

## CROSSING WATCHMAN UNDER ARREST

London, Ont., June 24.—The jury which investigated the recent crossing accident, in which a Grand Trunk freight from Sarnia crashed into a motor truck, killing Capt. John Case and badly injuring three firemen, has brought in a verdict finding the crossing watchman, Joseph Premo, guilty of criminal negligence, and the grand jury fully responsible in every way.

Engineer Woodcourt of Sarnia declared he knew nothing of the accident until the fireman, Early, also of Sarnia, shouted to him. Fire Chief Aitkin said the train was going twenty miles an hour when it struck the truck, and that no bells were ringing.

Lawsuits involving over one hundred thousand dollars will commence shortly, it is expected.

The crossing watchman is under arrest on a charge of manslaughter.

## ENDORSES SPEECH DELIVERED BY SOCIALIST

London, June 24.—An Amsterdam despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. says that the German chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, has published an authorized statement in the semi-official North German Gazette that he endorses the speech delivered at Breslau June 20 by Phillip Scheidmann, a socialist member of the Reichstag, in which Scheidmann asserted that the Chancellor was opposed to the annexation of Belgium and to other far-reaching plans for pan-German expansion. The Chancellor had been challenged to discredit Scheidmann's speech.

## HUNS STILL STRONG ON VERDUN FRONT

Paris, June 24.—Whether it is true or not that the Germans have been obliged to withdraw troops from the western front to send to Russia, the fact is by no means manifest, for in the familiar Verdun cockpit recent attacks have been well up to the standard of intensity.

They also have found effectives to deliver a well nourished onslaught in the Champagne region. Expectations raised by the furious 24-hour bombardment on the right bank of the Meuse were fulfilled. From early morning until nightfall, attack after attack was launched along the short front from Thiaumont to Damloup. The object of the German command is to secure control of the Vaux ravine, without which it is impossible for him to force back the French advanced line and begin an attack upon the main line of forts between Souville and Tannoy.

## ALLIES DEMANDS WILL BE CARRIED OUT

Paris, June 24.—A Havas despatch from Athens says that Premier Zaimis announced the new cabinet was unable to appear before the chamber of deputies and would confine itself to execution of the demands presented by the Entente Powers. These demands will be carried out to the letter.

## ONLY SEVEN SURVIVORS HAVE RETURNED

Washington, June 24.—With reports at hand that nearly the entire American cavalry command of about 100 soldiers may have been annihilated in the fight at Carrizal Wednesday grave fears were expressed in official circles today that not even diplomatic reports from Mexico City can prevent open hostilities between the United States and Mexico.

Up to late last night only seven survivors of the Carrizal battle had returned to their base in General Pershing's column and they brought no definite word of the fate of the others.

## GERMANS HELD COUNCIL OF WAR

Paris, June 24.—It is reported that the Kaiser, the Crown Prince, Gen. Von Falkenhayn, Field Marshal Von Hindenburg and other leaders held a war council at Mezieres on June 19 and 20, to determine whether it is worth while to continue the attempt at Verdun. The Emperor is said to have appeared depressed and worn out. He eventually allowed General Von Falkenhayn and the Crown Prince, according to the report, to persuade him to continue the Verdun campaign.

The attack has been resumed more fiercely than before.

## Beatrice Redpath

ALTHOUGH Canada is still too young a nation to have a literature distinctively Canadian, she is producing to-day writers of such merit as to attract the attention of the outside world. In poetry, particularly, she has begun to blaze her own trail, such writers as Bliss Carman and C.S. D. Roberts having won recognition from all who know true inspiration. Different from these and yet even more thoroughly Canadian, for she has remained true to Montreal, is Beatrice Redpath, whose recently published volume of verse "Drawn Shutters" was described in T. P. O'Connor's well-known literary review as "coming like sunshine amid clouds, themselves noble and impressive." The poems of Mrs. Redpath are typical of the quiet dignity of Mount Royal with its stately trees, below which the world lies spread in a mysterious beauty. No name is better known in Montreal than that of Redpath, but the author of "Drawn Shutters" was born to the name of Peterson, daughter of Alexander Peterson, C.E., engineer of the C.P.R. bridge built across the St. Lawrence at Lachine in 1886, and Chief Engineer of the C.P.R. when the St. Annes and Vaudreuil bridges were built and the great railway bridge at Sault Ste. Marie. "One of the best railway engineers in the world," said the "New York Times" of her father. "One of the truest poets of our time," might well be said of Beatrice Redpath.

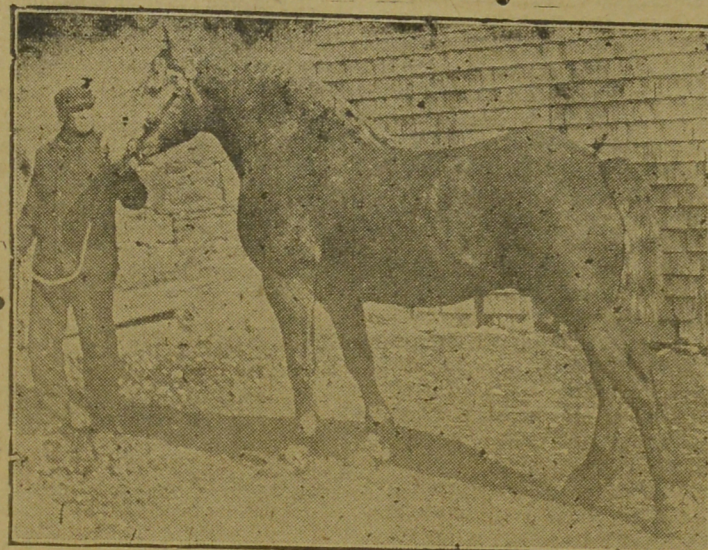
