EARLY MORNING

FIRE CAUSED
MUCH DAMAGE

Mrs. William Strne, Westmorland Street Lost Barn and Out-Buildings—N. B. Telephone Co. Also Had Loss.

There was a serious fire at 2.24 Westmorland Street early this morning. The house was not damaged, but outbuildings and barn were destroyed, together with their contents. The property was owned by Mrs. William Stone. Her son, Mr. William J. Stone, is in the employ of the New Brunswick Telephone Co., and a horse and some line material belonging to the company were in the barn.

The horse died of suffocation and the material was burned. Mrs. Stone's loss is about one thousand dollars, and that of the Telephone Co. about five hundred dollars. The buildings were insured.

The fire was first observed about 1.20 a.m. It evidently had been burning for some time, as it had a strong hold on the woodshed and barn. It is believed to have originated in the woodshed.

Heavy rain fell while the fire was in progress, but had little effect on the fire beyond making the smoke more dense. Those who tried to liberate the horse were driven back by smoke and flames.

As has been the case for some time past, the fire alarm system was out of order, and when box 26 was rung, several other numbers were sounded which was very confusing.

The flames were extinguished after an hour's hard work by the firemen.

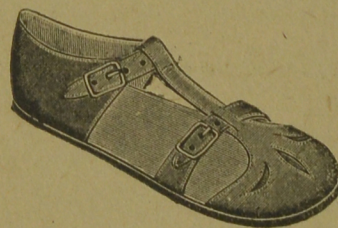
