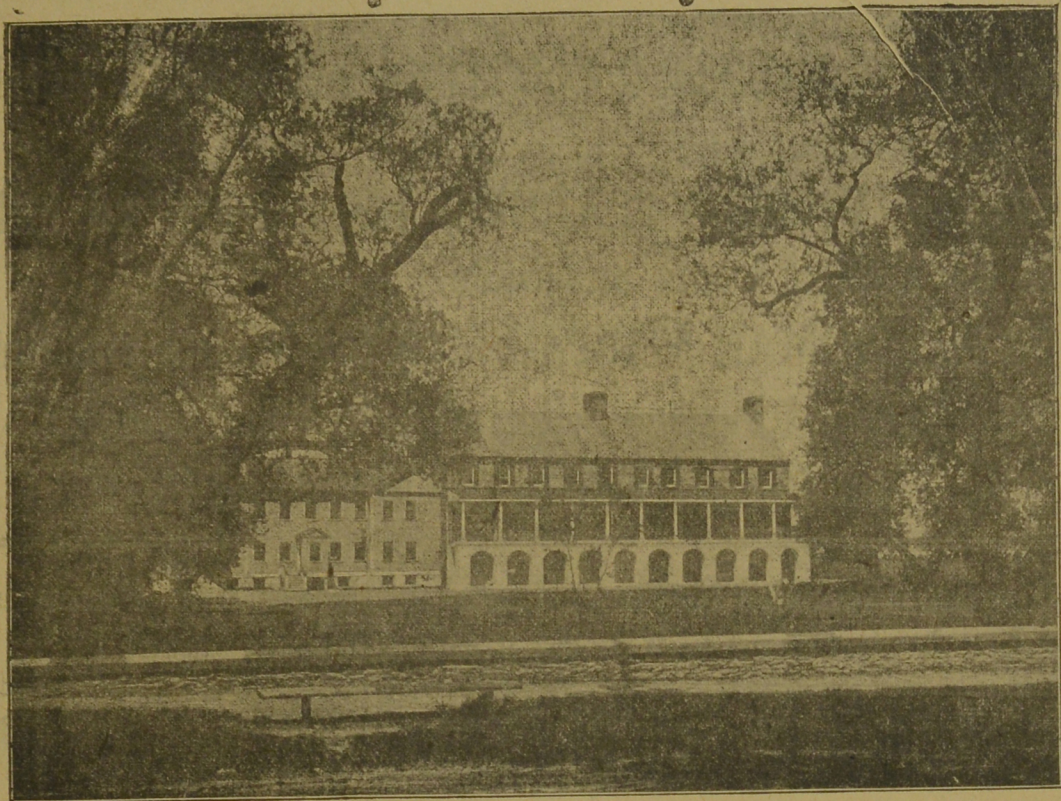

WANTS TO TRADE
WITH UNITED STATES

Premier of Queensland Thinks There Will be Big Business After The War.

New York, July 17.—Thomas J. Ryan, Premier of Queensland, who has just arrived in New York, on his way home to the antipodes, said that during his stay in England he had opportunities of seeing the fleet and the Australians on the western front, where he addressed his countrymen while the shells whistled overhead.

"One of the warships I saw," Mr. Ryan continued, "was the battle cruiser Warspite, which the Germans claim to have sunk. She was battle scarred, but ready for another action with the enemy."

"I am greatly interested in developing trade between Australia and America. After the war there should be a great increase in exports of wool and meat from Queensland."

"At present there is no direct steamship line between San Francisco and Brisbane, the principal port, but if the Oceanic Steamship Co. makes it a port of call, a fine trade will be developed."

The Premier intends going into the matter when he reaches San Francisco.

WILL BE NO PATROL
OF U. S. WARSHIPS

Secretary Daniels Does Not Think Allies Will Commit Breach Of Faith.

Washington, July 17.—There will be no patrol of American warships off the Virginia coast to see that the Allied cruisers awaiting the reappearance of the German merchant submarine Deutschland stay outside of the three mile limit.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels said today that the United States assumed that its territories would not be violated by the Allied men of war, and had no fear that the underwater merchantman would be attacked before she reached the high seas.

So far as can be learned, the Washington government has not been notified of the Deutschland's probable sailing date.

It is believed that she will drop down from Baltimore to some cove in Chesapeake Bay, and from there will slip out to sea on the first favorable dark night.

Will Sail Soon.

Baltimore, Md., July 17.—Announcement was made today that after tomorrow no visitors would be allowed on board the German merchant submarine Deutschland. It was taken as an indication that the underwater liner will leave Baltimore before the middle of the week, but no information could be obtained from the official who made the announcement about visitors.

MR. E. S. CARTER'S SON
IN BIG OFFENSIVE

Arthur an Officer in a British Regiment, Sends Cable Message To Parents.

(St. John Telegraph.) Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Carter, of Fairvale, were relieved from much anxiety Thursday by a cable message from their elder son, Arthur, an officer in the York and Lancaster English regiment, which read, "Safe and resting."

The message was dated from Hythe, England, where Mr. Carter has warm friends. In his letters home Lieutenant Carter has frequently described scenes and places, without naming them, which since the British drive have been pictured by Philip Gibbs in his graphic stories from the front, as published in the Telegraph.

This and the report from the War Office indicating severe losses in many English regiments, among which the York and Lancaster was numbered, made Mr. and Mrs. Carter very anxious, a condition which has happily been relieved by the brief cable quoted above.

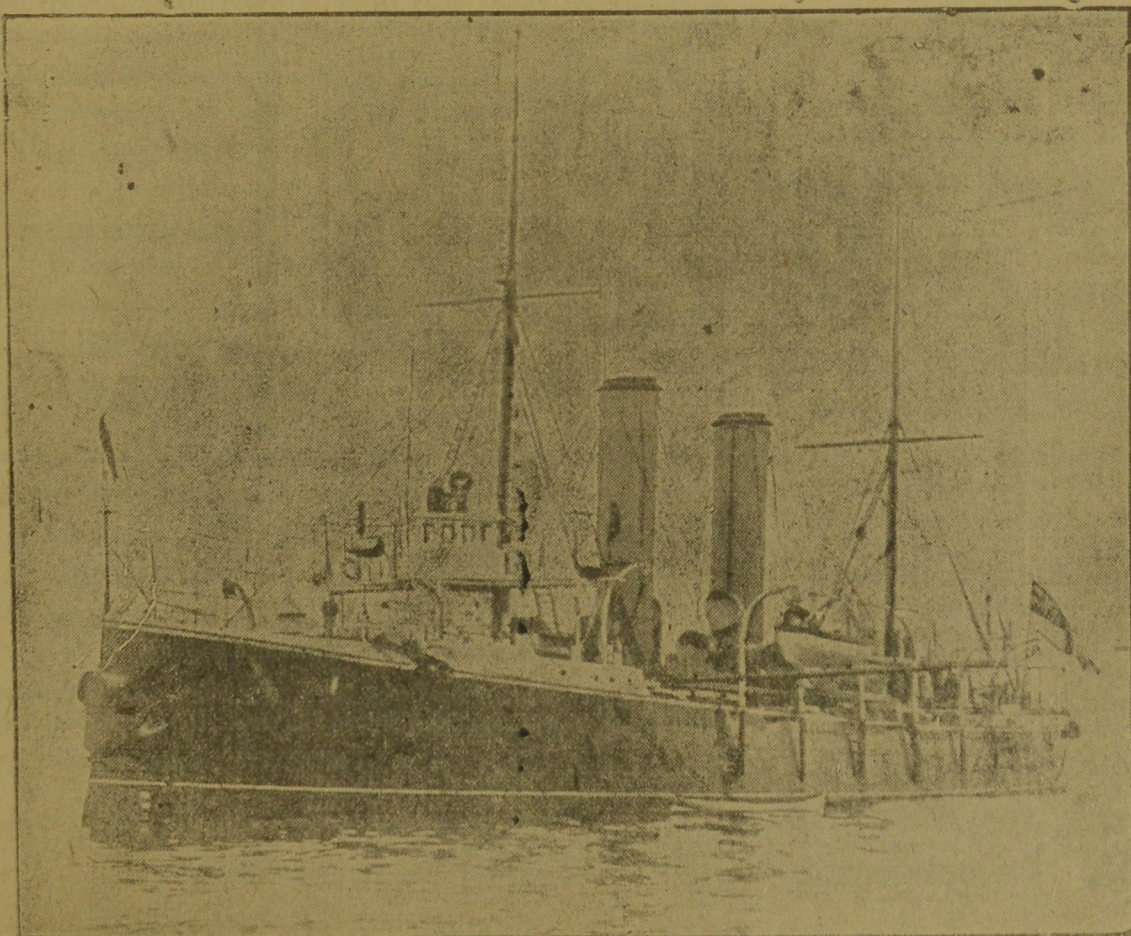
