A DISCREDITED OUTFIT.

The North-Shore Leader, organ of Hon. John Morrissey, ex-Minister of Public Works, makes the following interesting comment on the magnificent Opposition victory achieved in Westmorland:

"The greatest surprise that any political party ever received was dished out to the local grafters in Westmorland on Tuesday, when Dr. Smith defeated Mr. Mahoney by 51 votes. Notwithstanding the fact that Mahoney had the support and influence of two governments, a portfolio and all the pressure that money could bring to bear, he went down to defeat. The Government is doomed. The good people of Westmorland have convinced the province that they stand for honest administration, and the Clarke-Baxter-Murray-Landry combination realize today that the greatest political mistake of their lives was made when they asked for the resignation of the late Liberal Minister, who was the only honest and fair-minded member of the whole outfit.

"Stranger things have happened—Dr. E. A. Smith, leader of the Opposition and Premier after the next election.

"Governor Wood's duty is plain! Send the Government to the people, and there will not be a corporal's guard returned.

"There are a number of soreheads in Westmorland today. Mr. Humphrey, M.L.A., will not try to act the 'goodie-goodie' man again, and Mr. Sumner no doubt feels the loss of the middleman's profit he would have made if he had secured the contract for supplying pipe for a sewer built in Moncton parish.

"It is reported that Premier Clarke proposes to try to elect a man in another constituency for the portfolio. The Governor should put a stop to this and preserve the name of the province. It is coming to be a nice state of affairs when a portfolio has to be hawked about the country. Who will be the next victim?"

Montreal Herald: Sir Robert Borden did not show resistance to the Nationalists when he appointed the recognized leader of the Nationalists to the position of Minister of Public Works at the outset of his Premiership. Nor did he show resistance to them when he appointed to the Postmaster Generalship Hon. L. P. Pelletier. Resistance was not apparent, either, when he admitted Mr. Coderre to his cabinet and subsequently rewarded both the gentlemen named with judgeships, to make way in the cabinet for such men as Mr. Blondin, of "shoot holes in the British flag" notoriety. And surely it could not have been resistance to the Nationalists that caused the Premier to oust Dr. Sproule, Grand Master of the Grand Orange Lodge of British North America, from the Speaker's chair to invest an out-and-out Nationalist like Mr. Seigney with the privilege of saying when the patriots who have the blessing of the Toronto News are in order or not in order! Then again, why did Sir Robert Borden go back on his cordial support of the Laurier naval act, if not at the behest of the Quebec Nationalists?

Col. H. F. McLeod, M.P., is authority for the statement that Mr. J. K. Fleming when Premier of the province, received the sum of \$10,000 from J. H. Corbett & Sons, Inc., sub-contractors on the Valley Railway. A similar charge was made by Mr. Dugal, two months later, but Mr. Fleming denied it under oath when on the witness stand. Mr. Corbett, sr., the man who is alleged to have handed over the cash, was in the United States when the enquiry was going on, and could not be induced to come to New Brunswick and give his version of the incident. A comparison of Col. McLeod's statement with Mr. Fleming's evidence shows that somebody has been doing some lying on the subject.

"I also charge that one Mr. Brankley, of the Miramichi Lumber Company, paid to him, the said Hon. J. K. Fleming, the sum of \$1,000 as a 'personal gift for the privilege of shipping rossed pulp wood cut from crown lands, in violation of the law.' The above is an extract from the now famous letter which Col. H. F. McLeod, M.P., is said to have dictated to Mr. H. M. Blair. The Mail, in the discharge of its duty as a public journal, has had occasion to criticize Mr. Fleming rather harshly, but it remained for Col. McLeod to charge him with having sold his birthright for a mess of pottage.

St. John Times: The Fredericton Gleaner calls for a reorganization of the provincial government. What is there to reorganize? Where are the "bigger and broader men" to be found in the present house? Mr. J. L. Stewart offers a better remedy. The way to reform the government in his opinion, is "to kick it out." A good beginning was made in Westmorland.

When His Honor the Lieutenant Governor meets his advisers here next week he should lose no time in requesting them either to hand in their resignations or order a dissolution of the Legislature. His Honor should put his foot down hard on the discredited executive.

The Lieutenant Governor should put a stop to any further humbugging with the people's rights on the part of his advisers. The Government has lost the confidence of the people, and should get out.

Premier Clarke says that the question which has arisen in regard to the portfolio of Public Works is one of administration. As a political procrastinator the Premier is still in a class by himself.

At last accounts the provincial ship of state, with its barnacled hull, was still running before the wind with the jib aft.

them up and I am now draughtsman on the brigade staff—a pretty good berth—far better than in the line.

"This trench warfare makes me tired. I've seen one German in seven months of trench warfare. So this job is much better and I feel as though I were helping along a little. I haven't been away on pass since came over here, but I hope I may get away for my eight days to Merrie England.

"This is an awful country, not worth fighting for. In winter a more distressed looking place you never saw, but now that summer is come it looks quite pretty, so many hedges and trees hide the unfavorable points. There's no place like Canada and I'll be mighty glad when I get back there."
