HELP FOR MRS. NEWLYWED

the suds are cold, put the gloves

tly. Rinse in clean water in the

place to dry, shaping when nearly

ODD DESIGNS IN HATS.

The growing popularity of sport
hats in part may be responsible
for the spring hat oddities design-
ed for street wear with suits and
coats. But the liberties seem to
have been taken with trimming
and foundation materials instead
of with the shapes themselves.
Broad-brimmed sailors and small
round toques without kinks are
most favored by the best design-
ers. On these they paint trimming
of fruit and flowers, stripes and
checks, or they execute colorful
wool embroideries of flowers and
vines, even embroidering the edge
of the sailors in old friend button-
hole stitch. A sailor seen recently
had a black satin brim. The crown
had a foundation of white silk
which sets off black lines of wood
embroidery. A few thistles had
their purple wool heads flattened
against the crown-band, and wool
tassels completed the trimming.
Another hat had a dark blue cham-
ois foundation, of dull blue. The
band run in and out around the
crown was a length of Scotch plaid
of white and blue and red in char-
acteristic medley. At the back of

the crown was a Scotch rosette of
the plaid, and at the side-front a
piece of dark blue coque feather
added topping.

Mocha Souffle—Melt three table-
spoons of butter and add gradu-
ally three tablespoons of flour stir
well, and while cooking pour over
gradually three-fourths of a cup of
coffee and one-fourth of a cup of
cream, cook carefully over hot wa-
ter, add half a cup of sugar, one-
fourth of a teaspoon of salt and
stir until smooth. Then add the
yolks of four eggs well beaten,
cool slightly and fold in the whites
of the eggs whipped to a stiff froth
Flavor slightly with vanilla. Pour
into a buttered baking dish and
bake in a moderate oven twenty
minutes. Serve immediately or the
or the souffle will fall.


