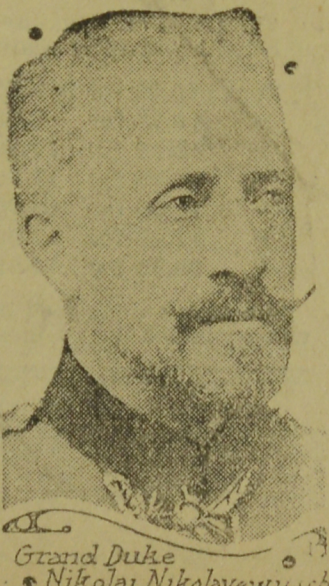

## DUKE MAKES FIRST PUBLIC APPEARANCE

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, made his first public appearance today, when he inspected the 202nd Overseas Battalion, of Edmonton, commanded by Lieut. Colonel Bowen.

The Governor General was attended by Sir George Foster, F. B. McCurdy, M. P., Hon. T. W. Crothers, and Gen. Sam Hughes in mufti.

"This is the first opportunity," said His Excellency, "that I have had of inspecting a Canadian battalion, and I am pleased to state that I find the regiment to be fit to take its place with the best of those in the trenches."

Paris, Nov. 21.—Troops of the Allies are pressing the German-Bulgarian rear guard detachments to the north of Monastir, according to the official announcement on the progress of hostilities, according to the War Department today.

## California's Vote Will Not be Split

San Francisco, Nov. 21.—Little likelihood of a split electoral vote in California was seen here today by Republicans who have checked the unofficial election figures of fifty of the state's fifty-eight counties. The eight missing counties, although they include the most populous in the state, will not develop any serious discrepancies, according to some of the party leaders who say they have closely followed the trend of the canvass being made by the various county officials.

President Wilson's plurality, according to the check of the Republican's, will be not less than 3,416. These figures, it was stated, did not take into consideration the total from the eight counties whose returns are yet to be filed with the Secretary of State.

## TO INSPIRE RECRUITING BY NEW SYSTEM

Toronto, Nov. 21.—A new system which aims to inspire recruiting in the military district and which has for its principle the dividing of the district into sections, from which to draw reinforcements recruits for the battalions already at the front, will shortly be recommended to the Military Council at Ottawa by some of the prominent military authorities at Camp headquarters.

The idea is an enlargement of the system suggested from Ottawa a few days ago, in which it was indicated that the present method of allotting battalions to popular men will be discontinued, and that further battalions will be raised rather as in reinforcement centres.

The suggestion is that this military district be divided into the same number of sections as there are battalions at the front from the same area, and each district be called upon to furnish the number of recruits required from time to time to keep that battalion up to strength.

## GERMAN POSITIONS HEAVILY SHELLED

Berlin, Nov. 21 (by wireless to Sayville).—The German positions on both sides of the Ancre and in St. Pierre-Vaast wood were shelled heavily by the Allies yesterday, the War Office announced.

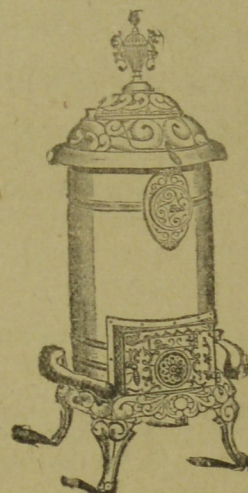
