INTOXICATING LIQUOR BILL BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE

The Legislature held its first morning sitting today, which is a sign that prorogation is in sight. Nearly the whole time was given over to consideration in committee of the Intoxicating Liquor Act.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said he thought the committee would make most speed in considering the bill by leaving to one side all those sections which needed amendment, or upon which any difference of opinion existed.

A question had been raised with regard to the issue of wholesale licenses that the number of wholesale dealers was so few that some districts might be considerably inconvenienced by reason of there being no wholesaler handy and the suggestion had been made that where necessary a wholesale license might be granted to persons who were not ordinarily in the liquor business and the question also of the quantity to be allowed to a country medical practitioner had been raised.

Another question had arisen as to the meaning of the words "private dwelling house." The definition in the bill was copied from the Manitoba Act, but the Ontario Act was somewhat different, and it might be desirable to adopt the Ontario form. There would appear to be some doubt under the section as to whether a self-contained apartment in a properly built apartment house could come under the description of private dwelling house contained in the bill.

The Ontario law provides for this condition of affairs, by allowing such an apartment to be classed as a private dwelling. It might be desirable, therefore, to let that section stand.

Mr. Carter said that he noticed the bill only provided that persons who had been guilty of offence against the Act should be debarred from obtaining a license. Did that mean that a person who had been convicted under the Scott Act would nevertheless be eligible.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said his attention had been drawn to the point raised by the hon. member and it was proposed to amend the section accordingly.

Mr. Carter asked if, on the application to the chief inspector for a license, if his decision was final without any appeal.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said that was the intention of the bill, for if the right to appeal from the chief inspector was once allowed that official's usefulness would be ended. His idea of the man for the chief inspector was that he should be an autocrat possessed of a vast amount of common sense. Such an official might be somewhat difficult to find, he would admit. At the same time, if the system of allowing an appeal was once admitted, his position would be almost valueless.

After some further discussion, the non-contentious sections were passed and the House adjourned.

with the scheme and has obtained the concurrence of the treasury to the following principles:

First, the scheme of assistance will apply to all men who joined the forces since the 4th of August, 1914, or who may join hereafter, and to single as well as married men.

Second, the items in respect of which assistance will be granted include rent (ground rent and rent of business premises), mortgage interest, payments of instalments in virtue of contracts, such as purchase of premises, business or furniture, taxes, rates, insurance premiums and school fees. Relief will not be given for the purpose of enabling any person to discharge such liabilities as ordinary debts to tradesmen.

Third, it is not contemplated that assistance to be granted in any individual case should exceed £104 per annum.

Fourth, persons desiring relief will be required to make application in prescribed form.

Fifth, these applications will be investigated locally by commissioners, who will be barristers especially appointed for the purpose. The commissioners will make recommendations to a central committee, who will be authorized to make grants.

A debate arose in which the following took part: Sir Edward Carson, Sir John A. Simon, Mr. Wardle, Norville Holme, Ellis J. Griffith, Andrew Bonar Law, Sir Henry Dalzell, Capt. Amery, Sir Ivor Herbert, Mr. Sherwell, Mr. Billing, Mr. King, Mr. Morrell, Sir M. Sykes, Sir Arthur Markham and Col. Churchill. The debate lapsed at 11 o'clock.

Tomorrow's sitting of the House will be held under the same conditions as today's.

SWEDISH OFFICERS ARRESTED.

LONDON, April 26.—The arrest of four Swedish officers in Persia is reported in an Exchange telegraph despatch from Copenhagen. It is said Colonels Killander and Fozelius and Captains Angman and Erickson have been made prisoners by Russians near Shiraz.

AMERICANS LEAVE GERMANY.

GENEVA, via Paris, April 26.—An exodus of Americans from Germany has begun. A number of them already have arrived at Basel. They are convinced that a rupture between Germany and the United States is inevitable.

Berlin Electors to Decide Question

Berlin, Ont., April 26.—The Berlin City Council last evening, at a special meeting, unanimously decided to submit the question of changing the name of the city, to the electors, as was provided for in the special act passed by the Legislature last week. The date agreed upon was Friday, May 19. The council received a petition signed by a number of the manufacturers and business men of the city, asking the council to defer taking a vote but the majority of the council thought the delay would only increase the agitation not only in the city but throughout the district.

To Investigate Corrupt Practices

Victoria, B. C., April 26.—Legislative investigation into charges "made in the public press and otherwise" of corrupt practices during the recent election campaign in Vancouver, will begin Friday or early next week, on motion of Premier Bowser yesterday.

Mr. George W. Peck, former Governor of Wisconsin, and author of Peck's Bad Boy, is dead, aged seventy-six.

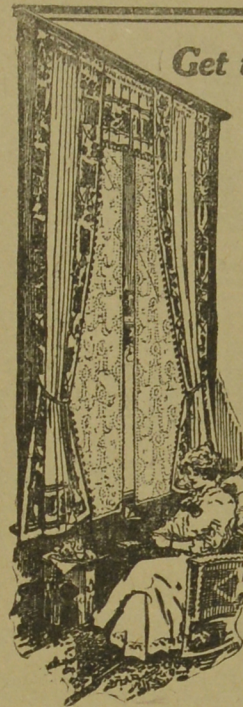
Martial Law Pro- claimed in Dublin

London, April 26.—Martial law has been proclaimed in the city and the county of Dublin, it was announced in the House of Commons. Troops have arrived at Dublin from Belfast and England.

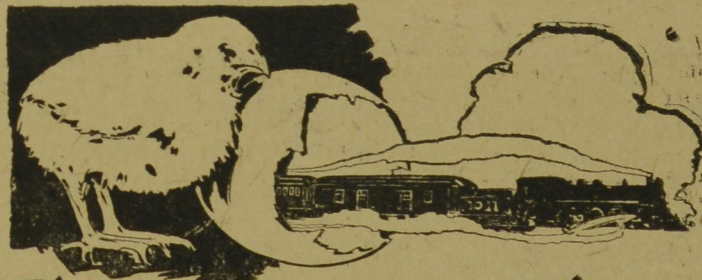

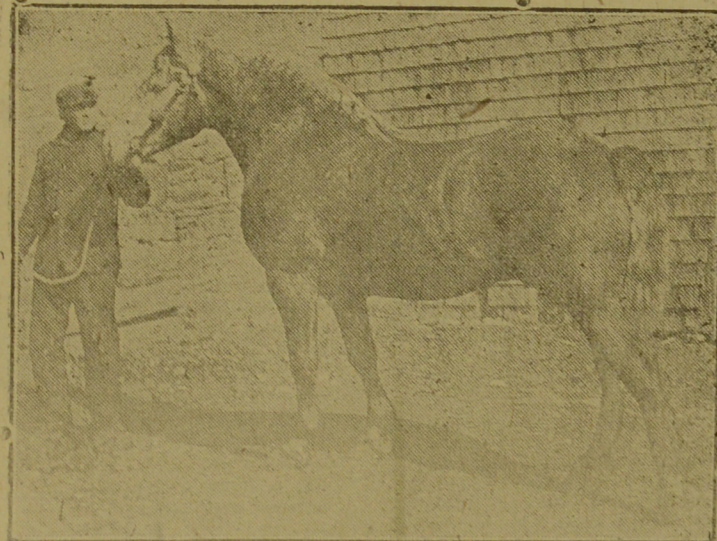
