DIED IN HOSPITAL.

William Montieth, for some years a resident of Oromocto, died yesterday afternoon at Victoria Public Hospital, aged eighty-eight years. The deceased had been ill with pneumonia for only a few days, having been admitted to the hospital on Saturday. No relatives survive in this country. The late Mr. Montieth was a native of Ireland. The funeral took place this afternoon, Rev. Dean Neales conducting the service. Interment was made at the Rural cemetery.

DEATH OF AGED LADY.

Mrs. Bridget O'Connor, widow of the late Michael O'Connor, died at one o'clock this afternoon, aged eighty-two years. Three sons and three daughters, all of Fredericton, survive. They are Edward, Frederick, Charles, Annie, Frances and Nellie. Mr. Daniel McGrand of Keswick is a brother. The funeral will take place at two o'clock on Thursday with solemn service at St. Dunstan's church by Rev. Father Carney. Interment will be made at the Hermitage.

SUPERNUMERARY AND ATTACHED OFFICERS NOT FOR OVERSEAS

Orders Received by 104th--Several Promotions in 58th Howitzer Battery--140th Ready to Move.

Thursday is said to be the day of departure of C Company, 104th Battalion, from Fredericton. Orders last night were to the effect that Major Pincombe's horses were to be forwarded to Sussex today. The company is now ready to leave. The latest orders state that supernumerary and attached officers may accompany the battalion to Halifax if they wish. This is taken to mean that neither supernumerary or attached officers will accompany the battalion overseas. This is in line with information received from Ottawa some time ago. Lieut. A. O. Crookshank is supernumerary and Lieut. G. A. Hubbard is attached. 140th Ready to Move.

Orders from the headquarters of the 140th Battalion at St. John last night were that C Company, quartered here, was to hold itself in readiness to leave on twelve hours' notice. It is expected that the 140th will assemble at St. John before leaving for Valcartier.

Promotions in Battery.

Three promotions in the 58th Howitzer Battery are announced today by Major C. M. P. Fisher, officer commanding. Corp. C. E. Matmann is to be sergeant, Bombardier Ian McLean is to be corporal and Driver Lawrence is to be corporal. There is no definite word yet as to the time of the Battery's departure for Petewawa.

SCOTT ACT CASES

ATTRACTED LARGE AUDIENCE TODAY

Duncan Case off Until Thursday--Several Witnesses Examined in Case of Restaurant Keeper Charged With Violation.

Two cases connected with recent seizures of liquor by the city police were before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning and attracted a large number of persons to the court room. In the case of John Duncan, charged with obstructing and interfering with Policeman Marshall during a recent search at Long's Hotel, Policeman Marshall and Ralph Peterson gave evidence. The case will be resumed Thursday morning. Mr. P. J. Hughes appeared for the defence, and Mr. R. B. Hanson for the prosecution.

Other Case.

In the other case, in which a York street restaurant keeper was charged with violating the Canada Temperance Act, counsel was the same. Policeman Marshall and Chief McCollom gave evidence and two citizens who had been in the restaurant on the night of May 23, when the offense is alleged to have been committed, were on the stand. This case also goes over until Thursday.

The evidence of the policemen was that they had seen the accused enter a neighboring drug store and come out with a parcel wrapped in newspaper. They followed him and he ran into the restaurant. There they arrested him and took away the parcel, which was found to contain two bottles of ale. The accused was then taken to the police station. (Continued on page 5.)
