## FIRES IN NORTHERN ONTARIO QUENCHED BY RAINS

Latest Reports Are of an Encouraging Nature---Seven Towns Wiped Out by The Flames---Loss of Life Now Estimated at 184---Sufferers Tell Harrowing Tales.

Toronto, July 31.—A message received by the Department of Mines and Forests at the Parliament Buildings, states that the fires in Northern Ontario have been entirely quenched by heavy rains. All fires are out.

North Bay, Ont., July 31.—Once again the north country is called upon to mourn the loss of the lives of many of its inhabitants. A duplication of the Porcupine fire, which occurred on July 11th, 1914, started on Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock at Mushak, a station 36 miles south of Cochrane, and spread with great rapidity over an entire area of one hundred miles, wiping out the towns of Porquis Junction, Iroquois Falls, Kelso, Nushka, Matheson, Ramore and Cochrane, and causing a total loss of life of one hundred and eighty-four.

Many Homes Destroyed.  
Between Matheson and Cochrane there is not a house standing. On Sunday a correspondent visited the scene

of devastation. The fire was still raging with an awful intensity and the heat was simply appalling. Train load after trainload of refugees were rushed to New Liskeard and Haileybury. Over twenty doctors and as many nurses are being kept busy attending to the injuries of the afflicted.

Telegraph and telephone communication is simply nil from Burke's, on the T. & N. O., to Hearst, on the Transcontinental, a distance of 100 miles.

Bush Fires Responsible.  
The origin of the calamity was bush fires, and owing to the dry condition of the woods and the high wind blowing at the time, the fire spread with awful intensity.

Two train loads of fire sufferers were brought to New Liskeard this morning and the harrowing tales of the sufferers brought tears to many eyes.

Many little children lost their lives, which is the saddest feature of the catastrophe.

## Wants Government To Disclose Plan

The Irish question was again brought to the front in parliament today by the motion introduced by Mr. John Dillon, urging the government to disclose its plan for the government of Ireland during the war.

It is expected that Premier Asquith will announce his plans for a temporary Irish executive. He has promised Timothy Healy that he would deal with the question of vacant offices of the Lord Lieutenant and Chief Secretary and kindred matters, on Mr. Dillon's motion. There is a report that Lord Wimborne may resume the Lord Lieutenancy, with a Unionist appointed as temporary Chief Secretary. Sir Mark Sykes, a Catholic member of parliament is mentioned for the latter office.

Sofia, July 31.—The first train load of Turkish soldiers passed through the Bulgarian capital today, bound for the Galician front. Despatches from Switzerland Saturday said that a Turkish army estimated at 70,000 strong was being concentrated on the Hungarian plans against a Russian invasion.

## Black Diphtheria At London Ont.

London, Ont., July 31.—With thermometer around the 100 mark, the health authorities are fighting one of the worst epidemics the authorities of the city ever had to contend with.

Sixteen cases of a particularly malignant type of black diphtheria, the patients in every case being children, have been isolated. Many are very critically ill, being greatly affected by the heat.
