## Huns Capture French Position

Berlin, via London, May 30.—The capture of French positions along the entire front between the southern ridge of Dead Man Hill and the village of Cumieres, south of the Corbeau and Cumieres Woods, was announced today by the War Office.

Thirty-five officers, including several staff officers and 1,313 unwounded men were captured by the Germans. Two counter attacks against Cumieres village by the French were repulsed.

## SOME CLEVERLY PLANNED DECOYS FOR ZEPPELINS

(Popular Science Monthly.)

I am credibly informed that what might be called "diversionary" protective measures have been employed with considerable success. These consist of various ingenious devices calculated to draw the fire of the Zeppelins away from the points where they could do the most harm.

The idea is said to have originated in the mind of a Norfolk farmer after a pile of chaff which he had been burning on the night of a raid was made the target of several well-placed Zeppelin bombs.

"The Zepps thought my fire was the blast of the steel mills," he told an air service officer. "Why not have some ready to fool 'em the next time they come?"

Since factories and barracks were the main objects of attack, why not provide some that could be found without difficulty and the destruction of which would be of small moment?

The first experiment was made by cutting window holes in a row of billboards along a railway and illuminating each orifice with a carbide lamp. When these came in for attention from the raiders the present plan of using "stage scenery" factories and barracks as Zeppelin decoys was outlined.

These decoys consist simply of sections of imitation walls, pierced with windows, which, by means of guys and props, can be made to represent the side or sky-lighted roofs of a factory or barracks. Where practicable the illumination is furnished by running a cable from the nearest electric transmission line, and where this is too troublesome or expensive carbide or kerosene lamps are employed.

The sections hook together and are made small enough to allow of a stack of a stack of them being carried on one of the big war motor trucks.

## SCHOONER BURNED TO THE WATER'S EDGE

Halifax, N. S., May 30.—Schooner L. T. Whitmore, 240 tons, owned at Port Greville, was burned to the water's edge, while at anchor at Spencer's Island this morning. She was loaded with deals for Tralee, Ireland.

## ITALIANS SUNK AN AUSTRIAN TRANSPORT

Rome, via Paris, May 30.—A large transport steamer was torpedoed and sunk by an Italian warship in the Austrian harbor of Trieste on the night of May 28, it was officially announced this afternoon.

## HAS CONFIDENCE IN THE AMBASSADOR

London, May 30.—On being asked in the House of Commons today whether any diplomatic visit to the United States on behalf of the British government had been determined upon, Foreign Secretary Grey replied in the negative.

"Ambassador Spring-Rice possesses the full confidence of the government," he added.

## Sir Sam's Mem- ory is Bad

Ottawa, May 30.—The evidence of Col. John Wesley Allison is over and General Hughes is on the stand. Col. Allison was taken over point after point in cross-examination by Mr. Johnston, and then by Mr. Carvell. To almost every question bearing on prices or deals, Col. Allison said he "did not remember."

Mr. Carvell had something of a sensation in letters, telegrams and so forth, which he produced. In this, he said, he had received the assistance of the Providence Journal. There were telegrams from Ottawa to New York purporting to have been signed by Allison, there were cablegrams from London signed Allison. Allison said that was his name, but he could not remember if he had sent them or not.

General Hughes, on taking the stand, shortly before adjournment, submitted a written statement outlining his position as regards the Shell Committee.

## THE BRITISH VICTORY IN THE SOUDAN

London, May 30.—Further reports on the fighting last week in the Sudan, in which Colonel Kelly's force defeated some 30,000 troops of Ali Dinar, the Sultan of Darfur, show the British victory to have been greater than at first announced, according to an official statement today, which says:

"The completeness of the victory over the Sultan of Darfur on May 22 is confirmed by a further telegram by the Sirdar. All the Sultan's best troops and commanders were present.

Most of the latter was accounted for or captured. The disarmament of the tribesmen is proceeding satisfactorily. Several thousand rifles and a large quantity of ammunition already have been handed in.

On the morning following the battle, our aeroplanes threw bombs on a large body of men fleeing from the Sirdar with Ali Dinar.

The latter was last seen at the head of a following of only 300 men. He was faced by a journey of one and a half days across a waterless desert, before he could reach Bebelmarra.

## Col. Allison Still on the Stand

Ottawa, May 30.—Col. J. Wesley Allison was again on the stand at this morning's sitting of the Meredith-Duff inquiry and his cross-examination by Mr. E. F. B. Johnston, chief opposition counsel, was continued.

## Civil War Raider Has Passed Away

(Canadian Press.)

Washington, May 30.—Colonel John S. Mosby, the most famous Confederate raider of the Civil War, died here today after a long illness. He was a native of Virginia and was eighty-two years of age.


