CHARGED WITH MURDER- ING FATHER-IN-LAW

Arsenic Found in Stomach of Grand Rapids Millionaire--Suspect Took Poison.

New York, March 23.—District Attorney Swann ordered the arrest today of Dr. Arthur Warren Wait, son-in-law of John E. Peck, a millionaire drug dealer of Grand Rapids, Mich., whose death and also that of his wife have recently been under investigation. Two autopsies were performed in Grand Rapids after the body of Mr. Peck had been exhumed, and arsenic was discovered in the stomach and intestines.

The body of Mrs. Peck could not be examined because it had been cremated. Mr. Peck left an estate valued at more than \$1,000,000, divided equally between his daughter, Mrs. Wait, and his son, Percy Peck, of Grand Rapids.

Took an Opiate.

New York, March 23.—Detectives sent today to arrest Dr. Arthur Warren Wait in connection with the death of John E. Peck, millionaire druggist of Grand Rapids, Mich., found him in a condition of stupor as a result of an opiate, self-administered. Physicians at noon today were working on him to save his life.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING FOR SOLDIERS

Thirteen Hundred Back From the Front Now in Convalescent Homes.

Ottawa, March 23.—The military hospitals commission now has 1,300 returned soldiers in its convalescent homes and hospitals, mostly men who were wounded in the fighting of last spring. Believing that prolonged idleness is not conducive to their welfare, the commission is arranging for vocational training in the homes and hospitals. At the Savard Park home, in Quebec, equipment for vocational training is being installed, and a collection of toys from the Lord Roberts memorial workshops in London has been placed at the disposal of the men to be copied.

Tickets For Big Fight In Great Demand

New York, March 23.—The box office at Madison Square Garden was besieged early today by a crowd of several hundred persons, when the \$3 and \$5 tickets were placed on sale for the big fight.

Many of them had been standing in line since midnight bringing their breakfast with them. A number of those in line waiting for the sale of seats to open this morning were women, who came well fitted with heavy clothing to withstand the cold of the early morning.

The ticket sellers said they only had 2,000 of the lower priced seats to sell, but could have disposed of 20,000. Only two tickets were sold to a person in an effort to keep the pasteboards out of the hands of speculators, the officials said.

Halifax Will Be Dry After June 30

Halifax, N. S., March 23.—With only three votes against it, those of the members for Halifax, the prohibition bill passed through the committee of the whole House in the House of Assembly yesterday afternoon, and was reported for its third reading this afternoon, after which it will be sent to the Legislative Council. The bill will go into effect on June 30, 1916, and will bring Halifax under the N. S. Temperance Act.

To Stop The Im- portation Of Hops

London, March 23.—Walter Runciman, president of the Board of Trade, announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that the British Government was contemplating the prohibition of the importation of hops.

SAYS RUSSIANS HAVE NOT ADVANCED
