FIRST GAME.

He scored five of the goals credited to his team, playing a first class game at centre. Harrison scored the only goal made by the 104th. The latter team, in former games, showed an inability to score and did not show any improvement Saturday. The game marked the first appearance of the 104th team in its uniforms of khaki with white facings.

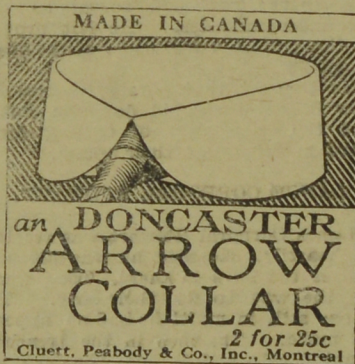

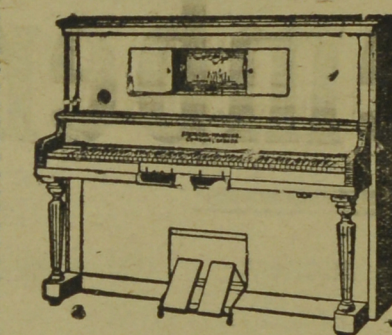
