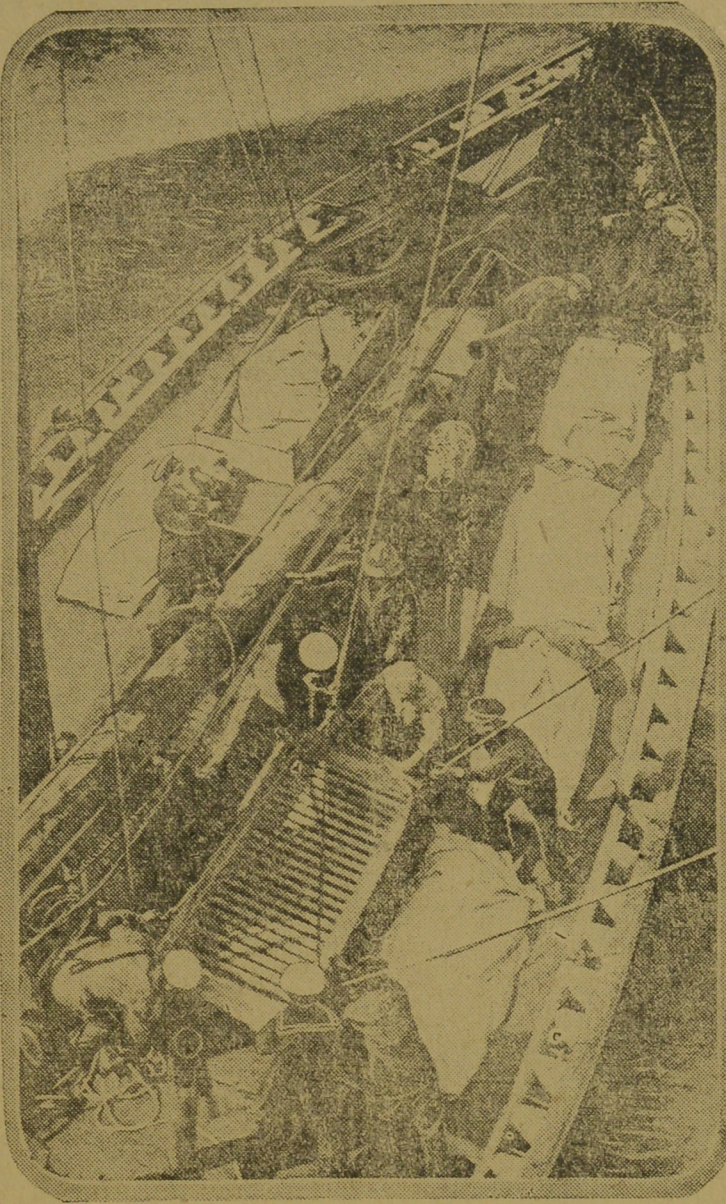

TRAIN STRUCK AUTO, THOSE IN IT NARROWLY ESCAPED DEATH

David Griffiths in Hospital With Several Bones Broken--Harold Limerick Severely Bruised--Ralph Sinnott, Who Drove Car Escaped With Shock---Car Totally Wrecked.

I. C. R. TRAIN.

Three young men who are clerks in the Fredericton post office had a narrow escape from death Saturday night when the automobile in which they were driving was struck at McConnell's crossing, in Marysville, by an extra freight train coming to the city on the I. C. R.

The young men are Ralph Sinnott, David Griffiths and Harold Limerick. The former is able to be about today but the others are confined to their beds.

Mr. Griffiths met with the most serious injuries. One collar bone was broken, several ribs fractured and one groin cut deeply. Had this cut been a quarter of an inch deeper an artery would have been severed, with the probable result that he would have bled to death.

Mr. Limerick is reported to be suffering considerable pain, his body being covered with bruises. An examination, however, showed that no bones were broken, and that there was no internal injury.

Mr. Griffiths is at the Richards private hospital and is reported to be doing well.

Both Coming Down.

Both the train and the car were coming toward Fredericton. Mr. Sinnott was in the front seat driving the car, the others were in the rear seat.

The driver states that he was under the impression that the crossing was farther down the road than it was. As a result of this miscalculation the car was right on the crossing when the train arrived.

Members of the train crew saw the car approaching, but thought it would stop before reaching it. When it was seen that an accident was inevitable brakes were put on, but it was too late to bring the train to a stop.

Hurled Through Air.

The motor car was struck just behind the driver's seat. To this fact Mr. Sinnott probably owes his escape from anything more serious than shock.

The car was torn in two. The fragments and the occupants were hurled at least forty feet through the air.

The three young men were found by the trainmen lying almost side by side. They were picked up and laid upon the grass and medical aid summoned.

Word was sent to this city and as soon as possible physicians were hurried in automobiles to the scene of the accident.

The Victoria Hospital ambulance was also sent there. First aid was given to the injured men and they were brought to Fredericton. Messrs. Sinnott and Limerick were taken to their homes by autos.

Mr. Griffiths' injuries were found to be so serious, however, that he was brought to the city by train and then taken to the private hospital by ambulance.

Dangerous Crossing.

The McConnell crossing is a dangerous one, and there is a feeling that something should be done to make it safer, either by installing a danger signal or a light.

News of the accident spread rapidly through the city and first reports were much exaggerated. All young men are well known about the city. Mr. Limerick is a son of the late John Limerick of this city, and Mr. Sinnott is a son of Mr. Alex. Sinnott, who owned the wrecked car. Mr. Griffiths is a son of Mr. Thomas Griffiths of North Cardigan.

Car Totally Destroyed.

Mr. Sinnott's car was totally destroyed. The wind shield, curiously enough, is said to have come through the accident intact. Some damage was done to the locomotive.
