IN C. T. A. MATTERS

BY LOCAL POLICE

Long's Hotel Raided Saturday Evening
---Assorted Liquors to Value of
Fifty Dollars Secured During
the Search.

More activity in Canada Temperance Act matters was displayed by the local police force Saturday evening, when Long's Hotel was raided on a warrant issued under that act.

Liquors of various kinds to the value of about \$50 was seized on the premises, and taken to the police station. Action in the matter will be taken later.

The warrant was sworn out by Policeman Charles H. Marshall, who is acting chief. The officers taking part in the raid were Policemen Hughes, Jones, Murray and Pace.

The liquor secured included a case of gin, an unopened barrel of bottled ale and whiskey in flasks and bottles.

The Police Commission is to meet this afternoon. Chairman McKay this morning stated that the business to come up was the purchase of raincoats for members of the force. Chief Finley was not expected before the middle of next month, according to his statement.

A Double Header.

The writs for two local by-elections in the county of Carleton have been issued. Nominations will take place on September 14th and polling one week later. The vacancies were caused by the appointment of Mr. B. F. Smith to the portfolio of Public Works, and the resignation of Mr. Donald Munro. The Opposition meet at Hartland shortly to select candidates.

MORE TAXPAYERS

TAKE ADVANTAGE OF

DISCOUNT PERIOD

Measures of Civic Finance Department
Produce Results--City Treasurer's
Office Will be Open Tonight
For Late Comers.

Today is the last day upon which discount can be allowed on city taxes. Some time ago Ald. Reid, chairman of the Finance Committee of the City Council, announced that steps would be taken to compel the payment of taxes by legal means immediately after the expiration of the discount period. City Treasurer G. R. Perkins stated this morning that the determination of the Finance Committee to collect the taxes as soon as possible evidently had the effect of bringing in more taxes within the discount period. It is impossible at the present time to even make an estimate as to how much has been paid, but it is expected that former records, both actual and relative, will be surpassed.

As is customary, the office of the City Treasurer will remain open until a late hour tonight in order that every tax payer may take advantage of the discount period.

This morning a steady stream of persons poured into the office and the city treasury was benefited in proportion.

Last year the sum of \$67,000 was paid in during the discount period. In 1914 the amount was \$58,000.

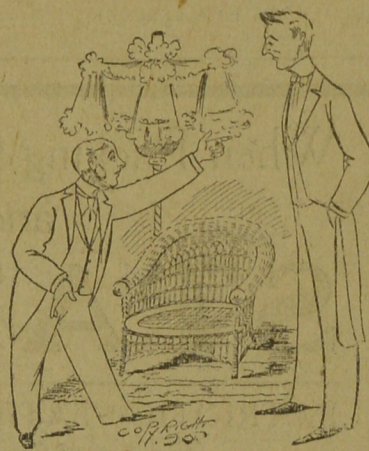
