

DR. MOOREHOUSE, M.P.P. REPLIES TO CRITICISM

Tells Why He Was Absent From the House When Col. Guthrie Was Speaking.

In the Legislature on Wednesday Dr. Moorehouse of York rose to a question of privilege. A day or two ago an editorial article appeared in the *Fredericton Gleaner* which reflected upon himself and Mr. Pinder. The article spoke in high praise of Lieut. Colonel Guthrie, with every word of which he (Morehouse) was in thorough sympathy, and he wished he could add to what was said in that respect; but he failed to see why himself and Mr. Pinder should be singled out from a dozen or more members of the House who were not present at the time that Col. Guthrie made his speech, for censure for their absence. It seemed to him to be a puerile and senseless attempt to create trouble and disorder, and was like ripping off the scab of an old sore—which he considered was an entirely uncalculated for operation. He would like to explain to the House why he was absent at the time. A young man who had enlisted and is now with one of the local battalions, was taken ill and instead of being looked after by the local military medical authorities, was sent to his home, which happened to be near where he (Morehouse) also lived. It developed that the soldier was suffering from pneumonia, and his case was serious. The military medical officers here said they had no responsibility in the matter, and he (Dr. Morehouse) could look after the soldier or not, just as he liked. He happened to be in Fredericton, where he saw Lieut. Colonel Fowler, to whom he explained matters, and the Colonel promptly ordered the regular military doctor to attend to the man. Still Major Wainwright, the surgeon at this depot, refused to attend the man, and he (Morehouse) proceeded to attend him at the family's request. Major Wainwright was particular to tell him that he would not get any pay for it. Well, he (Morehouse) did not ask for any pay. Whatever good he had done the man, and he was glad to say that the man was now steadily improving, he was only glad to have been able to render, but what he would like to know was, why soldiers when once they have enlisted were not taken care of by their own military medical staff when they fall sick, just as readily as they would be if they had been shot in action. NO ACTION AGAINST GLOUCESTER BOODLERS

Stewart Allowed to Retain the Easy Money Secured From Farm Settlement Board

In the Legislature on Wednesday, Hon. Mr. Murray, in answer to Mr. Pelletier's inquiry:

1. Has the Department of Agriculture taken any steps to recover the sum of \$300 from A. J. H. Stewart, M. L. A., in connection with the sale to the Farm Settlement Board of the Knowles property in the county of Gloucester, and which transaction was investigated and reported upon as follows by Royal Commissioner W. B. Chandler:

"Mr. Stewart took advantage of the confidence reposed in him by the board and deliberately deceived the board as to the price for which the property could be obtained, and misrepresented the facts in order to make the 'take-off,' as it is called, for himself."

Answer—Purchase of the Knowles farm, in the county of Gloucester, was made by the Farm Settlement Board previous to its coming under the control of the Department of Agriculture. The price agreed upon by the Farm Settlement Board in payment for the property was \$1,500, for which good value was received. The Farm Settlement Board has lost nothing by the transaction. The property was resold on the basis of a \$1,500 valuation. The claim appears to be one of Mr. Knowles the former owner of the property, against Mr. Stewart or the Royal Bank of Canada, or both.

The Gloucester Boodlers.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey, in reply to Mr. Pelletier's inquiry:

1. What action does the Department of Public Works intend taking to recover the money paid for lumber not proved to have been delivered at the Caribou Creek bridge, and reported on as follows by Royal Commissioner Chandler: "I am not at all satisfied that this particular lot of fourteen pieces of timber ever went into the construction of the Caribou bridge, owing to the impossibility of getting any definite information from Docthe Chasson, the foreman?"

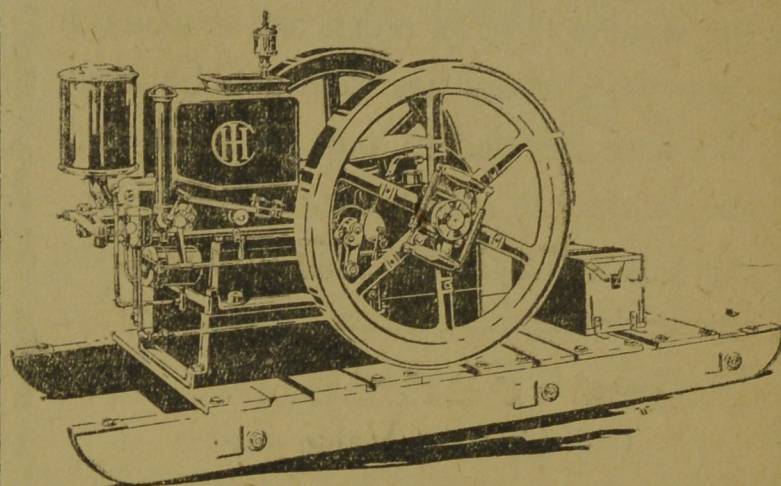
