

# ANOTHER GREAT TRIUMPH FOR THE BRITISH TROOPS

German Trenches Captured on a Frontage of Fourteen Miles---Large Number of Prisoners Taken---Contalmaison Taken After a Stubborn Fight.

London, July 11.—The capture of the whole of the German first system of defence on a front of 14,000 yards, (nearly eight miles) after ten days and nights of continuous fighting, is announced in the official report from British headquarters in France. The number of prisoners taken exceeds 7,500.

The text of the statement reads: "After ten days and nights of continuous fighting our troops have completed the methodical capture of the whole of the enemy's first system of defence on a front of 14,000 yards. It included five strongly fortified villages, numerous heavily wired and entrenched woods, and a large number of immensely strong redoubts. The capture represents an operation of much importance and the whole of them are now in our hands.

"The German success in the recapture of Trones wood after costly casualties was of short duration. Today we recaptured nearly the whole of the wood.

"Apart from the number of guns

hidden in houses and buried in the debris, we have in the course of these operations brought in 26 field guns, one naval gun, one anti-aircraft gun and one heavy howitzer, while the number of German prisoners captured exceeds 7,500."

Good Day for Allies All Around This was another good day for the Allies all around, and they are making a steady advance on all fronts.

A striking illustration of the difference now in the relative position of the Allied and Teutonic forces is seen in the number of prisoners and guns taken. These for the battle of the Somme amount to 22,000 prisoners and 104 guns captured from the Germans, while the official figures for the Russian General Brussiloff's drive to the tenth of July are 271,620 prisoners, 312 guns and 866 machine guns.

The British have finally captured the fiercely contested town of Contalmaison after desperate day and night fighting, and are now holding the town against all the German counter attacks. The importance the Germans

have attached to this position may be measured by the fact that they recently threw the Prussian Guards into the fighting at this point.

## THE DEUTSCHLAND AN UNARMED FREIGHTER

Washington, D. C., July 11.—On the strength of advice from navy experts who have inspected the Deutschland at Baltimore today, the Treasury Department informed the State Department that the German merchant submarine was an unarmed freight carrier which could not be converted for offensive use without "extensive structural changes."

### TIPS FROM THE GARDENER.

It is well to grow some late lowering perennials in front of the peonies, or to sow annuals, as the peony plants may look rather ragged and unkempt toward the end of the season. The fall asters or the hardy chrysanthemums, or perhaps late phlox, will be found good flowers for a screen. Sometimes it is necessary to stake peonies if they are exposed to high winds, and they require plenty of water to the end of the summer.

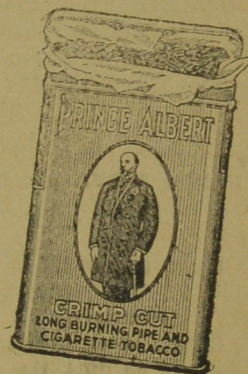
