JAMES ROBERTS APPOINTED SERVER OF TAX-NOTICES

Mayor Mitchell and Ald. Baxter Opposed Appointment on Ground of Economy--New Official Appointed on Recommendation of Finance Com.

Mr. James Roberts was appointed to deliver the tax notices by the City Council last night at a salary of \$75.

Mr. H. C. Rutter, collector of taxes, heretofore has performed that duty, but owing to the fact that a considerable amount of taxes is in arrears, extra efforts are being made to collect them, Mr. Rutter devoting his attention to that.

The notices for the assessment of 1916-17 must be issued at once, and the Financial Committee, to facilitate both operations, recommended the appointment of an extra official to serve the notices.

Although this recommendation was endorsed by the City Council, it was not unopposed. His Worship Mayor Mitchell and Ald. Baxter both stated that they were against the added expenditure of \$75, which they said was unnecessary, as arrangements had been made whereby Mr. Rutter could do the work. The other aldermen took the ground that the recommendation of the Finance Committee should be endorsed, as that body had the best knowledge of the situation.

Those present at the meeting were Mayor Mitchell, Ald. Wilkinson, Ald. Walker, Ald. Everett, Ald. Shea, Ald. Baxter and Ald. Barker.

Ald. Wilkinson's Motion.

Ald. Wilkinson, seconded by Ald. Barker, moved that James Roberts be server of tax notices at a salary of \$75 per month. In making the motion Ald. Wilson explained that he acted

for Ald. Reid, chairman of the Finance Committee, who was unable to be present. Ald. Reid had given the matter careful consideration and Ald. Wilkinson thought he should be backed by the Council. Ald. Reid had a greater grasp of the city's financial affairs than any other member of the Council, and in fact came pretty near being the whole Finance Committee.

Mayor Mitchell said that if the Finance Committee had considered this matter it was without his knowledge. He had been notified of no meeting. He had no desire to oppose Ald. Reid's opinion, but he certainly was against appointing an extra official when Mr. Rutter could just as well do the work.

A letter from Ald. Reid, recommending the appointment of James Roberts as server of tax notices, and stating that the Finance Committee had considered the matter, was read.

Ald. Walker and Ald. Shea said that the letter influenced them to support motion.

Ald. Baxter Opposes.

Ald. Baxter registered his decided opposition to the motion. He was not against James Roberts or any other man. What he was opposed to was hiring a man to do work another man was paid to do. It was just what was being done in other lines of civic business—one man was paid a salary and another man was paid to do his work.

The motion was carried, Ald. Baxter alone voting "nay."

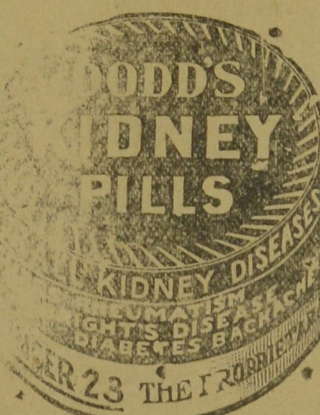
