### ORANGEMEN ENTERTAIN THE BOYS IN KHAKI

Very Pleasant Function at the Orange Hall Last Evening-- Patriotic Speech by Judge Wilson.

The different Orange Associations entertained their brother Orangemen in khaki stationed here with the various military units last evening. It was one of the best social functions held here for some time and a thoroughly enjoyable evening was spent, during which a short program was carried out. His Honor Judge Wilson was the principal speaker and his usual good humor, coupled with his strong appeal and patriotic utterances, made a great impression on his audience. He dealt with the foundation of the Orange Association and called upon his hearers in khaki as well as out of khaki to make the necessary sacrifice to accomplish the great and almost overwhelming task now confronting the great British empire and the nations associated with her in the common purpose—the destruction of German militarism and the blotting it forever from the earth.

He said that not only were the Orangemen fighting for the civilization of the world but their own Canadian homes and the principles upon which the great Orange association rested its foundation. He called upon his hearers to make sacrifice similar to the founder of the Order, William, Prince of Orange, and His Honor prophesied that if it was done, Great Britain and her allies would reach their goal.

Mr. E. C. Atkinson was chairman of the committee in charge and presided at the function. He gave a brief address of welcome on behalf of the Orange orders to the visitors and guests.

### FRANK McMANIMAN SEEING HARD FIGHTING

Word was received last night by Mr. Edward McManiman, of this city, from his son, Private Frank McManiman, of the Dorset Regiment, who has been fighting for several months with the British Expeditionary Force in Greece. The letter from Private McManiman stated that he still was attached to the Munster Fusiliers and had seen much fighting. At the time of writing he was going again into the trenches, presumably at Saloniki, the letter being written from "somewhere in Greece." Private McManiman writes that the weather was cold and the troops insufficiently clothed. There had been one snowfall, two feet in depth. The mail service to the troops in Greece is disorganized. Since leaving France, where he was wounded while fighting with the Dorsets, Private McManiman has received no letters from his home in this city.

#### LEFT FOR HIS HOME.

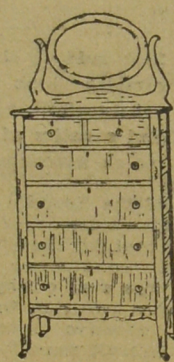
