MADE-IN-CANADA RECIPES FOR PUDDINGS AND CAKES

Timely for the Present Season, When
Fresh Fruits are Almost Out of the
Question.

A Caramel Charlotte.

A caramel charlotte which will make
a very dainty dessert is simply made.
Brown a cup of brown sugar to the
caramel stage and pour over it a cup
of boiling water; stir till dissolved.
Soak half a box of gelatine in a cup of
cold water and when dissolved add a
cup of granulated sugar; mix with the
caramel and set away to chill. When
the jelly begins to congeal, add a tea-
spoon of vanilla and the whites of
three eggs beaten to a stiff froth.
Whip all together and pour into a wet
mold, then chill thoroughly. If desired
a cup of chopped nut meats may be
added. Serve with whipped cream.

Fruit Pudding.

Chop one-half a cup of suet fine
and add a generous sprinkle of salt
and a tiny sprinkle of white pepper.
Add a cup of brown sugar, a cup of
sweet milk, half a cup of dry bread
crumbs, one cup of flour, a heaping
teaspoon of baking powder and a half
cup each of chopped walnuts, seeded
raisins and candied ginger, also chop-
ped. Sift the flour and baking powder
together several times, stir in the
fruit, suet, crumbs and milk and pour
into a mold. Steam three and a half
hours. Serve with hard sauce or car-
amel sauce.

Date Cake.

Cream together one-half cup of but-
ter and one cup of sugar, then add the
yolks of two eggs, well beaten, and
two cups of flour, alternately with
half a cup of hot water, in which a
scant teaspoon of soda has been stir-
red. Stone and chop coarsely half a
pound of dates and add to the cake
also a cup of chopped English walnut
meats. Lastly, fold in the whites of
eggs, stiffly whipped. Bake in a loaf
for one hour. Ice with chocolate
icing.

Canadian Fruit Cake.

Cream two tablespoons of butter
with a cup of sugar and add two well
beaten eggs. Sift two level teaspoons
of baking powder with a cup and a
half of flour and a pinch of salt. Add
to the cake batter alternately with
one-fourth of a cup of milk. Blanch
one-fourth pound of almonds and add
to the cake after chopping coarsely,
also one-fourth pound of English wal-
nut meats, one pound of dates and
one-fourth pound of candied cherries
rinsed, dried and slightly chopped.
Flour the fruit and dates before add-
ing to the cake. Bake an hour and
twenty minutes in a moderate oven.

SUBSTANTIALS FOR LUNCHEON.

Eggs are tiresome if served scram-
bled or fried very often. Try them
in the way suggested below. A few
eggs will go a long way if this recipe
is used, and the eggs will taste better
than if served in one of the old fa-
miliar ways.

Egg Toast.

Toast stale bread, leaving the crust
on; butter the slices thinly and moist-
en them with boiling water. Now boil
six eggs hard, separate the yolks from
the whites, chop the whites and press
the yolks through a sieve or colander.
Make a little white sauce by using

one tablespoonful of butter and flour
cooked together, to which add a cup-
ful of cream or rich milk. When it is
well thickened add the chopped whites
and season with salt and pepper; see
that the sauce is thoroughly cooked.
It should take about twenty or thirty
minutes, as if underdone, white sauce
tastes too much like what the paper-
hangers are using to stick the wall-
paper on with. Spread this mixture
on the slices of toast and cover the
top with the mashed yolks. Should
be served steaming hot. Is very dis-
tasteful and nourishing.

Baked Hash.

To those who do not like egg, baked
hash might appeal.

Chop meat fine or put through the
grinder. Mince three medium sized
onions and add equal quantity of po-
tato. Butter a large bread tin and lay
strips of fat pork across top. Bake
until a nice brown.

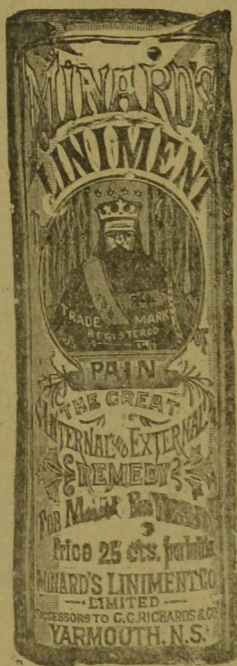
