Woman's Column

BEAUTY IN BLOUSE LIES IN TRIMMING

There are Varied Means of
Treating Simple Models
Which Give Smart Touch.

As much importance lies in the
waist trimmings as in cut and ma-
terial. There are so many methods
of treating an apparently simple
pattern that one should not be at a
loss to give the artistic touch to
the otherwise plain blouse.

One pongee waist for utility
wear has the small flat collar and
simple cuffs embroidered in a de-
sign of brown. The pongee-covered
buttons are embroidered with
the same brown, and over the
shoulder seams the same color silk
is used.

Another blouse of mermaid green
handkerchief linen is relieved by a
set in yoke of white. Where its
points joined the waist material a
design of small dots is worked. The
cuffs are treated in the same way.

A white linen waist, designed
for half mourning, has its wide
plaited collar and cuffs piped in
black. Suspenders are simulated
with embroidery. In black solid
stitch outlined in white chain stitch
is curiously delineated strap and
buckles over the shoulders and
down each side of the front that
amply trim the blouse.

HELPFUL RECIPES.

Baltimore Pudding—One cup of
suet, chopped; one cup of molasses
one cup of raisins, three cups of
flour, one teaspoon of cloves, one
teaspoon of cinnamon, one tea-
spoon of soda, two eggs. Put in
pudding mould and steam for about
four hours.

Date Sticks—Two eggs beaten
separately, three-fourths of a cup
of powdered sugar, three table-
spoonfuls flour, one teaspoon bak-
ing powder, one teaspoon vanilla,
one cup chopped dates, one cup of
chopped walnuts. Bake in thin
sheets and then while warm cut
into sticks three of four inches
long and one and one-half inches
wide.

Sweet Salad Dressing—For ap-
ples, celery or any fruit or nuts
may be made from the juice of
three oranges, two lemons, two
eggs, one cup sugar and one cup
of whipped cream. Beat the juice
of lemons with eggs, add sugar
and boil until clear. Whip the
cream and add to the mixture. Set
away in a cool place, and when
ready to serve, mix lightly with

fruit or celery and nuts.

Almond Pudding—Pound six
ounces of almonds to a smooth
paste, add six ounces of sugar, one
teaspoon grated lemon peel and six
eggs. Beat eggs well; add other
ingredients. Beat for one hour and
bake immediately.

Rice Pudding—One cup of rice,
2 quarts of milk, 1 cup of brown
sugar, 1 stick of cinnamon. Wash
rice, and add one-half the milk,
sugar and cinnamon. Put in oven
and cook slowly for about four
hours. As the milk cooks away add
the remaining quart of milk, a lit-
tle at a time. Do not stir while
cooking.

Meat Souffle—One tablespoon-
ful butter, two eggs, one cup chop-
ped meat, one tablespoonful flour,
salt, one cup of sweet milk. Let all
boil. Put in baking dish, add whites
of eggs and bake a half hour.
