSIAN ADVANCE.

Have Broken Through Austro-German lines on Stokhod River.

Petrograd, Aug. 19.—The Russians have broken through the Austro-German lines on the Stokhod river, in Volhynia and have made a considerable advance, it was announced officially today.

This break was made in the region of a village 40 miles northeast of Kovel.

Will Take Rank of Major---Equipment for Battalion Arrives---One Carload Unpacked.

Lieut. G. Stewart Ryder, of St. Stephen, who has been serving with the 12th Battalion since the organization of the First Canadian Contingent in 1914, arrived here this morning and reported to Lieut. Col. P. A. Guthrie, O. C. 236th Highlanders. He will take the rank of major in that unit. His brother, Sergt. Frank Ryder, who was wounded in France, accompanies him. He is to take the rank of lieutenant in the 236th.

Capt. J. P. McPeake, who is to be paymaster of the 236th, will leave for Halifax shortly in connection with his duties.

Battalion Q. M. Sergt. James Dymond reported here this morning. He has been serving with the Composite Battalion, Halifax, as company quartermaster sergeant. He formerly was with the R. C. R.

Company Q. M. Sergts. F. L. Mooers and Seely, have completed courses of instruction at St. John. Sergt. Seely was wounded in France while serving with the 8th Battalion.

Of the two carloads of clothing and equipment sent to the 236th, one carload has been unpacked by Hon. Capt. and Quartermaster J. D. Black. The Balmoral bonnets, doublets, kilts, etc., are still to come.

## SIR HORACE HOZER DEAD IN LONDON

Brisbane, Australia, via London, Aug. 21.—Sir Horace Tozer, K. C. M. G., representative of the Queensland government in London, is dead. Sir Horace Tozer was born in New South Wales in 1844. He represented Queensland in London from 1898 to 1909. Under his direction the Australian National Art Gallery was founded in 1896.
