DR. EATON TO HELP STRAIGHTEN THE WORLD'S PRESENT TANGLE

(New York Herald.)

Relinquishing a pastorate which pays the highest salary with one exception of any of the denominations in the United States, in order to "help straighten out the world's present tangle," the Rev. Dr. Chas. A. Eaton read his resignation as pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist Church Sunday morning.

The act came as a complete surprise to the congregation and there are rumors that it may not be accepted. After service scores of parishioners loitered and begged Dr. Eaton to reconsider his step.

Dr. Eaton came here seven years ago from the pastorate of the Euclid Avenue Baptist Church, Cleveland, O., of which John D. Rockefeller is a member. Dr. Eaton and Mr. Rockefeller are warm friends and have played golf together.

His Madison Avenue Work.

Since coming to New York Dr. Eaton has raised a \$300,000 endowment fund for this edifice that will enable it to stay anchored to its present site. He has lived all these years in Plainfield, N. J., where he has a big tract, which he farms and makes self-supporting. Some have felt he lived too

far from the church, but he always explained he did this for the health of his large family. He did the same in Cleveland.

The only other Baptist clergyman who receives as high a salary as Dr. Eaton is the Rev. Dr. Cornelius Woelfkin, of Fifth Avenue Baptist church. Each receives a salary of \$10,000.

Dr. Eaton told a reporter that the way in which he intended to "help straighten out the world's present tangle" was by writing, lecturing and by preaching throughout the country.

"I want to help to reduce the burden of war. I want to aid in getting more Christianity into the churches."

He said he felt he could do this better by laying down the administrative work of the Madison Avenue Church. He will have an office in New York.

"With me it is the duty of helping all I can the other workers of the world to straighten out the awful tangle caused by the European war," said Dr. Eaton. The resignation of Dr. Eaton is to take effect Feb. 29.

From his pulpit Dr. Eaton said his resolve to resign was due to a desire to participate in the sharing of "the new Americanism, the new era of Christianity which must inevitably follow the European war."

BRITISH SHIP HELD UP BY FRENCH CRUISER

(Canadian Press.)

New York, Feb. 9.—Capt. Mitchell of the British freighter Canadian, which arrived here today, confirmed the story brought some days ago by the steamer Guiana of the holding up of the Canadian of Martinique by the French cruiser Descartes.

Capt. Mitchell said five shots were fired at his vessel by the cruiser, two of which struck the pilot house. The Canadian is built something on the lines of a torpedo boat and Capt. Mitchell said he believed the Descartes mistook her for an enemy warship.

After an officer from the cruiser had examined his papers, he was allowed to proceed.

COL. J. P. McPHERSON HAS PASSED AWAY

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 9.—The death occurred here this morning of Lieut. Col. J. Pennington McPherson, former commanding officer of the Governor General's Foot Guards, Fenian Raid veteran and retired member of the service, deceased, who was a nephew of the late Sir John MacDonal, was born at Kingston May 29, 1839, and was admitted to the bar in 1861, practising at Coburg and at Ottawa.

He was the author of a Life of Sir John A. MacDonald and a series of articles on reciprocity, past, present and future, published in 1911, when he took the platform against the Taft-Fielding proposal.

Five Sticks Of Dynamite Found Here Saturday

Five sticks of dynamite were found on Saturday last in a building in this city by Chief of Police McCollom. The chief of police placed the dynamite under the care of J. S. Neill & Sons Limited, for safe keeping.

Chief McCollom declined to discuss the matter this morning, stating that he was not in a position to give any information beyond the fact that the dynamite was found and should not have been in the building in which it was found.

The matter was reported to the Police Commission on Sunday and Mayor Mitchell was shown the dynamite sticks at the same time.

English Miners Against Conscription

Lancaster, Eng., Feb. 9.—At the miners conference here the following resolution was adopted:

"The conference expresses its opposition to the spirit of conscription and determines to exercise vigilant scrutiny of any proposed extension of the military service act."

NEW YORK JEWELERS GO OUT ON STRIKE

New York, Feb. 9.—A general strike of the jewelry workers in New York city was called at a meeting early today, attended by more than 1,000 members of the union. The jewelers demand an eight-hour day. They are all highly paid workers.

INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION.

The International Commission is in session at the parliament buildings. This session probably will be the last as the report is nearing completion. Those in attendance are Mr. Peter C. Keegan of Van Buren, Mr. M. G. Teed, K.C., of St. John; Mr. A. J. Gregory, K.C., of Fredericton; Mr. W. B. Jones, K.C., of Woodstock; Mr. John B. Madigan of Houlton, Mr. O. F. Fellows of Bangor. Mr. Madigan recently was appointed judge of the Maine Supreme Court.

RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.

Mr. P. F. Blanchet of St. John, has resigned from the office of the commissioners for settling Valley Railway claims and his resignation has been accepted. Mr. Blanchet succeeded Mr. W. M. Dunlop of Ottawa, in that office.

MAKES ASSIGNMENT.

Alfred E. Shaw of Newcastle, merchant, has made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors. Sheriff John O'Brien is assignee.

Convicted Of Murdering Wife

Boston, Feb. 9.—Oscar F. Russ, a painter, was convicted today of murder in the second degree for killing his wife, Emily Russ, at their home in the Roxbury district on August 23, 1915. The jury had deliberated for twenty-three hours. Russ claimed that the woman committed suicide by cutting her throat.

Extra Guards On Montreal City Hall

Montreal, Feb. 9.—Mayor Mederic Martin, of Montreal, is not taking any chances with German secret agents or blackhanders, and that is why the City Hall this morning resembled more a fortress than an abode of legislators. The Mayor said he had received a warning that the city hall was to be burned at 12.30 o'clock.

His Worship immediately got busy and called out police reserves and a large section of the fire department, and posted them on every floor of the building. New hose was attached to the standpipes, the chemical fire extinguishers recharged, valuable papers locked in vaults and employees warned. The fatal hour passed with "nothing doing." However, the extra guards are still on duty and will remain until further notice.

COMMERCE RAIDER REPORTED CAUGHT.

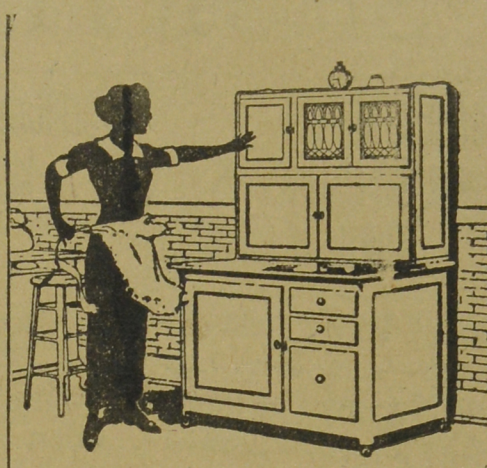

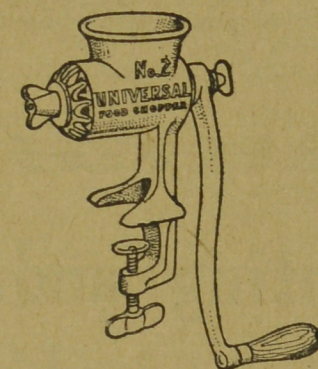
