DRUNKENNESS IS ON THE DECREASE IN FREDERICTON

The annual report of Chief of Police McCollom for the year ending December 31 last has been presented to the Police Commission. The report is as follows:
Office of Chief of Police,
Fredericton, N.B.,
January 1, 1916.

To the Chairman and Members of the Police Commission of the City of Fredericton.

Dear Sirs—As chief of police of this city, I beg leave to submit for your information this, my fourth annual report, covering the work and statistics of the Police Department for the year just closed. The general good order of the city during the year 1915 is a matter to which I allude with pleasure. There were stationed in the city during the year, over one thousand troops, which caused much more work for this department, but I am pleased to report that we have had very little trouble from them and on the whole we found them gentlemen, and I take this means to thank the officers and men for assistance rendered to us on different occasions.

On August 28, 1914, I was appointed registrar of alien enemies for this district, which also caused extra work and worry. At the present time I have one hundred and thirty-eight alien enemies, reservists and subjects in this district on parole and those men are reporting to me twice a month. During the year I ordered the internment of four alien enemies and they were taken to Amherst, N. S., where they will remain until after the war. This work is being carried out by the chief constables of Canada gratuitously and is our "bit" toward helping the empire in this, our war of freedom and righteousness.

THE EXHIBITION.

During the exhibition held in this city in September last, I acceded to the request of the management and took charge of the police there. This was done without remuneration and the work was carried out to the full satisfaction of the management.

We have had no serious crime in this city during the year, and outside crooks and thieves have given us the go-by.

You will find that the action of the police in attempting to put a stop to street walking is having a good effect and this offence is steadily on the decrease.

The changes made in the police court and chief's office were an improvement which is much appreciated by all having business at those places.

FEWER ARRESTS.

You will find that the arrests for the year are lower than in any year previous and that drunkenness in the city is still on the decrease although with all the troops, exhibition and celebrations which we have had in the city you will see that on the charge of drunkenness there were but 108 for the year 1915 as compared with 134 in the year 1914.

I also wish to take this means to thank the police magistrate, W. Limerick, for his kindness and assistance to this department during the year just closed.

During the past year the police have recovered three hundred and forty dollars' worth of stolen money, jewelry, clothing and other articles and restored them to the owners. All cases of breaking, entering and stealing have been satisfactorily cleaned up and the guilty parties brought to justice.

There were two convictions for

keeping disorderly houses in the city during 1915 and six inmates convicted.

There were forty-four cases from other places in Canada and the United States investigated by me in this city and reports made which were satisfactory to those concerned.

HEAVY CORRESPONDENCE.

Over four hundred letters and telegrams were received and answered by me during the year and I may say that all communications are answered promptly.

The calls for police by telephone from the city numbered eighty as compared with 138 in 1914 and were duly attended to by the police.

There were forty-five transient lodgers accommodated with a night's lodging against ninety-one in 1914.

During the year just closed there were 702 visits made by the police to houses which were vacated by the temporary absence of their occupants. Twelve persons were finger-printed by me during the year for different offenses and these prints sent to the Dominion Identification Bureau at Ottawa.

There were eighty-one doors and windows found open and secured by the police during the year and I wish to strongly impress upon the minds of the business people the necessity of having all bank and store doors carefully secured before leaving at night.

There were 228 reports from citizens during the year investigated privately by the police without causing unnecessary inconvenience or publication of the names of citizens, thus arranging difficulties satisfactorily to all concerned.

EIGHTEEN RAIDS.

There were eighteen raids for intoxicating liquors made by the police and a total of seventy-one barrels seized and destroyed.

Through the kindness of the Police Commission and Administration of tend the annual convention of Chief Justice Committee I was able to attend the annual convention of Chief Constables of Canada at Toronto, which I found educational from the opening to the close.

In conclusion, I must thank your honorable board for the courtesy shown to me and the advice and assistance given by you at all times and wishing you all the compliments of the season.

Several appendices accompanied the report and contain interesting statistics. The total number of arrests was 195, of which 108 were for drunkenness. Persons arrested were classified according to places of residence, as follows:
