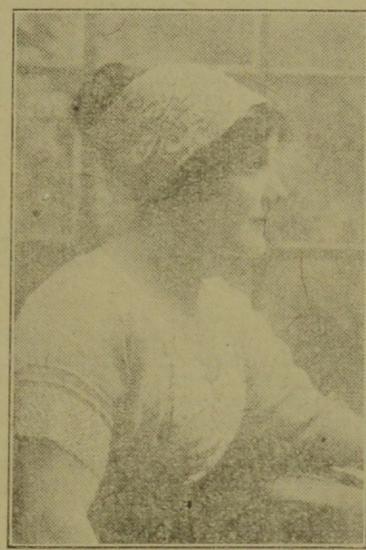

## SIX INCHES OF SNOW FELL IN SUNDAY'S STORM

Ice Moved Saturday Evening But  
Hung Again on Railway  
Bridge.

Six inches of snow fell Sunday and  
this time of the year but snowstorms  
this morning. The fall is heavy for  
in April are not unusual. The trains  
were slightly interfered with by the  
storm, the latest being delayed not  
more than half an hour this morning.  
The wind during the storm did not  
have a greater velocity than twenty  
miles per hour. The lowest tempera-  
ture was twenty-five degrees above  
zero last night. Today the tempera-  
ture rose and the snow is melting  
fast.

The ice in the river is still hanging  
at this point. Saturday night the  
ice moved about one hundred feet  
but stopped, the railway bridge evi-  
dently holding it. The ice in the  
Nashwaak has run out and the river  
below the railway bridge is open as  
far as the Victoria Mill.

## NO APPOINTMENT IN PLACE OF OFFICER SAUNDERS

It is understood that the Police  
Commission will not make any ap-  
pointment in the place of Policeman  
William Saunders, who was dismiss-  
ed from the force on Friday last. It  
is the opinion of the commissioners  
that good order can be kept in the  
city by four policemen.

Up to this afternoon no counter-  
charges against Chief McCollom had  
been formally filed with the Police  
Commission but it is expected such  
action will be taken in a short time.  
Chairman McKay informed The Mail  
today that there had been no further  
developments.

## FORTY-EIGHT RECRUITS HERE DURING LAST WEEK

Forty-eight was the total number  
of recruits sworn in here last week  
for various units. Three recruits  
were sworn in here this morning.  
They are, William Graham, 42, Fred-  
erickton; George L. Roberts, 20, Fred-  
erickton, and James A. McInnis, 19,  
Fredericton. Private Graham joins  
the 140th Battalion and will be bat-  
tled to Lt. Col. P. A. Guthrie, who  
will open an office in the local ar-  
mory in connection with his recent  
appointment as special instructor to  
overseas units in the province. The  
other recruits are for the 58th How-  
itzer Battery. Gunner Roberts is a  
son of City Marshal James Roberts.

New Brunswick sent 138 men into  
the 224th Doresty Battalion. During  
their stay in St. John the men of  
this unit won very favorable com-  
ment for good behavior.

## Reported Dead; Turns Up Safely

Sydney, N. S., April 10.—Private  
Kavanagh of the Princess Patricia's,  
reported dead in the Canadian casualty  
list after the battle of Neuve Chap-  
elle, limped off the train this morn-  
ing on the arrival of the Intercolonial  
express.

Kavanagh has a bullet in his head  
and three shrapnel bullets in his leg.  
He lay for four days between the lines  
before he was brought in by stretcher  
bearers.

## Canadians And The St. Eloi Fight

Ottawa, April 10.—"We have not re-  
ceived a bit of news indicating that  
Canadians were in the reported fight  
at St. Eloi," stated a high official of  
the Militia Department who handles  
such messages, this morning.

"The nightly cables give the total  
of casualties, but of late the figures  
have only been ordinary. It is possi-  
ble that the German communique men-  
tioning the Canadians was designed to  
draw out just what troops held that  
part of the line."

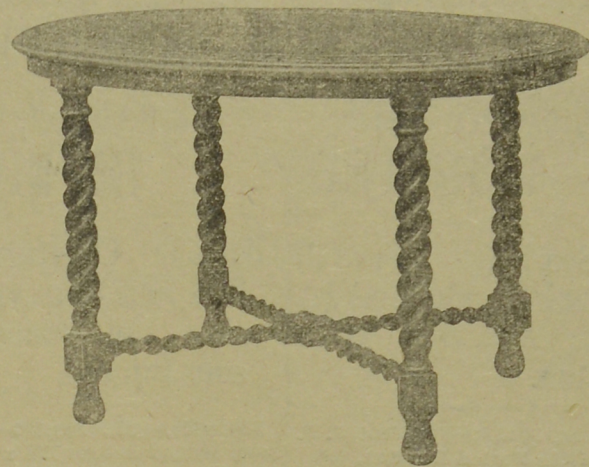
### MAGISTRATE RETURNS.

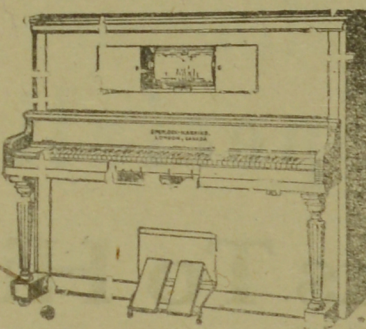
