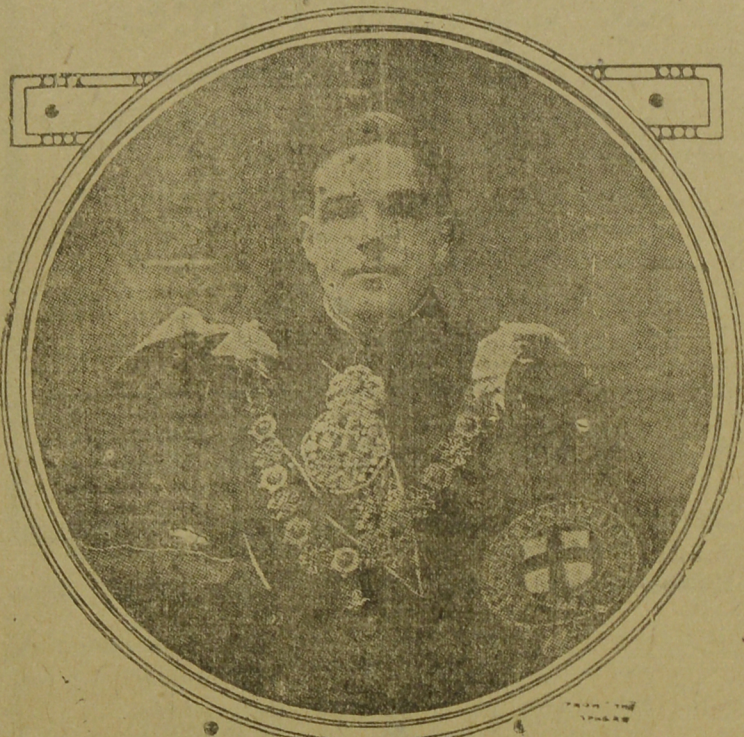


PORTUGAL IS NOW FORMALLY AT WAR WITH GERMANY

Paris, April 6.—It is reported from London, that now that Portugal is formally at war with Germany, King Manuel of Portugal has asked for a commission in the English army, and that he will be divorced very soon from his wife, formerly the Princess Augustine Victoria of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen.

It is no secret that there has never been great cordiality in the ex-royal menage. On the very morning of the marriage the Princess left the king and began to talk of divorce. Since the war, the truce has been a strained one. Manuel has not dissimulated his sympathy for the Allies while the Princess has declared her self more Hohenzollern and more Prussian than the Kaiser.

CONCERNING COOKS.

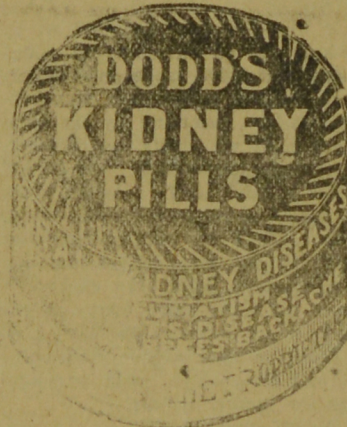
You may have heard of Constantine,

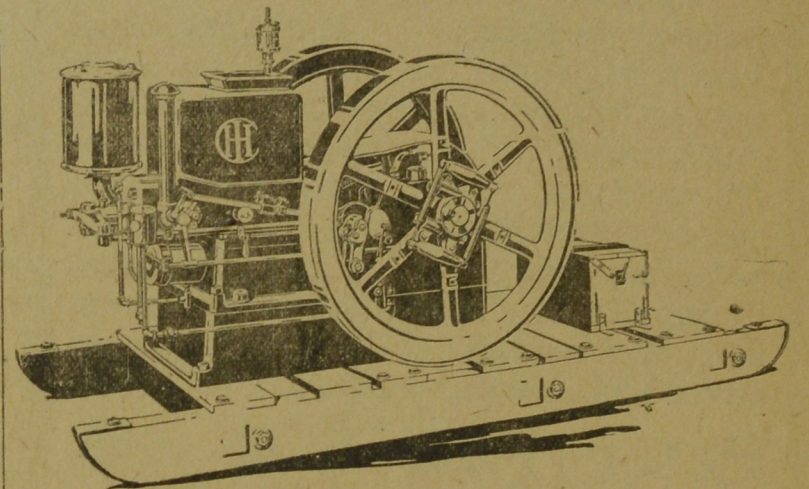
