LANNIN SAYS
NOTHING IN STORY
OF SPEAKER TRADE

Red Sox Will Not Sell
Great Player to Yankees
--He Will Stay With
Boston.

New York, April 7--President J. J. Lannin of the Boston Red Sox, today promptly disposed of the story that he had traded Tris Speaker, one report declaring that Maisei was coming to Boston to exchange for the centre-fielder, the Highlanders to throw in a big sum as a bonus. Speaker has not signed any contract nor will he do so until the club gets back home, probably, but there is not the least doubt that Speaker, Carrigan and President Lannin finally came to a final and satisfactory understanding.

President Lannin said: "The report current yesterday that the Boston club might sell Speaker to the Yankees is all bosh. Bill Donovan has a fine ball club as it is and I fear the Yankees this season just as much as the Detroit Tigers and the Chicago White Sox.

"If I sold Speaker to the Yankees it would be just the same as selling them the American League pennant. But Speaker in centrefield over at the Polo Grounds and Donovan's team would walk away with the flag this year.

"Speaker is a reasonable sort of a fellow and we expect to reach an agreement within the next few days."

LADY EGLANTINE LOSES
TITLE FOR EGG-LAYING

New York, April 7--Lady Eglantine the champion \$10,000 white leghorn hen, with a record of 315 eggs in a year, has been beaten by a duck. The new champion is Peggy, a Rouen duck, belonging to Mrs. R. C. Vanister of Newark.

Peggy started her egg-laying race January 12, 1915. She had laid 325 days less than a year with only two rest periods. She started in again on January 26 last and has not stopped yet.

BOB BURMAN, FAMOUS
RACING DRIVER, DIES
FROM HIS INJURIES

His Car Overturned in
301 Mile Race at River-
side, Cal.--Many Per-
sons Injured.

Riverside, Cal., April 9--Bob Burman, famous automobile race driver, died here last night from injuries received in an accident in the third annual 201 mile race on the Corona track yesterday. Burman suffered a basal fracture of the skull and his left leg was fractured.

His mechanic and a dozen other persons were injured more or less seriously when Burman's car threw a wheel in the 97th lap on the back stretch.

FOR B. A. A. MARATHON

Big Race Will Take Place
at The Hub Within a
Fortnight--No. 13 Will
Be Omitted.

Boston, April 8--With less than two weeks now before the B.A.A. Marathon race on Patriots' Day, the entries are beginning to pour in upon Manager George V. Brown and the present indications are that the number of competitors will compare favorably with other years.

Up to yesterday, eighteen entries had been received and this number is considered large at this stage, as most of the crack runners hesitate about announcing their intention of competing until the final week.

Among the entries received yesterday were those of Fred Travalena of the Mohawk A.C., who last year finished eighth, and Charles Erikson, James Brooks and George Mozzucca will also wear M.A.C. colors.

William Rozett of the Pennant A.C. of New York, a veteran of the Boston race, will compete again this year, and George B. Moss, Holy Cross Lyceum, New York, is another seasoned runner who is to make the run.

There will be a host of local lads who have yet to make their mark in the distance game, including Crohane McGillicuddy of the Somerville Boys' Club, George Cortassakis of Boston, Robert Dunn of Hopkinton, who has shown considerable promise as a miler, and Frank Harrington, Andrew Sullivan and James Webber of Southville.

Superstition has always entered strongly into the running of the Marathon, but this year there will be no No. Thirteen, partly because of the aversion of some of these numerals and partly because there are too many others eager to wear the so-called hoodoo number.

It is significant that the only Canadian to enter for the run so far is the first entry, Edmund Martineau of the Montreal A.A.A., who finished in twenty-eighth last year. Martineau is employed in a railroad office in Montreal and this year has undergone a systematic course of training for the race. He will come to Bos-

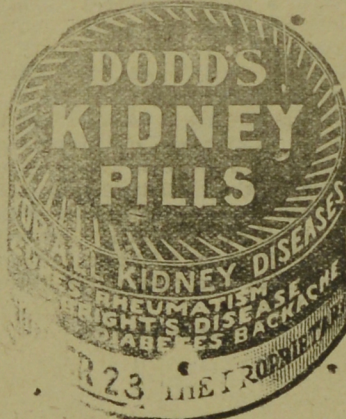

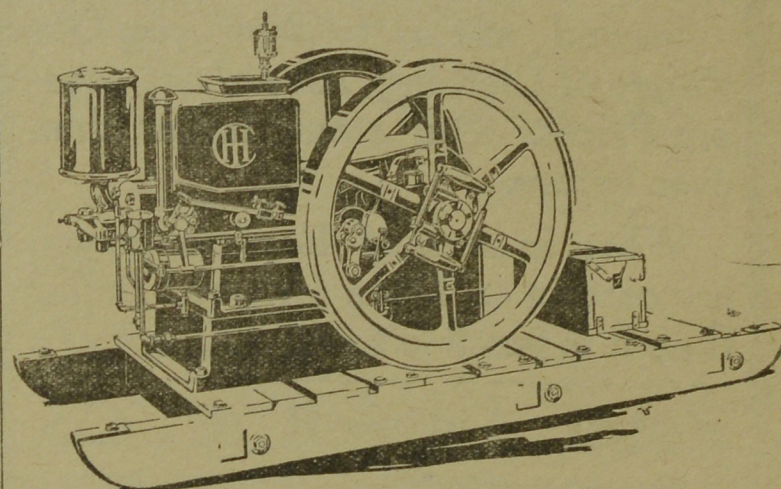

"Say, John, I feel quite sick today," said Mr. Blank. "Please visit the different doctors in town, and find out who will cure me for the least money. Get your quotations tabulated and then let me see them. Of course we will engage the doctor who charges the least."

"Why, I never heard of such a thing," said John. "The idea of getting quotations from a doctor; it's the asylum for you."
