## DAVEY ROBERTSON RATED AS SECOND TYRUS COBB

Christy Mathewson Says Robertson is of Greatest Value to New York Nationals---Has Marked Batting Ability and is Fast on Bases---Uses His Head.

Christy Mathewson, in a recent interview, said the following about Davey Robertson of the Giants:

"Our recent record run of victories in the West put the Giants back into the race and gave every member of the team a confidence in himself and his club that cannot be easily shaken; I think it also brought out that the Giants can boast of having one of the greatest outfielders the game has ever known in Davey Robertson."

"I notice that the newspapers writers on the big league circuits have been quick to realize and appreciate Robertson's great value to the Giants. Personally, I cannot too highly praise his worth, both on attack and defense."

Robertson was discussed a great deal in Marlin last spring. When John B. Foster, the club's secretary, finally arrived at training quarters, with the much advertised Benny Kauff, he brought word that Robertson, because of an injury to his leg, might not be able to appear with the team this season. The announcement was received with varying emotions.

"Some of us thought that Davey's prospective enforced absence from the line-up would be deadly to our pennant chances. Others argued that he didn't amount to much after all. These players pointed to the fact that Davey had fallen off badly through the closing months of last season."

However, those players who doubted Robertson's ability before the season began have all handsomely admitted their error of judgment and freely acknowledge that he was the backbone of the sensational western showing and one of the big reasons of our astonishing reversal to form the minute we hit the road. 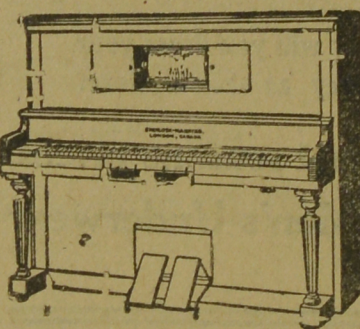

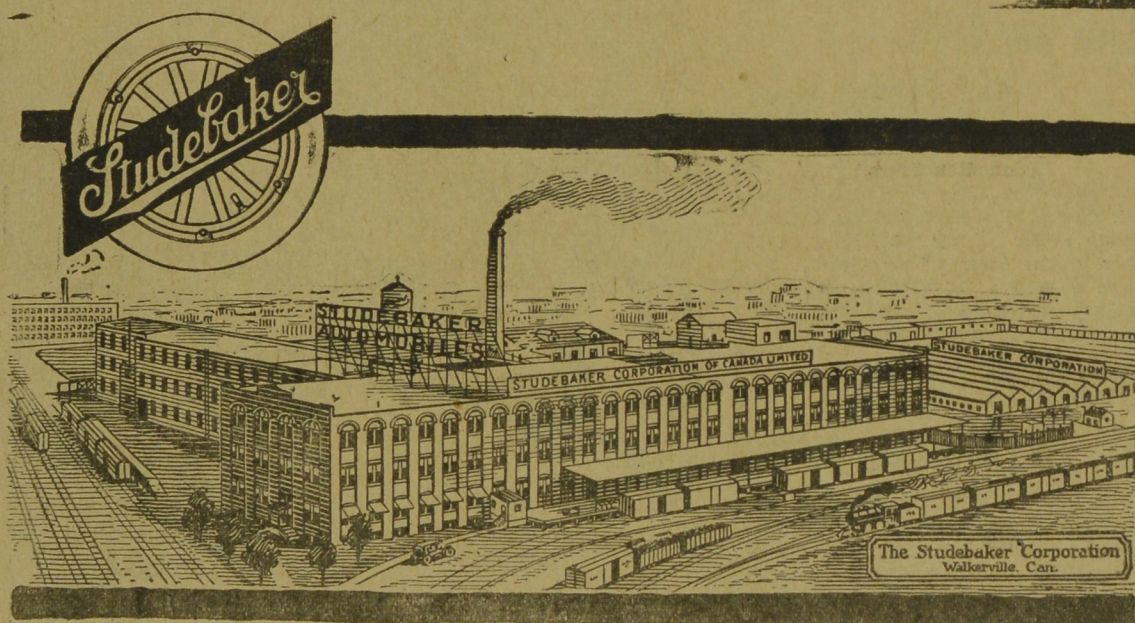

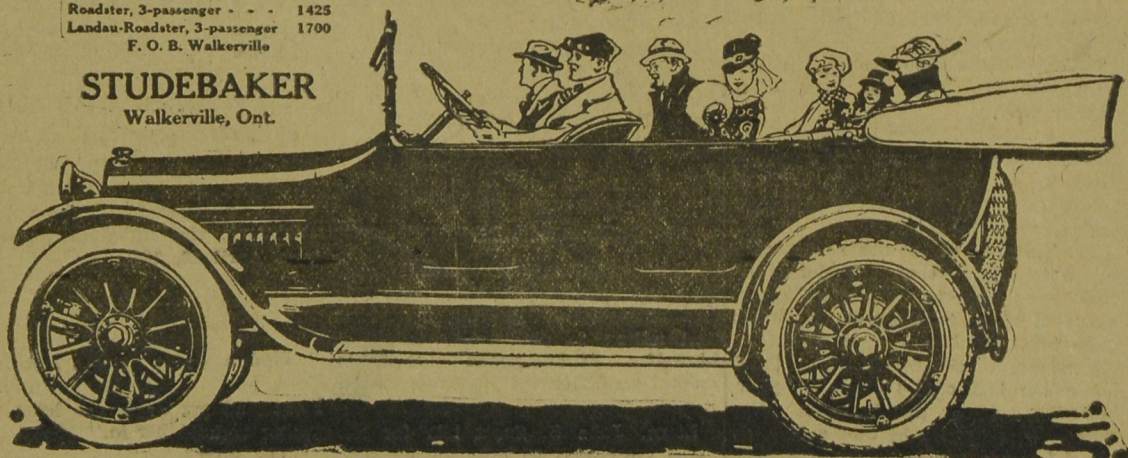
