GRAND PATRIOTIC TRIP AROUND THE WORLD

Great Event for the Benefit of Our
Soldier Boys to be Held Here
June 28th.

The biggest thing yet attempted in Fredericton for the benefit of our gallant boys at the battle-front and their dependents, is the Patriotic Trip Around the World, with a visit to all the allied nations, planned for Wednesday, June 28. It's the talk of the town and everybody with a desire to "do their bit" will want to help the thing along.

More than fifty automobiles, in trains of four cars each, will make the trip, calling at ten intermediate stations, each gaily decorated to represent the various countries. Trains will leave the central station, Court House Square, every ten minutes during the afternoon, beginning at 1.30. The first stop will be at the University of New Brunswick, Belgium, and the other stops will be at Glen Isle House, Mr. P. M. MacDonald's, Scotland; the Experimental Station, Canada; Mr. A. J. Gregory's, Japan; Mr. R. G. Lee's, England; Mr. David Richards', Holland; Dr. G. C. Vawter's, Spain; Dr. T. C. Allen's, France; Mrs. T. Lynch's, Ireland; Mrs. H. H. Gunter's, Italy; winding up at the Officers' Square, Russia.

One dollar buys a ticket for the whole route, including admission to Officers' Square, where supper is to be served and a grand fete held during the evening. Here there will be games of skill and chance, with attractive prizes for the winners, including \$5 ladies' and gentlemen's shoes, \$5 umbrellas, \$3 to \$5 hats and ladies' hats for 5 cent tickets. The Fredericton Brass Band has kindly donated its services. General admission 10 cents, and an elaborate supper 35 cents. Ice cream, candy, beer and cigars will be on sale. A thoroughbred cocker spaniel will be offered by lottery and may be seen in J. S. Neill & Sons' window, tickets 25 cents.

One hundred matrons and young ladies will form the staff at the fete and will see that every patron has a good time and gets more than his or her money's worth.

Come along and give a worthy cause a helping hand. Proceeds will be equally divided between the Patriotic Fund and the Red Cross. The former fund, particularly, is in urgent need of assistance.

Sir Sam Hughes Explodes a Bomb

London, June 22.—Major General Hughes, who came here last night after inspecting Niagara Camp and reviewed twelve thousand overseas troops this morning on Carling Heights, threw a bombshell into London by announcing that most of the men here will be moved shortly to Camp Borden. After being promised the troops and spending nearly \$10,000 in providing training grounds and accommodations, the council and citizens are wrathful and will likely protest to the government.

New York Bazaar Was Great Success

New York, June 21.—The great bazaar for the benefit of the war sufferers of the Entente Allies, which has been in progress here for eighteen days, closed tonight with profits unofficially estimated at \$1,500,000 and an attendance record of nearly 750,000.

Baron Wimborne Resigns His Post

London, June 22.—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons today that the resignation of Baron Wimborne as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, tendered shortly after the suppression of the recent Irish rebellion, has been accepted.

F. A. DIXON TO JOIN NORMAL SCHOOL STAFF

Succeeds Major F. A. Good, Who
Has Year's Leave of
Absence.

The Board of Education yesterday afternoon appointed Mr. F. A. Dixon M.A., to the faculty of the Provincial Normal School, in the place of Major F. A. Good, who has leave of absence to go overseas with the 140th Battalion, St. John, was appointed acting in-year.

Mr. Dixon is acting school inspector for No. 5 inspectorial district in the place of Major A. J. Brooks of the 164th Battalion, who is on leave of absence. Mr. Samuel Worrell, B.A., principal of the Victoria school, St. John, was appointed acting inspector in the place of Mr. Dixon for the same period.

A letter was read from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor which had been sent out by H.R.H. the Governor General, in which it was proposed that November 15 be observed by the school children, assisting by concerts and entertainments in raising funds for the Belgian relief funds. The proposition was favorably received by the board and action in the matter is probable. Announcement in this regard will be made later.

The Board of Education will be represented at the public meeting of the Educational Institute of New Brunswick at St. John, June 28, by Premier Clarke or the attorney general Hon. Mr. Baxter.

Aged Murderer Sentenced to Die

Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 22.—Malcolm McPherson, 84, a farmer of Union Vale, in the western part of the Island, was sentenced to be hanged on September 7th for the murder of his wife, 86.

The jury yesterday afternoon, after half an hour's deliberation, brought in a verdict of guilty, with strong recommendation to mercy in view of the prisoner's advanced years.

Sentence was imposed by Justice Hazard of the Supreme Court.

SIR ROGER CASEMENT WILL FIGHT IT OUT

London, June 22.—Widely circulated reports that Sir Roger Casement, who is being held for trial on a charge of high treason in connection with the recent Dublin revolution, would throw himself on the mercy of the Government after making an important statement, was denied today by Michael F. Doyle of Philadelphia, Sir Roger's attorney.

Mr. Doyle declared that the case of his client would be fought on very different lines. He declined, however, to say what will be the defence.

HARVEY STATION BOY KILLED IN ACTION

In a casualty list received from Ottawa late this afternoon the announcement is made that Private Alfred Stephen Hunter, of Harvey Station, has been killed in action. He was a son of ex-Warden Hunter of that place. Driver William Hand and Private John McRae, of Woodstock, are among the wounded.

WILL FINISH TODAY.

Premier Clarke stated this morning that the local government would get through with the business of the session this afternoon. He said that only routine business would be transacted. Hon. P. G. Mahoney, ex-M. P., arrived yesterday and is administering the public works department, just as if nothing had happened. Lieutenant Governor Wood is also here.

COUGHLIN-McSORLEY.

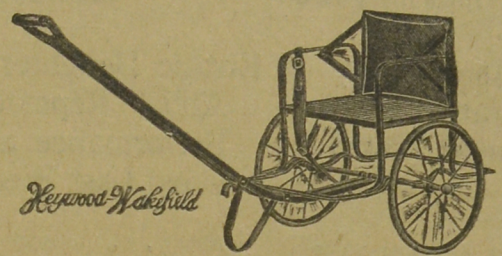

CURED OF A 30-YEAR DRUNK.

Fight of a Ford Employee to Reform
Lasted Six Months.

Detroit, June 21.—When Peter Delaney, 50 years old, dissipated, disheveled and showing the effects of a "thirty-year drunk," as he puts it, appeared at the office of the Ford Motor Co. and applied for a job, they told him he was too old and broken in health to permit his making good, but his reply that he wished to be put to the acid test won him a place in the foundry of the big plant.

That was six months ago. Today Delaney is making his \$5 a day for 8 hours' work, the nature of which permits his wearing a linen collar and a neat business suit, he having proved his worth after four months of hard labor in the foundry. He has money in the bank and aspires to the ownership of a home.

Years ago Delaney was one of the most expert telegraph operators in the country, but his inability to shun liquor drove him from one city to another until he had been in every large city from Maine to California, from Winnipeg to the Gulf and had been jailed 200 times, twice for shooting scrapes.

"When I entered the Ford plant I did not know that I was capable of labor, for during the fifty years of my life I had never done any other work

than my profession as a telegrapher," Delaney said, in speaking of his "come back." "There was some good left in me, and during those four months that I worked in the foundry, fighting the hardest fight of my life against the craving for liquor, I suffered more than I can describe. When I felt that I could not keep the path I went to church, and there found the aid and encouragement that won the fight for me."
