PARIS, Nov. 21 .- The Allied troops entered Monastir on The lifeboat men have had a rough the heels of the retreating Bulgarians, according to a description of the fallen city, telegraphs the correspondent of the Petit Journal on the Serbian front. The despatch, which is dated Sunday, says:

"The last Bulgarian patrol of seventeen troopers left the city at 9.30 a.m., just as the Allies' advance guard entered. Women showered flowers on the victorious troops as they marched through the streets.

The night before, the enemy, after defiling thrice through the main streets, pillaged all the stores, and toward midnight buildings of a military nature.

The retreat began about 8 c.m. The official staff had evacuated the night before, and nearly 3,000 Bulgarian families left two days ago. The infantry was not clear of the outskirts until ten. The enemy is being closely pressed by our troops, but bad weather makes both pursuit and retreat a difficult matter.

The Siamese Prince Now at Boston Was Attacked by a Submarine---Many Americans Were Included in the Crew---Put on Full Speed and Escaped.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.- The British steamer Siamese Prince, returning in ballast after delivering a cargo of horses the German government states that they were not sunk by at Brest for the French government, was fired upon without German forces, and maintains that the Antwerpen, the third warning, presumably by a German submarine, off the French steamer, was destroyed in full accordance with the rules of coast on November 4, according to officers of the vessel, which arrived here today.

Three shots were fired, the officer said, two in quick succession, which passed over the port quarter, and a third soon after, which passed over and dropped astern.

The lifeboats were loosened out, the crew of 42 and the 54 hostlers on board donned life preservers, and the ship put on full speed.

The craft which attacked was not sighted at any time, owing partly to weather conditions, and the officers of the Siamese Prince were unable to say whether the ship was pursued. The hostlers included a great many Americans.

Noted Writer Pictures Conditions in That Unhappy Country-Thousands Have Been Deported by the Brutal Huns-Germany Can No Longer Rank as a Civilized Nation.

LONDON, Nov. 21 .- Emile Cammaerts, the Belgian writer, writes as follows in the Observer: "As I write these lines the slave raids are going on; the tramp of soldiers is heard through Belgian towns and villages, and women, children and men are kidnapped right and left. It is terrible.

'Trains roll through Germany packed with human cattle. These things have been going on since October, 1915. Ten days ago 15,000 had been taken in Flanders alone. How many are there now? Between 20,000 and 30,000. If things are allowed to go on at this rate we shall witness the wholesale deportation of an entire people reduced to slavery.

This indeed is a disaster worse than invasion, worse than the retreat from Antwerp, worse than the wholesale massacres of Louvain, Tamines and Ennewdina, worse even than the ceaseless persecutions of the last two years. What is Belgium's answer to this niew crime?
