BOTH SIDES ARE CONFIDENT OF VICTORY IN UNITED STATES

New York, Nov. 7.—General satisfaction was expressed today at both Republican and Democratic national headquarters here at the fair weather for election, as it was expected that it would bring out a great number of voters. It has been claimed by both of the leading parties that the outcome of the election would be greatly influenced by the so called "silent vote," and it was believed that good weather would bring this class out in particularly strong numbers.

Charles E. Hughes, the Republican Presidential candidate, cast his vote at 7.05 in a small laundry on Eighth Avenue, almost directly back of the hotel where he made his headquarters during the campaign. His ballot was No. 13. When his attention was called to this the Republican leader said: "Thirteen is my lucky number, and I was born on a Friday, too," he added.

Activity in Boston.

Boston, Nov. 7.—The early voting

in this city was brisk. The weather was fair and party leaders were unanimous in the prediction that a very large percentage of total registration of 117,000 would be represented. The polls opened at 6 a.m., and will close at 4 p.m.

Wilson Up Early.

Long Branch, N. J., Nov. 7.—President Wilson was up soon after day-break this morning and left for Princeton to vote. He was accompanied by Mrs. Wilson.

Women Vote in Illinois.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—By far the largest vote in the history of Illinois elections is expected to be cast today by reason of the fact that women for the first time vote for President and Vice President.

Indications of fair weather throughout the state was also counted on by party managers to aid in bringing about a heavy vote.

GERMAN BATTLESHIP HIT BY SUBMARINE

London, Nov. 6.—A British submarine, operating in the North Sea, reports that she fired torpedoes at a German battleship of the dreadnought type yesterday, making a hit. The amount of damage inflicted is not known, the Admiralty announces. The announcement follows:

"One of our submarines operating in the North Sea reports that she fired torpedoes at a German battleship of the dreadnought type near the Danish coast yesterday. The vessel was hit. The amount of damage done is not known."

The announcement gives no intimation whether any considerable portion of the German high seas fleet was in the North Sea yesterday. It was off the Danish coast that the main German and British fleets engaged in battle last May. On several occasions the German fleet has left its base for short cruises in the North Sea. Ordinarily a dreadnought would not be employed merely for reconnoitering.

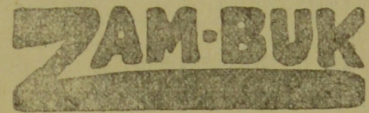

AUDITOR SAYS ROAD DEPT. HAS OVER EXPENDED

Mr. A. A. Sterling, City Auditor, at last night's meeting of the City Council in committee, pointed out that the Roads and Streets Department had over-expended to the amount of \$2,294.59. Ald. McLellan, chairman of that department, replying to the Auditor, claimed a balance of \$702 still to the credit of the department. The appropriation had been \$12,500, with added amounts of \$200 for cutting grass and \$500 for the back drain, making a total of \$13,200. Capital charges had amounted to \$3,419.74, made up as follows: To J. M. Chappell, \$2,165.86; capital expenditure, \$1,102.58; labor, \$151.66. This made a grand total of \$16,619.00 to the credit of this department, against which was an expenditure of \$15,916.99, leaving a credit balance of \$702.01.

Ald. McLellan stated that the department had had to pay bills which had come over from the previous year, which had claimed that only \$200 as year. He been spent on the up-keep of streets. Offer for Opera House.

Mr. George Apostolos, of this city, through Gregory & Winslow, has offered \$750 for the rental of the City Opera House for six months, his intention being to use the house for moving pictures. His offer contained the condition that the Opera House could be used three nights per month for patriotic purposes, that the lessee pay for the lighting and that when sub-leased for theatrical performances extra rental be paid. The matter was discussed by the City Council in committee last night, and it was pointed out that Inspector J. L. Kenney, a provincial government official, had forbidden the use of the house for moving pictures; also that a previous offer amounting to \$4,800 per year rental, had been made. On the motion of Ald. Shea it was decided not to lease the Opera House for moving pictures.
