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"HOMERUN" BAKER
SOLD TO HIGHLANDERS
BY CONNIE MACK

Mack Says He is Last Player He Ever Will Sell--Salary Not Disclosed.

Philadelphia, Feb. 15—"I have sold my last ballplayer," declared Connie Mack, veteran manager of the Philadelphia American League team, here tonight, in announcing that J. Franklin Baker, the home run hitter and hero of several world's championship contests, had been sold to the New York Americans.

Baker, who was here tonight, said that he had signed a three years' contract with the New York team here today, but neither he nor Connie would disclose the amount of Baker's salary nor the purchase price. Mack said that when he disposed of Eddie Collins last year he had no intention of selling other players.

"Circumstances, however, forced me to change my mind," said he. "I decided then to reconstruct my team with young players but if the time ever comes again when I cannot agree with my star players, I will give up the game. I have sold my last ballplayer."

The Boston Red Sox have signed Marty McHale, last season with the New York Highlanders. He was a member of the Red Sox in 1910-11 and then went to Jersey City for a year, returning to the American League when he went to the Yankees.

PERSONAL!

Effective March 1, the price of the Chalmers Six-40 in Canada will be \$1950. This is an increase of \$100 over the present price. It is made necessary by the sharp rise in cost of raw materials.

Aluminum, which sold for 19 cents a pound only a few months ago, now brings 53 cents.

Copper has risen from 14 cents to 24 cents.

Vanadium steel a year ago brought \$18.50 a pound. Now it sells for \$8.50.

High speed steel, formerly at \$1.05 a pound, now is worth \$3.25.

Leather formerly 20 cents a foot now brings 33 cents, and so on.

All told, it costs \$118.22 more in raw material to build the Six-40 than it did some months ago.

As this amount is considerably in excess of our net profit per car, only two courses were open to us.

One was to raise the price.

The other was to lower the quality.

To follow the latter course meant a "oneyear" car. This kind of an automobile Chalmers has never built and never will build.

Therefore, rise in price was the only procedure possible.

We regret that an increase in price is necessary, but we feel that other manufacturers of automobiles will be forced either to increase the price or use a lower grade of materials.

For it is not possible to buy superior products in the open market at any less price than Chalmers pays.
