THE GERMAN HIGH-SEAS FLEET WAS OUT

British Lost Two Light Cruisers From Submarine Attacks Last Week.

London, Aug. 20.-Two British light cruisers, the Nottingham and the Fal mouth, were sunk Saturday in th North Sea by German submarines, while the vessels were searching for the German high seas fleet, according to an official announcement issued by the Admiralty shortly before midnight. One German submarine was destroyed by the British, while another was rammed and possibly sunk, according to the Admiralty statement, which fol

"Reports from our lookout squadron and other units showed that there was considerable activity on the part of the enemy in the North Sea Saturday,

"The German high sea fleet came out, but learning from their scouts that the British forces were in considerable strength, the enemy avoided an engagement and returned to port.

"In searching for the enemy we lost two cruisers by submarine attacks-H. M. S. Nottingham, Capt. C. B. Miller, an dH. M. S. Falmouth, Capt. John Edwards.

"All the officers of the former were saved, but 18 of the crew are missing. All of the officers and men of the Fal mouth were saved, but one stoker, Nor nan Fry, died of injuries.

No heavy fighting is reported with accomplices have done much to distance the exception of the engagement on the Carso, over which the Italians are attempting to advance on Trieste.



Public Schools Notice.

FOR the special benefit of pupils who are unable to continue the common school course, the Trustees will open a pre-vocational department in the York Street School building. Applicants for admission to this department will file their names with the Secretary and obtain an admission certificate.

In accordance with the Compulsory Schools Act, all children from six to fourteen years of age must be in at-tendance at school. In every case the reason for non-attendance must be given to the Board of Schol Trustees by the paretn or guardian of the child. In pursuance of Sec. 73 of the Schools

Act, the Secretary is required in every case to demand a physicians' certificate or other evidence of recent successful vaccination before a permit

All the schools will be re-opened on Monday, 28th inst., at 9 o'clock, a.m., and permits may be obtained at the office on York street during the preious week. Applicants for admission of the Model School, whose names have been registered, will apply for permits Friday, 25th inst.


