## FULTZ ADVISES PLAYERS' FRATERNITY TO BE ON WATCH

**Says That Agreement  
Among the Big League  
Magnates is Full of  
Danger For Players.**

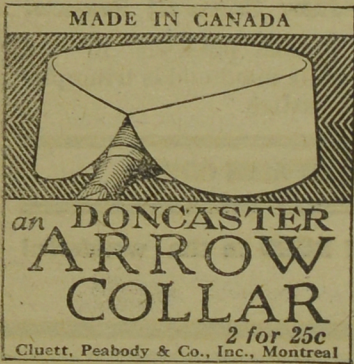
New York, Jan. 11.—President Fultz of the Baseball Players' Fraternity, has addressed a special communication to the members of the organization calling attention to the complicated contractual relations which will exist among the Federal players and owners under the proposed peace involving organized and independent baseball interests. Pres. Fultz, outlining the situation, says in part:

"Although the peace agreement between organized ball and the Federal League has not been made public authoritatively, it can safely be said that organized ball will not assume the long term Federal League contracts except where it desires to do so."

"It will probably respect these contracts, but will not necessarily assume them."

"In order to preserve their rights, all players should gain the consent of their Federal League owners before signing with an organized ball club. If they do not do this they may lose the advantage of their Federal League contract without gaining any corresponding advantage under their new agreements."

"Players should be careful to get competent advice before entering into any new contractual relations."

**Match for World's Heavy-  
weight Championship  
Arranged for New York  
on March 3rd.**

New York, Jan. 12.—Jess Willard, world's heavyweight champion, and Frank Moran have been matched to meet here March 3 for a purse of \$45,000. Announcement of this was made today by Tex Rickard, who promoted the Jeffries-Johnson fight at Reno, and who, with Samuel McCrackin, is promoting the Willard-Moran bout.

The preliminary agreement for the bout has been signed and Jack Curley, one of Willard's managers, is in Chicago today with the final articles of agreement, which Willard is expected to sign.

## STALLINGS IS SUMMONED TO MEET HAUGHTON

**New Owner of Boston  
Braves Gets Busy—  
Stallings Has Resigned  
As Director of Club.**

Boston, Jan. 12.—That the man who is to succeed James E. Gaffney as president of the Boston Braves is not wasting time and proposes to strengthen the machine wherever it can be done, is quite evident.

Mr. Haughton yesterday wired Manager Stallings, asking if he could come north to talk over the affairs of the club. He wished to learn where, if at any place, the team can be strengthened and if Mr. Stallings knows of any players available who are desired by him for this purpose. Such an attitude by the owners of the club, it may be said, will be brightly pleasing to Manager Stallings.

Mr. Haughton also desires to discuss the spring training plans with Mr. Stallings and to decide on how many exhibition games are to be played.

The plan for the Boston club and the New York Highlanders to travel in company while coming north from the training camps and to play exhibition games en route, has been called off.

As matters now stand, the only games now scheduled are those with the Athletics and those with the Senators in Washington.

Others will be arranged, but how many or how few will not be decided until Haughton and Stallings meet.

A report which was sent out from New York late yesterday afternoon, stating that Stallings had sent his resignation to the new owners of the club, was quickly exploded.

In reply to an inquiry sent by telegram to Stallings, the following was received in reply last night:

"Haddock, Ga., Jan. 11.

"My resignation was as a director of the Boston club. Felt it my duty to the new owners to allow them to select directors choosing their interests."

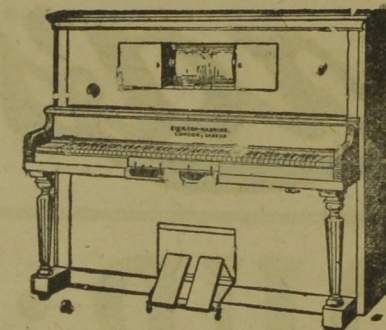
