MARITIME RACING CIRCUIT  
PROJECT LOOKS GOOD

Largely Attended Meeting at St. John Yesterday—  
Details to be Completed at Another Meeting in  
Moncton, February 15.

St. John, Jan. 22.—Some twenty horsemen from different parts of the Maritime Provinces met yesterday in the Dufferin Hotel, their object being to organize a Maritime racing circuit. The session was marked with the greatest enthusiasm and the outlook is very bright indeed for the consummation of the scheme which has thus been set on foot by the followers of the quick steppers.

The Fredericton representatives were W. B. Farrell, Hugh O'Neill, T. V. Monahan and Wm. Sherron. Campbellton racing interests were represented by Mr. Cormier; Moncton by Philo Belliveau; Halifax by R. H. Edwards; and St. John by Arthur E. Connor, H. J. Flemming, Thomas J. Dean and John Glynn. H. J. Flemming was appointed chairman of the meeting and W. B. Farrell secretary.

## GOOD PROSPECTS.

The representatives present reported that their towns were very eager to co-operate with other racing tracks for the formation of a racing circuit. It will be remembered by horsemen that a similar circuit was in operation some eight years ago and it was very successful. A large number of splendid American horses were imported into the country at that time and racing circles were materially benefitted as a result. The formation of such a racing circuit not only gives much additional sport to the horsemen in the province through which it is operative, but it adds greatly to the quality of the horses throughout the circuit.

## ANOTHER MEETING.

It was decided that another meeting would be held in Moncton on February 15 at which the final details of the circuit will be arranged, the dates of meeting and a regular schedule of events as well as the purses for the different events.

Those centres that have signified their intention of participating in the circuit are St. John, N.B.; Fredericton, N.B.; Houlton, Me.; St. Stephen, N.B.; Moncton, N.B.; Charlottetown, P.E.I.; New Glasgow, N.S., and Halifax, N.S.

A large number of new horses having splendid records have been purchased by horsemen of the Maritime Provinces at the last Old Glory sale at Madison Square Garden, New York and at the Chicago horse sale, consequently it is anticipated that some very good racing will be seen and that Maritime records will likely go by the board under conditions that are in any measure propitious.

GEORGE KENNEDY FINED  
ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS

fined George Kennedy of the Canadian President Quinn of the N.H.A., has fined \$100 for playing "Skene" Ronan at Quebec, and ordered the tie game replayed if the standings are affected at the end of the season. The Canadiens are only allowed two English-speaking players but in the Quebec game he used three, McNamara, Producers and Ronan. As a consequence of Ronan's actions here, Manager Livingstone has decided that the \$100 fine he inflicted upon Ronan for indifferent playing while he was here, would not be remitted.

JOE CONNOLLY SIGNS  
WITH BOSTON BRAVES

Woonsocket, R.I., Jan. 27.—Joe Connolly, outfielder of the Boston Nationals, who has led the team in batting for two years, sent today his signed contract for the 1916 season to the club's headquarters. Connolly was satisfied with the terms of the contract.

Connolly, who spends the winter at the Connolly farm at Sayles Hill, and who devotes much of his time to hunting and outdoor pleasures, is in fine condition and is ready to start training as soon as the order comes. He declared that his ankle, broken in 1914, is much stronger than it was last year and he expects to do better work this season.

CONNIE MACK WILL  
USE PLAYERS FROM  
COLLEGE AND "BACK LOTS"

Pins His Faith to Young

Worcester, Jan. 22.—Connie Mack, manager of the Athletics, was a visitor in Worcester today. He said that he pins faith in his success the coming season on his young players, who he would gather from the colleges and "back lots." He will not attempt to secure any Federal League players, nor other experienced diamond stars, simply trusting to the development of his youngsters.

Mr. Mack says he is not claiming any pennant for 1917 or any other time, but has the utmost confidence in the ultimate success of his system, with which he has built other great ball clubs. Mr. Mack paid tribute to Jack Barry of Worcester, formerly of his famous \$100,000 infield, and now with the Red Sox.

"The Sox could hardly have turned the pennant trick," said Mr. Mack, "without Barry and I was very glad to see him figure in the World's Series money. Barry was always loyal and faithful to me and is a great ball player."

HIGHLANDERS OFFER SEVEN  
THOUSAND TO BAKER

New York, Jan. 26.—J. Franklin Baker, formerly with the Philadelphia Athletics, will be offered a contract for one year at a salary of more than \$7500 for the season to play with the New York Americans in 1916. Capt. T. L. Huston, part owner of the Yankees, said today before his departure for Maryland, Capt. Huston went South on a hunting trip, intending also to meet Baker at the latter's farm at Trappe, Md.

To Introduce Resolution.

Meanwhile a resolution has been drafted looking to "the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor during the war and the constructive period of three years thereafter." This resolution will be introduced to the House by two members of Parliament, preferably one Conservative and one Liberal member, although doubt is expressed whether a Conservative member can be found who will act as the goat.

On the fate of this resolution opinion is about evenly divided. Will it gradually drift into the boneyard of adjourned debates? Or will it be voted on and passed? The movement for prohibition will probably be as near becoming a law of the land one way as the other.

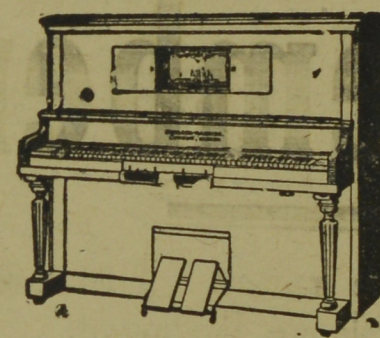
