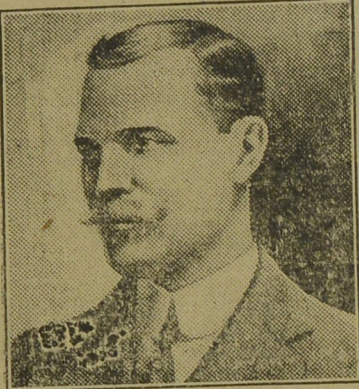

## "INTERNATIONAL INDUSTRIALISM" BURNS AMERICAN FLAG

New York, June 2.—An American flag and the colors of many other nations, were burned last night in a "melting pot" suspended on a tripod in the yard in the rear of Rev. Bouck White's "Church of the Social Revolution." The ceremony was conducted by Albert Henkel, introduced as "an artist." After the colors had been destroyed, Henkel unfolded the banner of "International Industrialism."

The flag burning was preceded by services in the church, at which one of the speakers was Rev. Mercer Green Johnston, rector of Trinity Protestant Episcopal Church at Newark, N. J., who recently resigned because, he said, some of his vestrymen wanted him to run his church "like a grocery store."

He strongly disapproved, however, of the flag burning part of the programme and tried vainly to induce White to prevent it. He then left the church, rather than witness what he characterized as "a most damnable business."

After the church services, at which prayer was offered by several young men, some of whom declared they were theological students, White announced that the congregation would adjourn to the rear yard and "witness the birth of International Industrialism."

## King's Message To Shackleton

London, June 2.—King George today sent the following cablegram to Lieut. Sir Ernest Shackleton, at the Falkland Islands:

"Rejoiced to hear of your safe arrival at the Falkland Islands. Trust men at Elephant Island may soon be rescued."

## FLAGRANT CORRUPTION IN WESTMORLAND ELECTION

Money Bribes Fell as Thick on Polling Day as the Leaves of Autumn, Says the Moncton Transcript—Purity Government Responsible for Disgraceful Orgy of Rum and Money.

The whole province should know what kind of a campaign the Government carried on in Westmorland on May 30. The Government that protested its innocence and complais of being slandered must be judged by what its agents did in this by-election. The Moncton Transcript, whose editor and proprietor was an active and valued participant in the fight, says editorially of the events of election day:

"It was a disgraceful orgy of money and rum, conducted in the interest of the Government."

"It adopted prohibition, but deluged the electors of this county with whiskey."

"It declares it is not a corrupt government, but distributed a boodle fund over the county until money bribes were falling as thick and numerous as the withered leaves of a forest under a brisk autumn breeze."

The Transcript's editorial, giving additional particulars as to what happened, is republished here:

All hail to Westmorland county!  
All honor to Moncton parish!  
All honor to the other Liberals and Conservative allies—throughout the county; who did so nobly in the greatest fight against an organized gang of corruptionists ever won in the Dominion of Canada.

The turnover of the Conservative majority in Moncton parish of 214 for Mahoney into a minority of 191 is admittedly the outstanding sensational feature of the campaign.

At the general election of 1912, Mr. Mahoney carried the parishes of Shediac, Salisbury, Moncton, Botsford, Sackville and Westmorland; in fact, every parish but Dorchester.

In this election he has only carried the parishes of Sackville, Westmorland and Botsford.

The Government sought by every device to steal a march upon the Opposition.

They brought the election on with unfair haste. They availed themselves practically of the minimum allowance of time by the statute. They organized their forces.

They expended the most tremendous sum of money in attempting to corrupt the electors ever known in the history of this county.

In one little parish alone with less than 600 voters, they actually had a boodle fund allotted to that parish of about \$4,000. In another parish along the North Shore the amount of money expended by the Government heeleders was tremendous. They were so brazen in their boastings before polling that they claim that they had bought up everything in sight, and would have a majority of 200 in one poll.

From other parishes comes the same story. It was a disgraceful orgy of money and rum, conducted in the interest of the Government.

It adopted prohibition, but deluged the electors of this county with whiskey.

It declares it is not a corrupt government, but distributed a boodle fund over the county until money bribes were falling as thick and numerous as the withered leaves of a forest under a brisk autumn breeze.

The first results received by this office was from the parish of Moncton, and it was good, most encouraging, but it was evident when the other parishes began to speak that the money employed by the Government had had more effect elsewhere than in the parish of Moncton.

There were some other notable changes in the result.

Take Shediac, for instance. The electors of that parish were the recipients of special attention by the Government's organized boodle gang, but as a Tory leader is reported to have stated in the parish election, they voted according to their conscience.

Many took the money doubtlessly and voted Liberal, but a great many were influenced to vote Conservative. Despite this, Mr. Mahoney's majority of 192 was turned into a minority of 15.

Sackville parish did not do as well for Dr. Smith as it did for Mr. Copp,

but that was to be naturally expected, as Sackville is Mr. Copp's home parish—but only money and rum saved even Sackville to the Conservatives.

The stories coming in from over the county reveal the existence of a state of affairs on polling day which demands that the Liberals should take steps to prosecute not the dupes but the distributors of the boodle.

When boodling is carried on in such a brazen manner as that on a leading street in the county on Tuesday morning, when it was found that a certain section of the vote in a parish was voting lightly and wanted to be stimulated, an automobile drove up to one of the leading banks and a gentleman entered there, cashed a large cheque and came out openly with big bundles of bills and put them in the automobile and drove across towards the parish.

The names of a great many people who distributed money have been taken, not only in Sunny Brae, but elsewhere, and prosecutions are contemplated against them under the criminal code of Canada.

## EX-MINISTERS WILL BE FIRST TO BE TRIED

Winnipeg, June 2.—The Summer Assizes were opened here this morning by Judge Metcalfe in the new Court House. The very first men to be tried in the newly-opened court building, ironically enough, will be the ex-Ministers of the Roblin Government, Sir Rodmond Roblin, G. R. Coldwell and J. H. Howden, and the contractor, Thos. Kelly, who were responsible for its erection.

No mention whatever was made this morning of cases to be tried. The petit jury panel contained the unusually long list of 131 names. This large number was so arranged in order that three courts might proceed at the same time. Judge Prendergast will preside over the trials of the men involved in the Parliament Buildings cases, but it is not likely that any witnesses will be called in these cases for at least a week. Time is being given to the defence to study the jury list, and it is expected that much preliminary sparring between counsel will be done before actual evidence is heard.

The order of the trials is still a matter of uncertainty. The Crown, it is understood, wishes to have Thomas Kelly tried first, the idea being that certain evidence may be adduced that might prove of value in the prosecution of the ex-Ministers. This point will be decided probably tomorrow.

The charges against Kelly are theft, receiving, obtaining money by false pretences and perjury.

Dr. R. M. Simpson is charged with obtaining money under false pretences, theft and conspiracy to defraud.

Sir Rodmond Roblin, J. H. Howden and G. R. Coldwell are charged with conspiracy to defraud the province, while Sir Rodmond in addition is accused of destroying public documents.

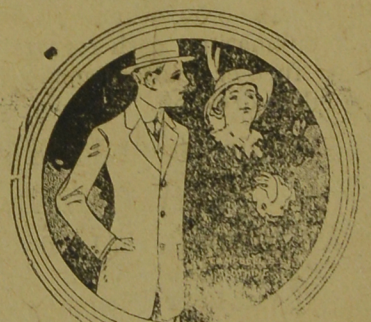
